Response Time


Each Sunday service, after the message, we have a time of response to God. We invite you to engage in worship through some tangible ways throughout our worship space.

Message Notes

Sermon Passage: 2:13-14 (ESV).



Shared Engagement and Preparation

The Compass is a daily devotional and study guide for individuals, families, and Base Camps. The Compass begins devotions on Monday and leads up to the Sunday which will focus on the week's passage. In this way, the whole of the church engages in God's Word and prepares for our time of worship and preaching.

Deep Engagement and Doable Application

In order to allow for deep impact by God through His Word, The Compass centers on one passage in three ways — as individuals, with others, in our corporate gatherings — and focuses on applying what God is showing us, not biblical information itself. Life transformation happens when God's people depend upon and live out what He has revealed to us in His Word.

Consistency Over Time

With a tool such as The Compass, we can mistakenly measure personal spiritual success or failure based on whether we've completed a given day's devotion. Rather, use The Compass as a resource for individual and community growth. If you miss a few days, move on and seek growth; God will honor this.

Our prayer is that God will bless you as you seek to connect intimately with Him, intentionally with His people, and influentially in His world.

The Compass Passages for 12/28/15–1/2/15: Luke 2:13-14 (ESV):

And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased!"

Monday, December 28, 2015

Read: Luke 2:13-14.

Reflect:

In the angels' praise, they proclaim peace. What did this "peace" mean to the shepherds and the people of that time?

List ways in which Christ brings peace.


Record several areas (times, places, issues), where peace is elusive or hard to find in your life.

Why is peace elusive in these areas?

What transforming thoughts and/or actions were revealed to you today, and how might you put them into practice?

The angel's proclamation of peace was for those "on whom His favor rests." Those who enjoy the peace of God are set apart from others (exiles) in this world—but on display. Those not in God's favor may be interested in the peace you have. **How would you share with others the source of your peace?**

Tuesday, December 29, 2015



What transforming thoughts and/or actions were revealed to you today, and how might you put them into practice?

What would be an appropriate <u>response</u> to Jesus as Savior, Messiah and Lord?

Wednesday, December 30, 2015

Read: Luke 2:13-14 and Romans 8:31-32, 35-39.

Reflect:

The angels proclaimed that Jesus brought peace, and Paul stated, "we are more than conquerors through him who loved us." Yet, the Jews suffered serious turmoil shortly after Christ's time on earth, and we, today, have daily challenges.

How, then, are you "more than a conqueror?"

How do you claim or lay hold of peace in the midst of turmoil?

How is your peace related to your <u>identity</u> "in Christ"? (Ref. Romans 8:39b and 2 Corinthians 5:17)

What does it mean to be "in Christ?"

How do you become or remain "in Christ?"

What transforming thoughts and/or actions were revealed to you today, and how might you put them into practice?

Great peace may come from the assurance that nothing can separate you from the love of God. How could you outwardly show this great peace to others?

Thursday, December 31, 2015

Read: Luke 2:13-14 and Matthew 2:1-12...

Reflect:

This Sunday is traditionally called "Epiphany Sunday," celebrating Jesus' first appearances as Messiah, Savior, and Lord—the One who brought the peace proclaimed by the angels.

Consider the Magi and their response to Jesus. They were non-Israelites, but were "overjoyed" to see His star and worship Him. They knew and quoted the Jewish prophet Micah.

What is the significance of this story to <u>you</u> today—of the wise men who visited Jesus? How is their example applicable to you?

In many of Jesus's first appearances (and throughout His life), people did <u>not</u> correctly understand who He was. Many Jews were waiting for a conquering warrior king.

Were the wise men seeking Jesus as Savior of the world and "Prince of Peace" (Isaiah 9:6)?

Meditate on who Christ is (and isn't) and ask God for clear understanding of His son. Record your thoughts.

What transforming thoughts and/or actions were revealed to you today, and how might you put them into practice?

The Magi traveled a great distance, risked the wrath of King Herod, brought gifts, and worshipped Jesus. Name actions in your life that would be similar to the actions of the Magi.

Friday, January 1, 2016

Read: Luke 2:13-14, Isaiah 9:6-7 and John 14:27.

Reflect:

There are many prophecies about the Jewish Messiah. Yet Jesus was, and still is, misunderstood—as Prince of Peace and Ruler over David's throne

How is Jesus' peace "not as the world gives?" (ref. John 14:27).

Consider the lists from earlier in the week—areas where peace is elusive and the type of peace you are seeking. How might you revise those lists?

What transforming thoughts and/or actions were revealed to you today, and how might you put them into practice?

Who do you know seeking peace from something that will never bring true peace?

How could you share the "peace that passes understanding?"

Be sensitive to His prodding in this area.

Saturday, January 2, 2016

Read: Luke 2:13-14 (focus on 14b), and Ephesians 2:8-9.

Reflect:

The proclamation of peace here is for "those with whom He is pleased" (ESV), or "men on whom His favor rests" (NIV).

Is the peace of Christ only for those whom God favors or those who are saved? Why or why not?

Why is this an important part of the angel's proclamation?

In what way are you one "with whom He is pleased" or "on whom His favor rests?"

How did you become one who is "favored?"

What transforming thoughts and/or actions were revealed to you today, and how might you put them into practice?

Consider the concept of "on whom His favor rests." Consider how you receive God's favor and the peace which comes with that favor.

How can your words and deeds testify to God's favor and the peace He gives?

Building Our Base Camp Family

This is week one of our suggested four-week pattern for Base Camps: <u>intergenerational</u>, adult study, mixed, invitation/service. Each week will have an intergenerational element (such as the meal); then there will be a focus for the meeting that follows the pattern and is attentive to God's Word and the age mix.

Prepare: Cut out articles from a magazine or newspaper about issues in your community or world that are not peaceful. Be careful with your selection of articles since children will be included in this discussion.

Intergenerational: Begin your discussion with families, using the articles selected. Talk about the lack of peace in many areas of your lives. Ask the children and teens to give examples of times when they have not felt peaceful.

Ask the following questions:

- --Have you ever felt worried about a problem at school with a friend, a teacher, or your schoolwork?
- --What are some things that make you scared?
- --When is peace not in your heart? What causes this feeling?
- --Give the adults time to share experiences from their own childhood; times that were not peaceful. (Children love to hear what happened to their parents as children).

You are in the wonderful Christmas season of celebrating Jesus. He came to bring peace. He can calm you when you are worried or scared. If you look to Jesus and trust Him fully, He will bring a peace to you that only He can provide.

End this discussion reading Isaiah 9:6-8 together. Christmas is a time of peace. You need Jesus as your Savior.


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Mission and Vision
