# "God's Decree"

# Summary

As we reflect on the Christmas story and its relevance to our lives today, we're reminded of the powerful contrast between earthly decrees and heavenly declarations. Luke 2:1 sets the stage, describing Caesar Augustus' decree for a census. Yet, in that same moment, God was orchestrating a far greater plan - the birth of our Savior. This parallel reminds us that even now, as worldly powers seem to dominate, God's eternal purposes are unfolding. We're called to choose which decree we'll live by - the world's or heaven's. Like Mary and Joseph, who responded to both earthly and divine calls, we too must be ready to move when God speaks. This may require sacrifice and discomfort, but it aligns us with God's grand design for our generation. As we enter this new year, let's tune our hearts to heaven's frequency, ready to declare and live out God's decrees in our lives and communities.

# Main Points - God's Decree

# **Small Group Guide: Responding to God's Decree**

## **Opening Prayer**

### Key Takeaways:

## **Discussion Questions:**

- 3. The sermon highlighted the importance of choosing which decree we will live by. What are some practical ways we can intentionally align ourselves with God's decrees in our daily lives?
- 4. Pastor Rob spoke about the favor of God being upon us, like it was on Mary. How does this concept of divine favor challenge or encourage you? How might it change the way you approach your life and calling?
- 5. Discuss the idea of being "pregnant" with the purposes of God for our generation. What do you think this means practically for us as individuals and as a church?
- 6. The sermon touched on the fear and joy that come with responding to God's call. Share a time when you experienced both fear and excitement in following God's leading.

# **Practical Applications:**

1. Commit to participating in the upcoming 21-day fast. Discuss as a group how you can support each other during this time of seeking God.

- 2. Take time this week to reflect on any negative "decrees" that have been spoken over your life. Write them down, then find and meditate on Scripture that counters these with God's truth about you.
- 3. Identify one area in your life where you need to be more faithful in the "small things." Make a plan to grow in consistency in this area over the next month.
- 4. Set aside time daily to listen for God's "decree" for your life. Journal any impressions or scriptures you receive.
- 5. As a group, brainstorm ways you can be more intentional about declaring God's decrees over your families, workplaces, and community.

## **Closing Prayer:**

Thank God for His divine decrees over our lives and ask for grace to align ourselves with His purposes for our generation.

# Discussion Questions - God's Decree

How might understanding our generation's 'God-given mandate' and 'God-given adversary' change the way we approach our daily lives and spiritual walk?

In what ways can we actively choose to live by heaven's decree rather than earthly decrees, and what might that look like practically?

How does the concept of being 'pregnant with the person of Jesus Christ' challenge or inspire your understanding of the church's role in the world today?

What does it mean to offer our 'wandering hearts' to God, and how might this act of surrender transform our relationship with Him?

How can we cultivate a spirit of faithfulness in the 'hidden, secret, and smelly' aspects of our lives, like the shepherds watching their flocks by night?

In what ways might God be calling us to 'move' in response to His decrees, even when it's inconvenient or challenging?

How does the idea of 'favor' from God, as exemplified in Mary's story, apply to our lives today, and how should we respond to it?

What might it look like for us to 'declare the decree' of God in our generation, and how can we prepare ourselves to do so effectively?

How can we balance the 'fear and joy' that often accompany obedience to God's calling, especially when it requires significant life changes?

In what ways can fasting and prayer help us to better hear and respond to God's decrees for our lives and our generation?

# Devotional - God's Decree

Here's a 5-day Bible reading plan and devotional guide based on the themes from the transcription:

Devotional: As believers, we are called to "birth" Christ into our world – not physically, but spiritually. Paul speaks of laboring until Christ is formed in the Galatians. How are you allowing Christ to be manifested through your life? Consider areas where you need to yield more fully to His indwelling presence. Pray for God to use you as a vessel, bringing His light and love to those around you.

### Day 4: Responding to Heaven's Call

Reading: Esther 4:12-17

Devotional: Like Esther, we are alive "for such a time as this." God has positioned us strategically in this generation. What "decrees" or callings has God placed on your life? Are there areas where fear or comfort are holding you back from fully responding? Remember, God's grace is sufficient for the task He's given you. Take a step today towards embracing your divine assignment, trusting in God's empowering presence.

### **Day 5: Declaring God's Decrees**

Reading: Job 22:21-28

Devotional: Our words have power when aligned with God's truth. As we conclude this week, focus on the authority we have in Christ to declare God's promises over our lives and circumstances. Are there negative words or diagnoses you've accepted as truth? Replace

them with God's decrees of life, health, and purpose. Spend time in prayer, boldly proclaiming God's Word over your situations, family, and community. Let faith arise as you partner with heaven's declarations.
