# **Key Background**

<ul> <li>Joshua continues the story after the death of[1]</li> </ul>			
• Israel is camped on the [2] of Moab, east of the Jordan			
• The book shows the transition from Moses to[3] and from promise to fulfillment.			
Author and Date			
• Traditional view: written by [4], Moses' assistant.			
<ul> <li>Final editorial details may have been added by a priestly scribe (Eleazar or Phinehas).</li> </ul>			
• Events took place around [5] BC (early date view).			
Historical Background			
• Canaan was a land of fortified[6]-states.			
• Fortified cities: Jericho, Ai, Hazor; peoples: Canaanites, Amorites, Hittites, Hivites, Jebusites (Josh. 3:10).			
• Culture was steeped in idolatry, violence, and child[7].			
• God judged the Amorites after 400 years of [8]			
• Rahab's deliverance shows God's [9] to those who repent.			
Geography & Key Locations			
• Crossing the [10] River (mirrors Red Sea).			
<ul> <li>Jericho, Ai – first conquests; Mount Ebal/Gerizim – covenant renewal.</li> </ul>			
• Shiloh – tabernacle set up; Shechem – covenant renewal at the end.
