Pastor Jonathan's 'First Word' Article – August 2025



In the 50's church took on more of the *Field of Dreams* approach to evangelism – "if you build it, he will come." (often misquoted as "they will come"). And it worked – well. The church was the physical location to which people flocked for social interaction and fellowship, as well as to re-focus their life on God. But, I am sure you realize, we are not in the 50's anymore.

The ministry of Jesus, which prompted Followers of the Way (as they were first called) to gather in secret. The meetings with the first disciples and especially the Apostle Paul, was always... always about the kingdom of God – learning how to live and become more like Christ; learning to be the body of Christ in a culture that placed strictures on what you could or could not do. That is the major factor of why Paul's words, through the various letters, seem to contradict. It isn't that Paul was talking out of both sides of his mouth, but with every city comes a certain set of rules – rules that everyone who lives there knows... but typically these rules aren't communicated to the newbies, you were just supposed to know. Paul was telling the people to "play by the rules of the city" because those seeking to persecute Christians did not need an extra reason.

It is not that the church then, or now, needed to be or do different things, but how we go about them must change based on the city in which we live, based on the culture of the geographic area because the culture that surrounds us, dictates (to some degree) what is acceptable or unacceptable. And we must be ready to pivot as the culture changes.

I've been in Littleton 18 months now, and I am still learning some of the known, but unspoken, rules. But being the church isn't secret; following Christ and his mission isn't an unknown. G.K. Chesterton is known for saying,

"Christianity has not been tried and found wanting; it has been found difficult and not tried."

Being a Christian in the world is difficult, but to follow Jesus and his teachings, we must live it through our actions and the words we speak to and with those around us. As disciples of Christ, it is time – right here and now – to follow Christ. I realize this means different things to different Jesus followers... and I am not worried about the differences. None of the first 12 got it right when they were following the physical Jesus to the cross, or got everything right after Jesus was raised from the dead. I do not expect us to get it right all the time.

I do, however, expect us to seek and to strive to be faithful. Without fear of punishment, we must hold one another accountable. God does not expect us to live sinless lives, but to turn from our sin when we recognize it... to confess and, then, repent in order to turn and rely fully on God's grace and mercy and forgiveness, living in ways that reflect how we are empowered by the presence and activity of the Holy Spirit within us. That is what it means, as a sinful human being, to be faithful.

This month, during Western Welcome Week, we have the special opportunity to greet the community within our walls as they voluntarily enter to appreciate the beauty and skill of the quilts and quilters as well as peruse the used book sale. But these are people we do not see throughout the rest of the year... because the community sees the church as largely negative and skeptical. Carey Nieuwhof stated the 'church, often, is a historical building or a community hub for services and events.' Many of our community neighbors see the church as outdated, irrelevant, judgmental, and/or hypocritical.

This perception of the universal church has grown because of Christians who have not sought to live Jesus' teachings. *God's interaction with God's people from the beginning and continuing through today is full of more grace than anything else.* As Jesus followers, we must read God's Word to us, take time to understand it, seek to incorporate Jesus' teachings into our lives, which often means changing how we think or act. And then, we must demonstrate what it means to follow Jesus, as human beings who are flawed and seeking to be faithful, within our every day living interacting with the world around us.

That is the God's Good News the world needs to see (as we live), and then hear (when we speak). We can no longer live cautious or hidden, or in hope that we have a beautiful and friendly church to which people will come because it has been built. People will come because they have interacted with someone (just like you!) who passionately seeks after God and demonstrates a faithful life. Living as a Christian – at any time, even in the face of difficulty – must be tried.

We gather on Sunday mornings to praise God as a community of faith, to interact with God in a place we know God can be encountered. Just as you stop at a filling station to re-fuel your vehicle, church is a place where we unload our baggage before God and are filled once again with God's amazing holy presence. That makes us church. What makes us Christians is when we carry God's holy presence into the world so others can encounter God.



What we do in church as the Body of Christ cannot stay here...

What we do in church as the Body of Christ matters, and therefore it must be carried into the community around us and shared with others.

The church is a beautiful place to gather, to be re-fueled, to connect with one another, and strengthened for the journey ahead, but the community is where the church must go.

May God's Spirit be at work within and through you, especially as you share God's Spirit with all whom you encounter.





The drivers said when the girls got on the buses, they were so thankful for the strangers who had come to save them, they sang all the way to their families waiting for them.

But something I saw one man say who lost both his parents and then stayed to help others, I shall never forget. He said, "I have seen the most beautiful part of this world in this tragedy. If everybody could be this kind to everyone on a daily basis, this world would be an amazing place. If everyone could set aside their differences and just go love each other —— how amazing that would be. It doesn't take much. Just smile at somebody today, just open a door and walk somebody across the street. Be kind. Say 'good morning.' We don't know what somebody is going through each day; nor what that simple act of kindness can mean to another. Please do that for a stranger today —— we never know what tomorrow may bring."

After I heard Blakeley's sermon on Sunday about Jesus "Knocking on our Door," I thought about what this Texas son said. Are we "opening the door" when we hear knocking at First Pres?

May you all remember that each day is a gift —— and an opportunity to be "that person" for someone else.

Minute for Stewardship - Stained Glass Window Update



Exciting News for Our FPCL Community!

We're thrilled to announce that First Presbyterian Church of Littleton has been awarded a mini-grant of \$45,787 from the State Historical Fund (History Colorado) for the repair and restoration of our beautiful south-facing stained glass windows! This grant represents another key milestone in our **Heart and Home campaign**, a two-year renovation effort launched this past February.

Even more heartening: thanks to the incredible generosity of our members and friends, we already have the \$15,263 match required for this grant safely tucked into a restricted church account.

We're grateful to Jeff Colwell, Elder and Finance Committee member, who is leading the charge as grant manager. Jeff submitted the necessary paperwork in early July, and we're now awaiting final confirmation from our State Historical Fund representatives. Once everything is officially approved, our renovation team will begin scheduling contractors and ordering materials—expected to kick off by **mid to late August**.

The following stained-glass windows will be lovingly restored as part of this project:







We are deeply blessed to have such a devoted team of volunteers and a generous congregation supporting this meaningful step forward in preserving the spirit and beauty of our sanctuary.
