Small Group Guide: Revelation 5 - The Lamb Who Reigns

Key Takeaways:

- 1. The central image of Revelation 5 is the Lion who appears as a slain Lamb, representing Jesus.
- 2. God's plan for redemption and victory comes through sacrifice and suffering, not domination.

Discussion Questions:

- 3. Discuss the statement: "Evil is only overcome one way. That's by sacrificial goodness." Do you agree? Why or why not?
- 4. How do you reconcile the idea of loving your enemies with the need for justice in society?
- 5. The podcast talks about speaking truth in love, even when it leads to persecution. Can you think of a time when you or someone you know had to do this? What was the outcome?
- 6. How does the example of Erica Kirk forgiving her husband's killer demonstrate the principles discussed in this sermon?
- 7. In what ways might our cultural understanding of Christianity differ from the "upside-down kingdom" described in the sermon?

Practical Applications:

- 1. This week, identify a situation where you're tempted to respond with anger or retaliation. Instead, pray about how you can respond with "sacrificial goodness."
- 2. Practice speaking truth in love. Choose a controversial topic and discuss with a friend how you might address it from a Christ-like perspective.
- 3. Spend time in prayer interceding for those who oppose or persecute Christians, asking God to show them mercy and bring them to salvation.

- 4. Reflect on areas in your life where you might be relying on worldly power rather than Christ-like humility. Ask God to help you realign your approach.
- 5. Look for opportunities to bless someone who has hurt you or with whom you disagree. Keep a journal of how this impacts both you and them.
- 6. Study the life of a Christian martyr or modern-day persecuted believer. How does their example challenge or inspire you?
- 7. As a group, discuss ways you can support and encourage each other in living out these challenging teachings in your daily lives.
