Devotional - Branches Over the Wall

Day 1: Planted by the Well

Reading: John 15:1-8

How might God be using this difficulty to strengthen you and reveal His glory? Take heart in knowing that these temporary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all.

Day 3: Branches Over the Wall

Reading: Acts 1:8 and Matthew 28:18-20

Devotional: The image of branches running over the wall speaks to our calling to extend beyond our comfort zones with the message of Christ. Jesus commissions us to be His witnesses, reaching out to those around us and even to the ends of the earth. This outward focus is not just for a select few, but for all believers. What "walls" might be containing your influence for Christ? Ask God to give you a vision for how He might want to use you to reach others. Remember, as you step out in faith, you carry with you the power of the Holy Spirit.

Day 4: Claiming Your Inheritance

Reading: Ephesians 1:3-14

Devotional: The story of Zelophehad's daughters reminds us of the importance of claiming our spiritual inheritance. In Christ, we have been blessed with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly realms. Yet sometimes, like these women, we need to step forward in faith to lay hold of what God has for us. Spend time meditating on the rich inheritance described in today's passage. Which of these blessings do you need to more fully embrace in your life? Thank God for His lavish grace and ask Him to help you live in the reality of your position as His beloved child.

Day 5: Strength in Weakness

Reading: 2 Corinthians 12:7-10

Devotional: The sermon touched on how God often chooses to work through those perceived as weak, particularly highlighting the strength He imparts to women in ministry. Paul's words remind us that God's power is made perfect in our weakness. When we feel inadequate or face opposition, these are opportunities for God's strength to shine through us. Reflect on areas where you feel weak or ill-equipped. How might God be inviting you to rely more fully on His grace in these areas? Embrace the paradox that when you are weak, then you are strong in Christ.
