

Under the Circumstances - Part 2

Our circumstances are volatile—things change rapidly, which may leave us wondering whether our ideas about God, the world, and our place in it are misplaced. Worse—well-meaning people may have taken promises from first part of the Bible out of context in order to make it seem as if we can divine the state of God's love for us by how well things are going in our lives. The good news is that Jesus makes it clear that our suffering on Earth is not a sign of how God feels about us— in fact, He shares in our suffering with us, because he endured and conquered shame and death on the cross, giving us the strength to live with hope in a world of chaos.

- 8. How do you understand the statement that Jesus "scorned" the shame of the cross?

- 10. What needs are you experiencing right now? Will you commit to approaching God with confidence this week?

- 12. Do you find it easy or difficult to believe that Jesus is with you in your suffering? How can you keep this reality in the front of your mind right now?
