BECOMING THE CHURCH

In the early chapters of Acts, we witness not just the birth of the Church, but the ignition of a movement. Acts 2–5 paints a vivid picture of what happens when ordinary people are filled with extraordinary identity, calling, and power. The Holy Spirit descends at Pentecost, and suddenly a fearful, uncertain group of followers becomes a bold, unified community. They preach, they heal, they share, they pray — and the world takes notice.

What stands out most in these chapters is not just the miracles, but the way the believers live together. Acts 2:42 tells us they “devoted themselves to the apostles’ teaching, to fellowship, to the breaking of bread, and to prayer.” This was not a casual commitment; it was a reordering of life and of priorities. They shared possessions, cared for those in need, and gathered with sincerity and joy. The Church was not a place they went so much as who they were. The Church includes a building, but, primarily, is a “who.”

And we need to answer for ourselves and our time:

What does it mean for us to *be* the Church today?

We live in a world that often prizes independence over community, skepticism over faith, and comfort over sacrifice. Yet the call of Acts of the Apostles remains unchanged. The Church grows not primarily through programs or buildings, but through people who embody the love and power of Christ in their daily lives.

Consider this:

A few years ago, in a busy urban neighborhood, a small group from a local church began meeting weekly in a modest apartment. They didn’t have a formal plan — just a desire to pray and support one another. One evening, they noticed an elderly neighbor sitting alone in the hallway. She had recently lost her husband and had no nearby family. They invited her in.

That simple invitation changed everything.

Over the following weeks, the group began including her in meals, helping with errands, and listening to her stories. Others in the building took notice. Soon, more neighbors began to join. What started as a small prayer gathering became a vibrant community marked by care, generosity, and spiritual curiosity.

Not everyone approved. Some criticized their faith. Others dismissed their efforts as naïve. But the group continued, grounded in prayer and love. In time, several people came to faith — not through arguments, but through witnessing a living example of the love of Christ.

This story echoes the pattern we see in Acts.

- In chapter 3, Peter and John heal a man at the temple gate — not for recognition, but as an act of compassion.
- In chapter 4, they face opposition from authorities, yet they respond with boldness and prayer.
- By chapter 5, the apostles are performing signs and wonders, even as they endure persecution.

Through it all, the Church continues to grow — not because it avoids challenges, but because it remains faithful to living like Jesus in the midst of the challenges.

So how can we build and grow the Church today?

First, by deepening our devotion. Like the early believers, we are called to anchor ourselves in teaching, fellowship, communion, and prayer. These are not outdated practices — they are the lifeblood of a thriving Church.

Second, by embracing radical generosity. The early Church shared what they had so that no one was in need. While our context may differ, the principle remains: we are stewards, not owners, of what God has given us.

Third, by living with bold faith. The apostles did not shy away from speaking truth, even when it was unpopular. Our world needs that same courage — not harshness, but conviction rooted in love.


Finally, by remembering that the Church is not confined to Sunday mornings. It is present in apartments, workplaces, schools, offices, and neighborhoods — wherever and whenever believers choose to live out their faith authentically.

Acts 2–5 reminds us that the Church is not built on comfort or convenience, but on commitment and calling. It grows when people are willing to step out, to share, to serve, and to stand firm — even when the world pushes back.

The same Spirit that moved in those early days is still at work today.

The question could be: will we respond?

But having seen your commitment to your trust in God, I think the question is: **how will we respond?**

GOODBYE FROM PASTOR BLAKELY



Dear FPCL family--As you by now know, I am preparing to soon bid a fond farewell to First Presbyterian Littleton, and my role as your Pastor of Christian Discipleship. It's hard for me at this moment to fully express all of my emotions, or even begin to be able to recap all the amazing experiences I have enjoyed while serving our church family over these past four years. FPCL has been a significant part of my life even going back several years before I came on staff. I first began attending in 2018, when Melissa and I were still dating! We had the privilege of being married in the beautiful sanctuary in 2019, with Pastor Cody Sandahl officiating. I then later got to watch as Melissa served faithfully for over a year as the Children's Ministry Director, and began taking a more active role in volunteering in some different ministries around the church. I had the privilege of first coming onto staff back in early 2022 as the part-time Parish Associate, following Pastor Carol Parsons' retirement. A little over a year later, this turned into the opportunity to take a new full-time role as Pastor of Christian Discipleship. And every step of this journey

with our faith family has been spiritually meaningful, and a great blessing for me!

And while I can never fully say thank-you to everyone from our church who has been here to help me, encourage me, pray for me, and serve alongside me in this Kingdom work, I do want to at least express my heartfelt gratitude to a number of different people, and groups within FPCL. First, I want to say a big thanks to all our *leadership—including the staff, Session members, and the various Committee personnel*. In addition, several staff persons who are no longer at the church played important roles in my time here and I wish to acknowledge them. This includes Pastor Cody, who first gave me the opportunity for the part-time Parish Associate role, as well as Pastor Carol, who was so generous with her time during her last weeks at FPCL, giving me the opportunity to make a smooth transition into starting this new role. And then of course there's Pastor Bill Johnson, our well-loved former Interim Pastor, who not only helped guide our congregation during the time between Pastor Cody's departure and Pastor Jonathan's arrival, but also was instrumental in creating the new, full-time Pastor of Christian Discipleship role that I took on in early 2023. I'm grateful as well to all of the other staff people that I've had the chance to serve alongside in ministry at here at First Pres., including Pastor Jonathan Murray, Karen Meersman, Mary Dailey, Elinor Packard, Lydia Cooper, Tracy Eidson, and Joan Lund. You have all helped in different ways to make my job easier, and I appreciate the dedication you've shown to serving our church family.

In the area of *pastoral care*, which has been such a big part of my staff role these past several years, I want to thank several different groups. These include all of you who have served with our At-Home Communion ministry—literally choosing to be the Hands of Feet of Jesus as you've gone out each month to share the Lord's Supper, and engage in a ministry of prayer and presence. Thanks as well to all of the amazing "prayer warriors" who are on the Prayer Chain, and have spent countless others in intercession before the Lord on the behalf of so many. Countless numbers of you from our congregation deserve my appreciation as well for all of the times that you alerted me to different prayer or pastoral needs from members—and on many occasions you took the initiative to respond already to these needs even as you also alerted a staff person. That is the Body of Christ in action! It was my privilege as well while doing pastoral care to be able to visit with many of you in hospitals, nursing homes, rehab centers, and of course when you welcomed me into your homes, always with great kindness and hospitality. Thank you as well for the honor you afforded me of getting to take part in officiating over memorial services, where we celebrated the triumphant conclusion of the faith journeys of many beloved individuals from the FPCL family. I also couldn't forget to mention our special "Windcrest crew"—all of you from the church who live in that wonderful retirement community, and have hosted Pastor Jonathan and I for luncheons, or been present when Rev. Stephany Crosby and I have had the chance to celebrate Communion there at the Faith Place.

When it comes to *Children's Ministry*, first of all, I'm very grateful that I had the chance to first learn from volunteering alongside the best—my wife Melissa, during her tenure on the FPCL staff! I saw, up-close and personal, just how much time and effort she put into crafting Children's sermons, preparing for Sunday School classes, and overseeing Vacation Bible School. All of this had a big impact in shaping how I later approached this part of my staff role. I want to thank all of the many volunteers who've helped me over the past several years with the Children's Sunday School class, as well as with some of our fun outreach events such as the Trunk or Treat! And of course, I can't forget all of the different helpers—adults and youth, who volunteered with areas of VBS, including: supplies shoppers, registration table, team leaders, team leader assistants, crafts station, recreation station, Bible drama, and music! I'm so glad that I get to end my tenure at FPCL by leading one more VBS! Last but certainly not least—I have been humbled and amazed by how much the children have taught me—in their answers to questions during the Children's sermons or Sunday School classes, as well as during VBS week and all of our other outreach events. God speaks through them if we just have the ears to listen, and in the spirit of **Proverbs 22:6**, I can't think of a more worthwhile ministry endeavor than investing in the youngsters who are the future of the church.

Speaking of investing spiritually in the next generations, I have some thank-yous to share as well in regards to my work with our *Youth Ministry*. I so appreciate all of the dedicated volunteers who showed up—sometimes at very short notice when events got rescheduled, and came ready to get involved in all sorts of fun outreach shenanigans with our students. To all of the FPCL youth: we've gone on some crazy adventures over the past several years! From surviving the Reinke Brothers Haunted Mansion, to fun meals at Romano's, from solving escape rooms to treating ourselves at Inside Scoop, getting creative at the ARC Thrift Store scavenger hunts, or competing in mini-golf and bowling, playing hide and seek on all four floors of FPCL, and laughing at everyone's crazy White Elephant gifts at our annual Christmas party—it's been a blast getting to spend time with you! But we haven't just had fun together—I've also had the privilege of seeing you grow spiritually in so many ways—from Confirmation classes, to serving with our Children's ministry, praying for one another, and learning about living your faith out amongst your friends and in your schools. I've had the honor to see you growing into spiritually mature and confident young men and women who are a great credit to our church, and your families!

I also have to mention all of those who have helped out in the various *Community Ministries* that I've been a part of. Our crack team of Welcome Center volunteers have been tireless in their work to be Christlike servants to our friends and neighbors from the community who are in need. And they've been well-supported in this work by the Missions Committee, who has also given faithfully each month to help with the discretionary fund I've used in the benevolence ministry. I'm also grateful to the Deacons for helping to support that fund. To the many people throughout the community who've been recipients of different forms of aid from our church—your dignity, gratitude, and perseverance have been inspirational to me, and have underscored for me the strategic, Kingdom value of FPCL always being ready to serve in the heart of the Littleton community. I'm likewise grateful to several of our other related community ministries that I've had the chance to be involved with over the years. So thank you to all of the amazing Community Dinner team, our Whiz Kids tutors, and our Conversational English teachers, along with the good folks at North Littleton Promise, who've hosted the class.

There's so much more I could say, but I do need to wrap this up, lest I take up all of the space in this month's "First Word"! I just want to say again how much I appreciate everyone at our wonderful First Pres. Your love, support, and prayers for our family have always been made very tangible to me, and over this past month, as I've prepared to say goodbye, the outpouring of good wishes, kind words of encouragement, and messages of understanding and support has been truly humbling for me to experience. I'll close with a Scripture. As Paul prepared to leave one of the beloved congregations that he had served with, the church of Ephesus, he bid their leaders a tearful farewell, and gave them this blessing, which I share now with you, from **Acts 20:32**—**"And now, brethren, I commend you to God, and to the word of His grace, which is able to build you up and give you an inheritance among all those who are sanctified."** God bless you all, and thank you for the tremendous privilege you've afforded me to serve in ministry at First Presbyterian Littleton.

A MINUTE FOR STEWARDSHIP

“ Spotlight on Watkins Stained Glass”

“Let the favor of the Lord our God be upon us, and prosper for us the work of our hands – O prosper the work of our hands!” Psalm 90:17 (NRSVUE)

As we look forward to the installation of our newly restored stained glass windows, the Stewardship Team would like to share a brief summary of a recent *Westword* article by Kristen Fiore (May 12, 2026). The story highlights the remarkable legacy of Watkins Stained Glass — the same family-run studio entrusted with our own restoration. Their generations of craftsmanship, national recognition, and deep commitment to preservation remind us just how meaningful your support has been. The funds raised to care for our sanctuary have enabled us to partner with one of Colorado’s most skilled and honored artisans, ensuring these windows will shine for decades to come.

For more than 250 years, the Watkins family has practiced the art of stained glass, a lineage that began in 1760s England and eventually brought the family to Denver in 1868. Today, Watkins Stained Glass remains one of Colorado’s most influential preservation studios, responsible for creating or restoring many of the state’s most iconic windows — from the Colorado Capitol’s Hall of Fame Rotunda and the Molly Brown House Museum to Evans Memorial Chapel and even Casa Bonita.

Phil Watkins, now 79, is the ninth generation of artisans. Known for his quiet, old-world approach and deep mastery of the craft, he and his wife, Jane, have spent decades restoring historic windows and creating new ones from their Englewood studio, which houses 30,000 square feet of glass. Their work is painstaking: removing fragile windows, transporting them to the studio, disassembling each piece, repairing lead and solder, replacing broken glass, and reassembling the panels with the same care as the original makers. Phil especially loves designing and cutting glass for new commissions.

The family’s legacy is both artistic and personal. Their daughter Kitt once worked alongside Phil and played a major role in restoring the critically damaged Evans Chapel windows, but a severe injury has kept her from continuing the physical work. She remains committed to preservation, now pursuing graduate degrees in planning and historic preservation.

Watkins Stained Glass has contributed to some of Colorado’s most significant restoration efforts, including the Capitol dome’s glass globe and the sixteen Rotunda windows — a project that required navigating scorching attic spaces and century-old grime. For Phil, restoring windows his grandfather may have helped create was especially meaningful.

In recognition of their generations of craftsmanship, mentorship, and service to Colorado’s preservation community, Watkins Stained Glass will receive the

inaugural Sage Award at the 2026 Dana Crawford and State Honor Awards. Though Phil avoids attention, his work — as colleagues note — “speaks volumes,” and will continue to do so for generations to come.

The church is in a good financial position right now due to previous year surpluses and the continued vigilance of the staff to contain costs. The pledged support is less than we anticipated at this point in the year. Member support not pledged and plate cash donations are higher than budgeted but not enough to cover the shortage in pledged support. We do continue to collect Heart & Home donations which will be going out to pay for the air conditioning repairs. The stained glass windows are getting fixed so we paid \$10,260 toward that repair. We do expect grant money to come in to help cover more of those expenses. Thank you for your continued support.

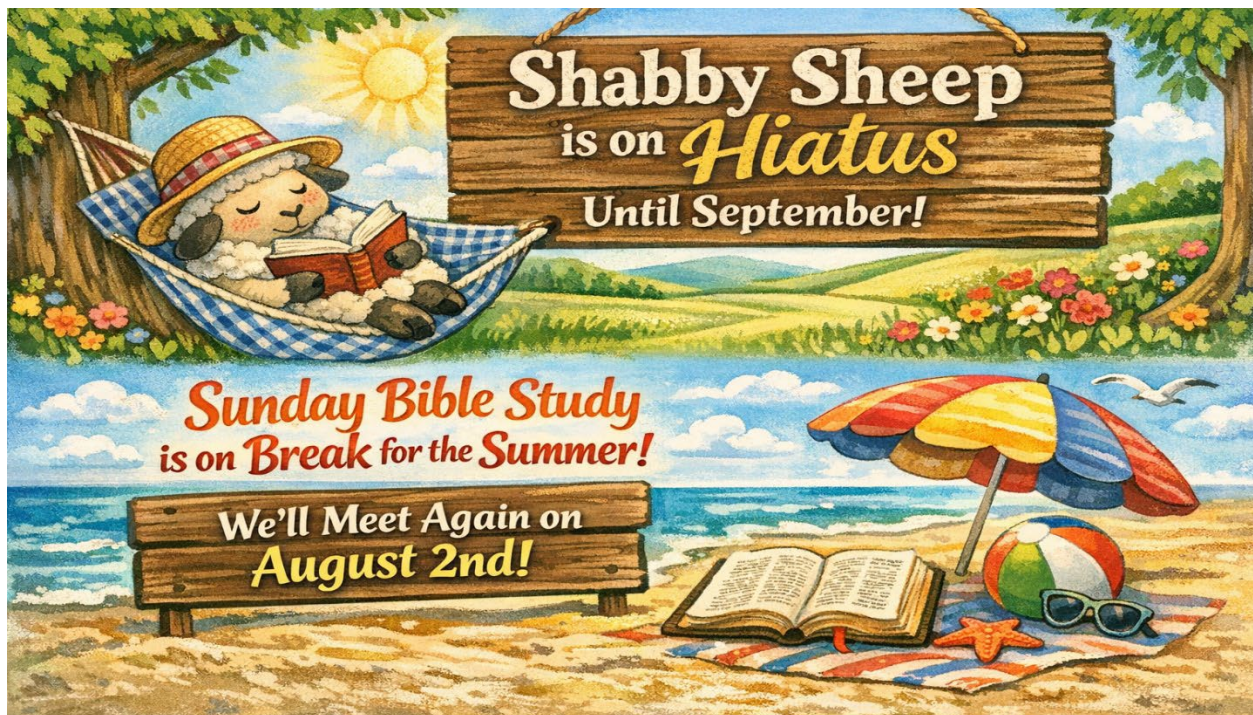
