## "Building with God"

### Summary

Are we building our lives on a foundation that will endure? This powerful message challenges us to examine how we're constructing our spiritual lives. Drawing from 1 Corinthians 3, we're reminded that Jesus Christ is the only true foundation, but we have a choice in what we build upon it. Are we using gold, silver, and precious stones - representing God's character, redemptive works, and investments in people? Or are we settling for wood, hay, and stubble - symbols of fleeting, self-centered pursuits? The imagery of fire testing our works serves as a sobering reminder that only what's built for eternity will last. As we reflect on this, let's consider: Are we allowing God to refine us through trials? Are we participating in His redemptive plan? Are we prioritizing the growth of people over material things? This message urges us to take heed and build wisely, recognizing that we are God's workmanship, designed to reflect His glory to a watching world.

### Main Points — Building with God

Sermon Summary: This sermon explores the picture of believers as God's living temple, emphasizing our role in partnering with God to build His spiritual house. Pastor Zach discusses how God is building us individually and collectively, the precise nature of this building process, and the importance of taking heed in how we contribute to this divine construction. The message underscores the responsibility of Christians to shine as witnesses for Christ and to build with materials that will endure God's refining fire.

What does it mean to be a 'missionary' simply by virtue of having the Holy Spirit, and how should this shape our daily lives?

How can we cultivate a heart that embraces trials as opportunities for spiritual growth, seeing them as refining 'gold' in our lives?

In what ways might we be unintentionally acting as 'foolish virgins' in our spiritual lives, and how can we ensure we're maintaining enough 'oil' in our lamps?

### Devotional - Building with God

Here's a 5-day Bible reading plan and devotional:

#### Day 1: Building on the Right Foundation

Reading: 1 Corinthians 3:10-15

Devotional: As we begin this journey, let's reflect on the foundation of our faith. Paul reminds us that Jesus Christ is the only foundation upon which we can build our lives. Today, consider the materials you're using to build your spiritual house. Are you investing in gold, silver, and precious stones - things of eternal value? Or are you settling for wood, hay, and stubble - temporary satisfactions that won't withstand the test of time? Remember, God is actively building you into His spiritual house. Take a moment to pray, asking the Holy Spirit to reveal areas where you need to align your building efforts with God's plan.

#### **Day 2: Shining Brighter Each Day**

Reading: Proverbs 4:18

Devotional: The path of the righteous is described as a shining light that grows brighter and brighter. This beautiful imagery reminds us that our spiritual journey should be one of continual growth and increasing radiance. Reflect on your spiritual walk over the past year. Can you see evidence of growing brighter? If not, what might be dimming your light? Remember, even small steps of obedience and faith can increase our shine. Today, choose one specific way you can let your light shine brighter for Christ, whether through an act of kindness, spending extra time in prayer, in the Word of God, in worship, sharing your faith with someone.

#### **Day 3: Living Epistles**

Reading: 2 Corinthians 3:2-3

Devotional: Paul tells us that we are living letters from Christ, known and read by everyone. This is a profound responsibility and privilege. Your life is a testimony to God's work, written not with ink but with the Spirit of the living God. How aware are you of this reality in your daily life? Consider the people you interact with regularly - your family, coworkers, neighbors. What message is your life conveying to them about Christ? Ask God to help you become more conscious of your role as His living epistle and to empower you to reflect His love and truth more clearly.

#### Day 4: Bearing Fruit in Every Season

Reading: Mark 4:1-20

Devotional: Jesus' parable of the sower reminds us that the condition of our hearts determines how fruitful we will be. Even when it doesn't feel like the right season, God

expects us to bear fruit. Examine your heart today. Are there areas of rocky ground or thorns that need to be addressed? How can you cultivate more "good soil" in your life to receive God's Word and produce a bountiful harvest? Remember, bearing fruit isn't just about personal growth - it's about providing nourishment and shelter for others, just as the mustard seed grows into a tree where birds can nest.

#### **Day 5: Partners in God's Building Project**

Reading: 1 Peter 2:4-5

Devotional: As we conclude this week's devotional, let's focus on our identity as living stones in God's spiritual house. You are not just a passive recipient of God's grace, but an active participant in His grand building project. How are you contributing to the beauty and strength of God's house? Consider the unique gifts and experiences God has given you. How can you use these to build up others in the faith? Take time to pray, asking God to show you your place in His building and to empower you to fulfill your role with faithfulness and joy.
