Devotional — Jesus the Evangelist

Here's a 5-day Bible reading plan and devotional guide

Day 1: The Heart of an Evangelist

Reading: Acts 8:4-8, 26-40

Devotional: Philip's journey in Acts 8 exemplifies the heart of an evangelist. He was willing to go wherever God led him, whether to a bustling city or a desert road. His eagerness to share the good news of Jesus Christ resulted in joy, healing, and salvation. Today, reflect on your own willingness to share your faith. Day 2: The Power of Good News

Reading: Isaiah 52:7-10, Romans 10:14-15

Devotional: Isaiah speaks of the beauty of those who bring good news, a sentiment echoed by Paul in Romans. The gospel message is not just good, it's transformative. It brings peace, salvation, and proclaims God's reign. As believers, we are all called to be bearers of this good news. Consider the impact your words and actions have on those around you. Are you bringing hope and joy to others? Pray for God to give you "beautiful feet" – a readiness and eagerness to share His love and truth with those who need to hear it.

Day 3: Salvation Through Faith

Reading: Ephesians 2:8-10, John 3:1-21

Devotional: The core of the gospel message is that salvation comes through faith in Jesus Christ, not by our own efforts. This truth is liberating and humbling. It reminds us that we can't earn God's love – it's freely given. Nicodemus, a religious leader, struggled to understand this concept of being "born again." Today, examine your own heart. Are you trying to earn God's favor, or are you resting in His grace? Thank God for the gift of salvation and ask Him to help you live in the freedom it brings, motivated by gratitude rather than obligation.

Day 4: Equipped for Service

Reading: Ephesians 4:11-16, 1 Peter 4:10-11

Devotional: God has given each believer unique gifts and callings to serve His kingdom. The goal is not personal acclaim, but the building up of the body of Christ. Consider the gifts and passions God has given you. How are you using them to serve others and glorify God? Remember, your role is vital in God's plan, whether it's teaching, encouragement, acts of service, or sharing your faith. Pray for discernment to recognize your gifts and for opportunities to use them effectively in your church and community.

Reading: Isaiah 61:1-3, 2 Corinthians 1:3-7

Devotional: The prophecy in Isaiah, which Jesus later claimed as His mission, speaks of bringing good news to the afflicted and comfort to those who mourn. Our God is intimately acquainted with suffering and offers His presence and comfort in our darkest moments. Reflect on times when you've experienced God's comfort in difficulty. How can you extend that same comfort to others who are hurting? Ask God to make you sensitive to the pain of those around you and to use you as an instrument of His comfort and healing.
