
Serving Opportunities

Shared Engagement and Preparation

The Compass is a daily devotional and study guide for individuals, families, and Base Camps. The Compass has Biblical reflections for each day, beginning on Monday and leading up to Sunday, which will help us all meditate on the week's passage. In this way, the whole of the church engages in God's Word and prepares for our time of worship and preaching.

Deep Engagement and Doable Application

In order to allow for deep impact by God through His Word, The Compass centers on one passage in three ways—as individuals, with others, in our corporate gatherings—and focuses on applying what God is showing us. Life transformation happens when God's people depend upon and live out what He has revealed to us in His Word.

Consistency Over Time

With a tool such as The Compass, we can mistakenly measure personal spiritual success or failure based on whether we've completed a given day's reflection. Instead, use The Compass as a resource for individual and community growth. If you miss a few days, move on, pick it up from the next day, and seek maturity—God will honor this.

Our prayer is that God will bless you as you seek to connect intimately with Him, intentionally with His people, and influentially in His world.

The Compass Passages for November 28-December 3, 2016:

Joshua 7-8

Monday, November 28, 2016

Read: Joshua 1–3, and review your Compass for the first weeks of this series.

Reflect:

Joshua 1: What did God promise to the people of Israel? Did God promise victory or defeat? How does Joshua 1:9 summarize what the Israelites could expect in their future?

Joshua 2: What was the report of the spies to Joshua (Joshua 2:24)? What was one way God started to fulfill the promises stated in chapter 1? Was the spies' report encouraging or discouraging to Joshua and Israel?

Joshua 3: What were the people to do prior to crossing the Jordan? What does it mean to consecrate oneself? What was the miracle that allowed Joshua and the Israelites to cross the Jordan? Would this encourage or discourage God's people? Would it encourage you? Why?

Read 1 Corinthians 7:23. Reflect on the above. Ask God to deepen your confidence in His love, and ask Him to speak to you about what it means to be chosen in Christ Jesus.

Tuesday, November 29, 2016

Read: Joshua 4–6, and review your Compass for the first weeks of this series.

Reflect:

Joshua 4: The people were asked to make a memorial. What was this memorial to be? How was it to function? How did this affect Joshua's reputation in the eyes of God's people?

Joshua 5: Why would the men need to be circumcised? What covenant did this renew? What does Joshua 5:9 signify to the sons and daughters of those who were once in Egyptian captivity? Some scholars think that the altar set up by Joshua (Joshua 8:30) was essentially at or near Gilgal. What might be the significance that the first Passover and subsequent sacrifices were made here—right after God's deliverance of His people into the Promised Land? What was holy about the spot where Joshua and the people of God stood?

Joshua 6: What confidence might the people of God have had when God sent them to defeat Jericho? What do you think of the unconventional way God provided defeat? Who would get credit for Jericho's defeat: Joshua, the soldiers of Israel, or God? Why? What did God command them to do with the spoils (Joshua 6:18–19)? Did the spies keep their word to Rahab (Joshua 2:12–13)? What would you expect to happen next?

Read Romans 8:31-39. What should be a believer's orientation toward challenges, opportunities, and coming events? What should be your attitude toward fulfilling the evangelism of the world? Of your neighbors, family, and friends? What is your expectation of what God has called you to do? Why? Spend time in conversation with God about this reality.

Wednesday, November 30, 2016

Read: Joshua 6:18-19 and Joshua 7:1.

Reflect:

- 1. In your opinion, what motivated Achan to defy God's command and take some of the spoil?
- 2. How can believers make obvious and egregious choices to sin even when God is clear and is providing?
- 3. Have you ever failed God in such a way? What was in your heart and mind when you made that choice, acting defiantly?
- 4. What can believers do to find God's mercy in such cases? Are there areas in which you need to seek His mercy?

Sometime this week, share your answer to question 2. Discuss how Christians are to avoid such choices.

Thursday, December 1, 2016

Read: Joshua 7:2-9.

Reflect:

- 1. Given the report of the first spies (Joshua 2:24), what might Joshua have expected to hear from these new spies? Did Joshua know of Achan's sin when he sent the spies? What do these disparate realities suggest to you as a believer?
- 2. Because of the spies' report, of what did Joshua begin to accuse God? How does this caution you against condemning God?
- 3. Read Joshua 7:10-26, Proverbs 9:10, and Luke 12:5.
 - Do believers sometimes imagine they're getting away with sin? Is this ever true? Why or why not? Is there a sin you sometimes imagine you're getting away with? What does this do to your soul?
 - Why was the place of this deception called "The Valley of Achor"?
 - How can this passage serve as a corrective?
 - What might full repentance look like for you? Journal your thoughts.

Friday, December 2, 2016

Read: Joshua 8:1-17.

Reflect:

- 1. What did God promise would happen? What reminder did God give? When God declares things twice, what does that signify to you about your unfaithfulness? About His faithfulness? About how serious He is about His promises and warnings?
- 2. What is similar between the first attack on Ai (7:1–5) and this attack? What is different?
- 3. Where was Joshua in the first attack? In this attack? What might that say about your leadership risks and obediences?
- 4. Return to a promise God made to you that hasn't completely been fulfilled. Seek God's counsel on how He will fulfill it. Rest with the Lord, asking, "How am I to overcome failure, Father?" Journal this along with your repentance (see Thursday's notes).

Saturday, December 3, 2016

Read: Joshua 8:18–29 and 2 Chronicles 7:14.

Reflect:

- 1. What position did Joshua hold during the battle? What is the significance?
- 2. Why did God command Israel to completely destroy Ai and kill its inhabitants? What happens when you don't completely wipe out temptation, unruliness, or sin from your life?
- 3. Does this seem extreme by today's standards of war? What is similar to or different from war your country might be involved in? What might you do differently than the nation of Israel in Ai?
- 4. Read Joshua 8:30-35 and Joshua 1:6-8.
 - Why might God command an altar of uncut stone? In this altar, whose work is honored?
 - Why was a copy of the law of Moses made by Joshua?
 Might this be another covenant renewal ceremony? Do you need to renew your covenant with the Lord? How can you do that today?
 - What does reading all the words of the law do for God's people? Who needs to hear God's instructions?

Building Our Base Camp Family

This is week one of our suggested four-week pattern for Base Camps: <u>intergenerational</u>, adult study, mixed, invitation/service.

Allow kids to recognize their heroes, whether these heroes are real people or superheroes from movies. Use a board or large paper to write down answers. Invite younger kids to draw pictures of their heroes during discussion (either up front on a board or on paper).

Group Discussion:

- 1. Who are some of your heroes?
- 2. What makes a good hero?
- 3. Who are some heroes from the Bible?

The hero in our Bible story today is Joshua. What makes him a hero? He served God with his whole heart and obeyed God's instructions. God said to Joshua, "Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go" (Joshua 1:9). Joshua encouraged the people as God had encouraged him: "Just be strong and brave." Joshua was a good leader.

After Joshua led the Israelites across the Jordan River, they came to the city of Jericho. Jericho had high walls around it and the gates were shut tight because the people were afraid of the Israelites. But the Lord said to Joshua, "See, I have given Jericho into your hand, with its king and mighty men of valor. You shall march around the city, all the men of war going around the city once. Thus shall you do for six days. Seven priests shall bear seven trumpets of rams' horns before the ark. On the seventh day you shall march around the city seven times, and the priests shall blow the trumpets. And when they make a long blast with the ram's horn, when you hear the sound of the trumpet, then all the people shall shout with a great shout, and the wall of the city will fall down flat" (Joshua 6:2–5). Joshua did as the Lord told him, and the Israelites captured Jericho.

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
