"Bringing Heaven down to Earth"

Summary

As we stand on the threshold of a new era, we're reminded that our calling is not just to wait for heaven, but to bring heaven to earth. The Lord's Prayer teaches us to seek God's kingdom and will 'on earth as it is in heaven.' This powerful message challenges us to be the light in a world covered by darkness, to shine brightly in the seven mountains of influence - media, family, arts, economy, religion, education, and government. We're encouraged to see the shaking in the world as God's way of drawing people into His kingdom and purifying His church. The imagery of the flood in Noah's time is used to illustrate an impending spiritual outpouring, where the depths within us will break up and the windows of heaven will open.

Main Points - Bringing Heaven to Earth

Sermon Summary: This sermon explores the concept of Christians being called to bring heaven to earth rather than waiting to go to heaven. Pastor Eric Meyer emphasizes the importance of the church influencing various aspects of society, likened to "seven mountains of influence." He discusses the idea of God shaking both the world and the church to prepare for a great spiritual awakening and outpouring. - 5. Reflect on areas where you feel "behind" or overwhelmed. Surrender these to God, trusting that He will "catch you up" in His timing.
- 6. Set aside time to worship focusing on God's power and coming glory.

"Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord rises upon you." - Isaiah 60:1

Closing Prayer:

Lord, we thank You for Your word and the reminder that You are building Your church. Help us to rely on You completely, to walk in Your will, and to be effective in bringing Your kingdom to earth. Prepare us for the great outpouring of Your Spirit, and use us to impact the world around us. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Devotional - Bringing Heaven to Earth

Here's a 5-day Bible reading plan and devotional guide:

Day 1: Bringing Heaven to Earth

Reading: Matthew 6:9-13, Matthew 5:5

Devotional: Jesus taught us to pray "Your kingdom come, Your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven." This radical prayer isn't about escaping to heaven, but inviting God's reign into our present reality. As "the meek shall inherit the earth," we're called to be agents of heavenly transformation right where we are. Today, reflect on how you can bring heaven to your workplace, home, or community. What would it look like to embody God's love, justice, and peace in your everyday interactions? Ask God to use you as a vessel for His kingdom purposes.

Day 2: Shining in the Darkness

Reading: Isaiah 60:1-2, Matthew 5:14-16

Devotional: In a world often shrouded in darkness, we're called to "arise and shine." The light of Christ within us is meant to illuminate the shadows around us. Consider areas in your life or society where darkness seems prevalent. How can you let God's light shine through you in those places? Remember, even a small flame can dispel deep darkness. Pray for courage to stand out and be a beacon of hope, love, and truth in a world desperate for light.

Day 3: Transformation Through the Spirit

Reading: Romans 8:1-6, Galatians 5:16-25

Devotional: The struggle between our flesh (self-will) and God's Spirit is ongoing, but victory is possible through Christ. Paul reminds us that walking in the Spirit leads to life and peace. Today, consciously surrender your will to God's. When faced with decisions or temptations, pause and ask, "Am I following my will or God's will?" Practice relying on the Holy Spirit's guidance rather than your own strength. Thank God for His transforming power that enables us to live in freedom and righteousness.

Day 4: Preparing for Christ's Return

Reading: 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18, Matthew 24:36-44

Devotional: The promise of Jesus' return brings both comfort and urgency to our faith. While we don't know the day or hour, we're called to live in constant readiness. How would your priorities shift if you knew Jesus was returning tomorrow? Use this perspective to evaluate your current focus and activities. Are you investing in things of eternal value? Pray for wisdom to live each day with purpose, sharing God's love and preparing your heart for His coming.

Day 5: Joining God's Refining Work

Reading: Malachi 3:1-4, 1 Peter 1:6-7

Devotional: God's refining process in our lives, though often challenging, produces something beautiful and valuable. Like a refiner purifying precious metal, God works to remove impurities from us. Reflect on difficult seasons you've experienced. How have you seen God use those times to shape and purify you? Thank Him for His patient work in your life. Ask for grace to cooperate with His refining process, trusting that the end result will be worth the temporary discomfort.
