Response Time


Each Sunday service, after the message, we have a time of response to God. We invite you to engage in worship through some tangible ways throughout our worship space.

Message Notes

Sermon Passages: 2 Corinthians 3:7-18.



Shared Engagement and Preparation

The Compass is a daily devotional and study guide for individuals, families, and Base Camps. The Compass has Biblical reflections for each day, beginning on Monday and leading up to Sunday, which will help us all meditate on the week's passage. In this way, the whole of the church engages in God's Word and prepares for our time of worship and preaching.

Deep Engagement and Doable Application

In order to allow for deep impact by God through His Word, The Compass centers on one passage in three ways — as individuals, with others, in our corporate gatherings — and focuses on applying what God is showing us. Life transformation happens when God's people depend upon and live out what He has revealed to us in His Word.

Consistency Over Time

With a tool such as The Compass, we can mistakenly measure personal spiritual success or failure based on whether we've completed a given day's reflection. Instead, use The Compass as a resource for individual and community growth. If you miss a few days, move on, pick it up from the next day, and seek maturity — God will honor this.

Our prayer is that God will bless you as you seek to connect intimately with Him, intentionally with His people, and influentially in His world.

The Compass Passages for 7/04/16 – 7/09/16: Genesis 6-9:17

Monday, July 4, 2016

Read: Genesis 6-8.

Reflect:

We will study the well-known story of Noah and the flood this week. Funny movies, children's toys, and nursery decorations have all been fashioned after the story of Noah. Rather than being a story about God destroying most of mankind, it's become rather a cartoon. Perhaps this scripture is so well-known by you that it has lost deep meaning. Examine its inmost meaning this week.

From your reading of Gen 6-8 today, compose two or three fresh truths about <u>God</u> revealed by this story.

Reflect on the nature of mankind depicted in the flood story (vv 5-6). How do you compare to mankind at that time?

How could it happen that "every inclination of the thoughts of his heart was only evil all the time?" Also see Genesis 8:21.

What sets you apart today—like Noah?

What transforming thoughts and/or actions were revealed to you today, and how might you put them into practice?

This is an easy story to bring up in conversation. Choose a friend and ask their thoughts about the flood story. Try to share any new or renewed truths.

Tuesday, July 5, 2016

Read: Genesis 6, Hebrews 11:7.
Reflect: Consider Noah's character. Was he sinless? How could he be called righteous and blameless?
What motivated Noah to be obedient to God?
What motivates your obedience to God? How can you increase your motivation to obey?
What's the cost of obeying God?
What transforming thoughts and/or actions were revealed to you today, and how might you put them into practice?
What opportunity might you have to be like Noah? Pray and ask for prayer from a friend as you consider your obedience to God.

Wednesday, July 6, 2016

Read: Review the story of Noah and the flood in Genesis 6-7; read Genesis 8 - 9:19 and 1 Peter 3:20-22.

Reflect:

Throughout scripture, we read stories of man's sin contrasted with God's salvation from sin. Two examples—the thief on the cross and the story of Zacchaeus. Noah and the flood story have these sin and salvation elements, as well.

List some other Bible stories or passages of scripture that also point to sin and tell of God's salvation.

The ark was deliverance in this story. Journal how you also have been delivered.

Did anyone "build an ark," so to speak, that delivered you?

What transforming thoughts and/or actions were revealed to you today, and how might you put them into practice?

Although Christ alone brings salvation by His death and resurrection, with the Spirit's guidance, you can "build an ark" when you share that gospel message. Consider how you might, out of obedience, "build an ark" for someone else's deliverance. Take the first step of ark-building this week.

Thursday, July 7, 2016

Read: Genesis 9:1-17; Hebrews 7:22 and 9:15.

Reflect:

Look specifically at 9:9-17. God is making a covenant promise to Noah and all of creation. What does this covenant promise say about God's character?

Does this covenant have any conditions?

How is this covenant with Noah like the "new covenant" instituted in Christ? (Hint: Who makes the promises and who meets the conditions?)

What are the conditions of the "new covenant?"

What transforming thoughts and/or actions were revealed to you today, and how might you put them into practice?

God's deliverance of Noah's family, and God's promise to never again destroy the earth by flood are evidence of His mercy and grace. In discussing the flood with a friend this week, find the opportunity to share mercy and grace.

Friday, July 8, 2016

Read: Genesis 6-8; John 10:27 and Hebrews 11:7.

Reflect:

Consider again Noah's obedience. Put yourself in his shoes, if you can. When God spoke to Noah, how would Noah have known it was God's voice?

How do you know God's voice?

What steps can you take to be more familiar with God's voice?

Noah's grandfather, Methuselah, was destined to die outside the ark—as were many of Noah's cousins and aunts and uncles. How or why would Noah take such great risk and obey, when people close to him might ridicule him or be excluded in the plans for the ark?

Why do you obey when it comes at great cost?

What transforming thoughts and/or actions were revealed to you today, and how might you put them into practice?

Pray that God would lead you to live and to believe like Noah and the rest of the "great cloud of witnesses", discussed in Hebrews 11 and 12.

Saturday, July 9, 2016

Read: Genesis 7 - 9:1-17.

Reflect:

If you had to retell the story of Noah and the flood, how would you give it proper focus? Is it an adventure? An epic action Bible story? A fantastic tale about tame animals and a giant flood? A story of family? What is the central message of Noah and the flood?

Although all these story possibilities may at times seem off-point, how are all elements--adventure, action, tame animals, a flood and family—still relevant to the central message about man's sin and God's grace and mercy?

What transforming thoughts and/or actions were revealed to you today, and how might you put them into practice?

Thank God for this familiar, poignant story from early scripture, where you hear of God's judgment over sin and His deliverance and salvation—a story you likely heard early in your life. Pray God imprints the gospel message of the flood on your heart as you worship tomorrow.

Building Our Base Camp Family

This is week two of our suggested four-week pattern for Base Camps: intergenerational, <u>adult study</u>, mixed, invitation/service.

Preparation: Print copies of and prepare to sing "Children of the Lord" aka "The Arky, Arky Song" from http://www.songsforteaching.com/religious/biblesongs/noahsark/arkyarky.htm; if you don't know the tune, Youtube has a version.

Intergenerational: Read Genesis 6:9-22. Ask children to tell the rest of the story: the flood and God's promise. Sing "Children of the Lord" together and let them know they will return to the adult group toward the end of the Base Camp gathering.

Adult Study:

- If needed, give group members 10-15 minutes to read Genesis 6:9-8:22. Review the Compass, and consider the question: What would you desire grade school-aged children (yours or others) to understand from the flood story? List the top three below:
 - 1.
 - 2.
 - 3.
- Read Genesis 8:20-22.
 - 1. What had to happen in order for Noah to make his offering? When God smelled the aroma, what did He conclude? What promise did He make?
 - 2. The text doesn't say why God chose to "never again curse the ground because of man." What might be the reason God made this choice?
- 3. Read Genesis 9:1-17 and Genesis 1:28-31.
 - 1. What is common between these passages? What is the significance for your daily life?
 - 2. What has changed? What is revealed about how God sees life, values mankind, and predicts the sacrificial system? Is there a picture of Christ in this?
- 4. Review question 1, modify if needed, and invite children to join you. Share the lessons, and invite the children to be among adults in prayer.


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Mission and Vision
