INTRODUCTION

Any study of the end times is known by the theological word eschatology, which is a combination of two Greek words, *eschatos* (meaning "last") and *logos* (meaning "the word"), thus — the study of last times. People have always found a study or sermon series on the end times captivating. There are probably several reasons for this. Maybe it's the sensational nature of some end time studies or the speculative conjectures that some make, like Russia conquering American in 1976. Wait, change that to 1989. Scratch that — 2001. *Okay, okay, it will happen sometime before the millennium*.

Quite honestly, before I studied the end times in depth I just didn't think covering the subject was helpful. I mean, I just didn't see what practical use it could be to help Christians live for Jesus *today*. Probably, because most of the time when we think of the end times we think of the AntiChrist and the tribulation and whether locusts are helicopters or not or if people will leave their clothing behind when they are raptured. Things in a far distant future that have nothing to do with our daily lives, other than instilling in us a healthy fear to always wear clean underwear. However, the New Testament paints a very different picture of the end times than popular Christian fiction. When Jesus launched His public ministry the world entered into the last days. This means that the life, death, burial, resurrection and ascension of Jesus have as much bearing on the end times as His return. The church is the last days people of God, ministering the reality of His kingdom through the work of the Holy Spirit now. That's the first hint that studying the end times might be practical.

The consummation of the kingdom of God in the return of Christ should have a lot of bearing on our daily lives. Evidence for the practical implications of the return of Christ are the many exhortations the New Testament authors give us "so that you will be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Cor. 4:9), and "that your hearts are strengthened in holiness to be blameless before our God and Father at the coming of our Lord Jesus with all his saints." (1 Thes. 3:13) Their strong faith in the return of Christ had a profound effect on their daily lives. And so it should be with us. Their eager expectation of the coming Christ fueled their desire for holy living. This makes studying the end times much more practical than first thought. What do the end times have to do with how we're living now? Well, if I understand the times we're living in according to the biblical texts — everything. And I'd say *everything* is pretty practical.

John the Baptist proclaimed the coming of the Christ, urging people to be prepared. We are proclaiming the Second coming of the Christ, urging people to be prepared. The authors of the New Testament all agree that we are living in the end times right now. If that is the case, then this study should prove to be much more useful than what speculative charts can offer us. An understanding of what the Bible teaches about the end times covers the past, the present and the future, because the end isn't just near — we're in it.

Our study of the end times begins with the conviction that there is one single plot to the entirety of the biblical story from Genesis to Revelation "that begins with the promise of a Satan-crushing Redeemer in Genesis 3:15 and ends with the 'Hallelujah Chorus' in the book of Revelation."¹ It is a story-line that builds like a fire that starts with a small smoldering stick and ends with a bonfire that can be seen from miles away, one fiery promise about the coming Rescuer heaped upon another.² With that in mind, the gospel of Jesus Christ will be the interpretive grid through which we pray to understand the subject of the end times.

THE GOAL OF THIS GUIDE

The goal of this study is to set a groundwork for understanding the end times. This groundwork will help us understand the details more clearly.

In taking the approach to Scripture that Jesus Himself laid down, that all of the Scriptures testify about Him (Luke 24, John 5), there should always be a conscious effort to ask the question, "How is Jesus central in this?" Nothing is more powerful than the cross of Jesus Christ. If you agree with that perspective as a Christian, then any study of the end times should be viewed through the cross.

It is my hope and prayer that this series, steeped in the Person and work of our Savior, will demonstrate that the teachings of Scripture on the end times were practical for the first century church *which* is what makes them practical for us today.

But true confessions: After spending more time preparing a study guide than I ever have, I'm still not sure it succeeds in accomplishing what any study guide and teaching series should accomplish. I'm not sure it answers the question, *"What difference does knowing this make in my life?"* Maybe that's the question each of you can answer at the end of each week. I'd like more time to hone in on that goal, but time has run out. We must go to press.

If the Lord returns before this series is over, then only He alone will be able to resolve any and every debate we have about the end times.

Amen.

Week One **A PROMISING END** *The Singularity of God's Plan*

There is no question that the Bible teaches that God made covenants with His people, thus we have the old covenant (the Old Testament) and the new covenant (the New Testament). Both of these covenants have to do with God's single plan of redemption for humanity in the Person of His one and only Son. In order to understand the Bible's teachings on the end times, it is imperative that we first understand what the Bible teaches about the covenants and how they relate to one another in God's plan of redemption, because we will find that these covenants are completely centered in everything that God promised to do (past) and has done (present) and will do (future) in Jesus Himself. That is why I use the phrase "God's single plan of redemption" intentionally. There is no plan B, because Jesus has been the plan before the foundation of the world.

The Beginning Plan

The promise of the Person who would one day come and fix this mess we humans created for ourselves begins all the way back in Genesis chapter 3. It's known as the Protoevangelium or "the first gospel." Some have called it "the mother promise," because it gives birth to more promises of the One who would become our Rescuer, the Lord Jesus Christ.

This is the Lord speaking to the serpent, otherwise known as Satan, after he deceived the man and woman who willingly believed his lie and acted upon it, thus inviting sin into the world:

Genesis 3:15

I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and her offspring; he shall bruise your head, and you shall bruise his heel."

2. How would you characterize a bruise on the head as different from a bruise on the heel?

3. Who would the offspring of the serpent be?

Note

The Apostle Paul alludes to this bruising of the serpent's head in Genesis 3 in his letter to the church in Rome.

Romans 16:20

The God of peace will soon crush Satan under your feet. The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you.

4. In a few brief sentences or bullet points, can you list the storyline of the Bible from the beginning of creation to the time of Christ?

The Basic Storyline


Now see if your trajectory of the Bible's storyline followed this pattern:

- God creates man and woman to image (reflect) Him.
- Man and woman rebel (the Fall) and God's image is marred in humanity.
- God promises that One will come to restore His image in humanity and save them from the penalty of their rebellion.
- God calls a people to Himself (Israel) who will reflect Him to the world around them.
- God promises to bring the Redeemer through this people to bless the world and restore His image.
- The Redeemer comes in the form of a baby and images God perfectly during his life.
- *He lives, dies for the penalty of our rebellion and rises from the dead.*
- This gospel hope in Him creates the church, consisting of both Jews and Gentiles who believe.
- The Church now reflects God to the world around them as Christ restores God's image in humanity through the new birth.

An Overview of the Covenants

This first promise of the one to come (the Messiah) is a covenant of promise (or grace). A covenant has simply been defined as "a relationship under sanctions." In the case of a covenant of grace, God himself meets all the sanctions or requirements. This is why it's much different than a covenant of works. We can trace the various covenants in the Bible as displayed in the Redemptive History chart on the following page. (You can't do a series on the end times without tables and charts.)

In the Redemptive History chart, we can see the various covenants that God made throughout the history of redemption. Because all of these promises have to do with one plan for how God would save humanity through the work of His Son, many have concluded that there is really only one covenant of grace and that all the other covenants fall under this covenant of grace. In other words, they further serve this primary covenant of God's plan for salvation.



 Can you offer some biblical evidence as to why the covenant with Adam can be regarded as a covenant of works? (Hint: See Genesis 1-3)

The covenants that come under the covenant of grace fall into two categories, **unconditional** covenants or **conditional** covenants. In an unconditional covenant, God fulfills everything. This is why unconditional covenants are also known as covenants of grace. In a covenant of grace humanity provides nothing, but receives everything. In conditional covenants, God places conditions upon us that we must fulfill for the covenant promises to be fulfilled. This is why conditional covenants are also known as covenants of works, because humanity's obedience is required for their fulfillment.

Below is a chart showing one of the primary Bible verses (there are more) for each covenant and what category (grace or works) it falls under. However, all covenants come under the covenant of grace, because God has one plan of salvation for humanity. I stress this because one of the most popular views of the end times (dispensationalism) teaches that God has two plans of salvation, one for the Gentiles and a separate one for the Jews, which will be fulfilled during the end times. This view becomes problematic when we examine the biblical evidence for it, which we will in detail in the chapters ahead. For now, I will stress that any view of the end times that diminishes the work of Christ as a "once and for all" work as the Bible portrays it, must simply be faulty. The cross of Christ is not just central in the history of the world, it is central in the history of the universe. There is no separate plan of salvation apart from Christ. If there is salvation for the Jewish people in the end times it will be through the same gospel that the gentiles embraced, by grace alone through faith alone in Christ alone. God is not going to reinstitute temple sacrifices in the end times for salvific purposes, because Christ completed the work of salvation that temple sacrifices only pointed toward, but I'm getting ahead of things. Either way, Scripture will confirm or deny it for us, so let's move forward and examine the biblical evidence, beginning with the biblical evidence that God has one plan of salvation for both Jew and Gentile.



The Basic Storyline of the Old Testament in Relation to the New Testament

The covenants show us that the Bible follows one basic storyline about the Redemption of humanity (Jews and Gentiles) and the New Testament is the progressive outcome of this continuing storyline. It has been explained this way: "All that the Old Testament foresaw would occur in the end times has begun already in the first century and continues on until the final coming of Christ. This means that the OT end-time expectations of such things as the great tribulation, God's subjugation of the gentiles, deliverance of Israel from oppressors, Israel's restoration, Israel's resurrection, the new covenant, the promised Spirit, the new creation, the new temple, a messianic king, and the establishment of God's kingdom have been set in motion irreversibly by Christ's death and resurrection and the formation of the Christian church." ³

This storyline can also be seen in the chart below:

Week Two **THE END IS NOW** *The Present Kingdom*

Matthew 6:33

But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you.

And he said to them, "Truly, I say to you, there are some standing here who will not taste death until they see the kingdom of God after it has come with power."

Week Three BERSTLY VISIONS

The Kingdoms Daniel Foresaw

Daniel 7 Daniel's Vision of the Four Beasts

7 In the first year of Belshazzar king of Babylon, Daniel saw a dream and visions of his head as he lay in his bed. Then he wrote down the dream and told the sum of the matter. **2** Daniel declared, "I saw in my vision by night, and behold, the four winds of heaven were stirring up the great sea.

- 1. Let's breakdown the symbolism. Four winds coming from every corner of the earth. What could they represent? (Don't worry. The answers will be supplied below.)
- 2. These four winds stirred up the great sea. What could the great sea represent?

So, the four winds symbolize that what is happening is universal or global. In other words, it impacts world history. Secondly, the sea represents the nations of the world. What Daniel is saying is that the nations of the world were in turmoil. They were stirred up.

3 And four great beasts came up out of the sea, different from one another.

3. Daniel names three of the kingdoms that these beasts represent in Daniel 1:1, Daniel 8:20, and Daniel 8:21. The four kingdoms being referred to are Babylon (the first beast), Medo-Persia (the bear), Greece (the leopard) and Rome (the last beast). How is the

description of the last beast different than the description of the first three beasts in the verses below?

4 The first was like a lion and had eagles' wings. Then as I looked its wings were plucked off, and it was lifted up from the ground and made to stand on two feet like a man, and the mind of a man was given to it. **5** And behold, another beast, a second one, like a bear. It was raised up on one side. It had three ribs in its mouth between its teeth; and it was told, 'Arise, devour much flesh.' **6** After this I looked, and behold, another, like a leopard, with four wings of a bird on its back. And the beast had four heads, and dominion was given to it. **7** After this I saw in the night visions, and behold, a fourth beast, terrifying and dreadful and exceedingly strong. It had great iron teeth; it devoured and broke in pieces and stamped what was left with its feet. It was different from all the beasts that were before it, and it had ten horns.

4. Since Daniel chapters 7-12 parallel the book of Revelation, what might we understand the purpose of these prophecies to be for the people then, along with their purpose for Christians living today? (Don't get bogged down in the minutia, but focus on purpose, which is clearly stated in the verses below.)

Revelation 13

13 And I saw a beast rising out of the sea, with ten horns and seven heads, with ten diadems on its horns and blasphemous names on its heads. 2 And the beast that I saw was like a leopard; its feet were like a bear's, and its mouth was like a lion's mouth. And to it the dragon gave his power and his throne and great authority. 3 One of its heads seemed to have a mortal wound, but its mortal wound was healed, and the whole earth marveled as they followed the beast. 4 And they worshiped the dragon, for he had given his authority to the beast, and they worshiped the beast, saying, "Who is like the beast, and who can fight against it?"

5 And the beast was given a mouth uttering haughty and blasphemous words, and it was allowed to exercise authority for forty-two months. **6** It opened its mouth to utter blasphemies against God, blaspheming his name and his dwelling, that is, those who dwell in heaven. **7** Also it was allowed to make war on the saints and to conquer them. And authority was given it over every tribe and people and language and nation, **8** and all who dwell on earth will worship it, everyone whose name has not been written before the foundation of the world in the book of life of the Lamb who was slain. **9** If anyone has an ear, let him hear:

10 If anyone is to be taken captive,

to captivity he goes;

if anyone is to be slain with the sword,

with the sword must he be slain.

Here is a call for the endurance and faith of the saints.

5. In the verse below, the little horn is small, but it does something. What does this horn do and what might that say about it?

8 I considered the horns, and behold, there came up among them another horn, a little one, before which three of the first horns were plucked up by the roots. And behold, in this horn were eyes like the eyes of a man, and a mouth speaking great things.

6. In the verses below describing the Ancient of Days, write down each description and then give your best estimate of what it symbolizes (two examples are provided):

9 "As I looked, thrones were placed, and the Ancient of Days took his seat; his clothing was white as snow, and the hair of his head like pure wool; his throne was fiery flames; its wheels were burning fire.
10 A stream of fire issued and came out from before him; a thousand thousands served him, and ten thousand times ten thousand stood before him; the court sat in judgment, and the books were opened.

Answer key: head like pure wool = holy wisdom; throne of fiery flames = judgment; its wheels burning fire = sovereignty; stream of fire = holy judgment; the thousand thousands = angels; court sat/books opened = judgment begins

11 "I looked then because of the sound of the great words that the horn was speaking. And as I looked, the beast was killed, and its body destroyed and given over to be burned with fire. 12 As for the rest of the beasts, their dominion was taken away, but their lives were prolonged for a season and a time.

7. The 4th beast is the Roman Empire and it is destroyed. What kingdom takes its place? (See the verses below for a clue.)

The Son of Man Is Given Dominion

13 "I saw in the night visions, and behold, with the clouds of heaven there came one like a son of man, and he came to the Ancient of Days and was presented before him.

8. What is the problem with interpreting verse 13 as the return of Christ? (Think direction or location.)

Clouds are often symbols of appearances of God (theophanies). Note the verses below.

Psalm 104:3

3 He lays the beams of his chambers on the waters; he makes the clouds his chariot; he rides on the wings of the wind;

Isaiah 19:1

19 An oracle concerning Egypt.Behold, the Lord is riding on a swift cloud and comes to Egypt;and the idols of Egypt will tremble at his presence, and the heart of the Egyptians will melt within them.

Exodus 13:21

21 And the Lord went before them by day in a pillar of cloud to lead them along the way, and by night in a pillar of fire to give them light, that they might travel by day and by night.

9. Can you think of any New Testament examples that deal with Jesus and clouds?

10. In light of any of the Scriptures you (or anyone in the group) thought of concerning Jesus and clouds, what event might the clouds in verse 13 of Daniel be referring to?

There will never be an alternative to the salvation found in Jesus.

Signs of the End of the Age

³ As he sat on the Mount of Olives, the disciples came to him privately, saying, "Tell us, when will these things be, and what will be the sign of your coming and of the end of the age?" ⁴ And Jesus answered them, "See that no one leads you astray. ⁵ For many will come in my name, saying, 'I am the Christ,' and they will lead many astray. ⁶ And you will hear of wars and rumors of wars. See that you are not alarmed, for this must take place, but the end is not yet. ⁷ For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom, and there will be famines and earthquakes in various places. ⁸ All these are but the beginning of the birth pains.

⁹ "Then they will deliver you up to tribulation and put you to death, and you will be hated by all nations for my name's sake. ¹⁰ And then many will fall away and betray one another and hate one another. ¹¹ And many false prophets will arise and lead many astray. ¹² And because lawlessness will be increased, the love of many will grow cold. ¹³ But the one who endures to the end will be saved. ¹⁴ And this gospel of the kingdom will be proclaimed throughout the whole world as a testimony to all nations, and then the end will come.

The Abomination of Desolation

25 "Then the kingdom of heaven will be like ten virgins who took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. ² Five of them were foolish, and five were wise. ³ For when the foolish took their lamps, they took no oil with them, ⁴ but the wise took flasks of oil with their lamps. ⁵ As the bridegroom was delayed, they all became drowsy and slept. ⁶ But at midnight there was a cry, 'Here is the bridegroom! Enter into the joy of your master.' ²⁴ He also who had received the one talent came forward, saying, 'Master, I knew you to be a hard man, reaping where you did not sow, and gathering where you scattered no seed, ²⁵ so I was afraid, and I went and hid your talent in the ground. Here you have what is yours.' ²⁶ But his master answered him, 'You wicked and slothful servant! You knew that I reap where I have not sown and gather where I scattered no seed? ²⁷ Then you ought to have invested my money with the bankers, and at my coming I should have received what was my own with interest. ²⁸ So take the talent from him and give it to him who has the ten talents. ²⁹ For to everyone who has will more be given, and he will have an abundance. But from the one who has not, even what he has will be taken away. ³⁰ And cast the worthless servant into the outer darkness. In that place there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.'

The resurrection marked the beginning of Jesus's messianic reign, and the Spirit at Pentecost signaled the inauguration of his rule through the church (see Acts 1:6–8; 2:1– 43). On the other hand, persecution of Jesus and the church indicated the beginning of the final tribulation. This means there is the ironic reality that the kingdom and the tribulation could coexist, to this extent, at the same time. For example, John says in Revelation 1:9 (NASB), "I, John, your brother and fellow partaker in the tribulation and kingdom and perseverance which are in Jesus. . . ." Therefore, the latter days do not take place only at some point in the future but occur throughout the whole church age, which means that we in the twenty-first century are still experiencing the latter days.⁴

Daniel 9

Daniel's Prayer for His People

9 In the first year of Darius the son of Ahasuerus, by descent a Mede, who was made king over the realm of the Chaldeans— **2** in the first year of his reign, I, Daniel, perceived in the books the number of years that, according to the word of the Lord to Jeremiah the prophet, must pass before the end of the desolations of Jerusalem, namely, seventy years.

1. Daniel is referencing Jeremiah's prophecy below. When does Daniel expect the fulfillment of this promise to take place? Explain.

Jeremiah 25:1-11

Seventy Years of Captivity

25 The word that came to Jeremiah concerning all the people of Judah, in the fourth year of Jehoiakim the son of Josiah, king of Judah (that was the first year of Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon), 2 which Jeremiah the prophet spoke to all the people of Judah and all the inhabitants of Jerusalem: 3 "For twenty-three years, from the thirteenth year of Josiah the son of Amon, king of Judah, to this day, the word of the Lord has come to me, and I have spoken persistently to you, but you have not listened. 4 You have neither listened nor inclined your ears to hear, although the Lord persistently sent to you all his servants the prophets, 5 saying, 'Turn now, every one of you, from his evil way and evil deeds, and dwell upon the land that the Lord has given to you and your fathers from of old and forever. 6 Do not go after other gods to serve and worship them, or provoke me to anger with the work of your hands. Then I will do you no harm.' 7 Yet you have not listened to me, declares the Lord, that you might provoke me to anger with the work of your hands to your own harm.

2. Describe the relationship between the Lord and His people according to Jeremiah 25:1-11:

8 "Therefore thus says the Lord of hosts: Because you have not obeyed my words, 9 behold, I will send for all the tribes of the north, declares the Lord, and for Nebuchadnezzar the king of Babylon, my servant, and I will bring them against this land and its inhabitants, and against all these surrounding nations. I will devote them to destruction, and make them a horror, a hissing, and an everlasting desolation. 10 Moreover, I will banish from them the voice of mirth and the voice of gladness, the voice of the bridegroom and the voice of the bride, the grinding of the millstones and the light of the lamp. 11 This whole land shall become a ruin and a waste, and these nations shall serve the king of Babylon seventy years.

3. Now describe the outcome of Israel's disobedience:

The timeline of Jeremiah's and Daniel's prophecies:

- 605 B.C. Jeremiah prophesies Israel will be taken captive in Babylon for 70 years. At the end of this period, Babylon will fall.
- 539 B.C. Babylon falls to Cyrus of Persia.
- 539 B.C. Daniel prays for the restoration of Jerusalem because of Jeremiah's prophecy.

- Gabriel responds to Daniel's prayer with the prophecy of the 70 weeks, at which time there would be a decree to rebuild and restore the temple.
- 538 B.C. Cyrus issues such a decree.
- The decree of Cyrus is both the fulfillment of Jeremiah's prophecy, but the beginning of Daniel's prophecy about the 70 week restoration in Daniel 9:25.

Daniel 9:3-19

3 Then I turned my face to the Lord God, seeking him by prayer and pleas for mercy with fasting and sackcloth and ashes. 4 I prayed to the Lord my God and made confession, saving, "O Lord, the great and awesome God, who keeps covenant and steadfast love with those who love him and keep his commandments, 5 we have sinned and done wrong and acted wickedly and rebelled, turning aside from your commandments and rules. 6 We have not listened to your servants the prophets, who spoke in your name to our kings, our princes, and our fathers, and to all the people of the land. 7 To you, O Lord, belongs righteousness, but to us open shame, as at this day, to the men of Judah, to the inhabitants of Jerusalem, and to all Israel, those who are near and those who are far away, in all the lands to which you have driven them, because of the treachery that they have committed against you. 8 To us, O Lord, belongs open shame, to our kings, to our princes, and to our fathers, because we have sinned against you. 9 To the Lord our God belong mercy and forgiveness, for we have rebelled against him 10 and have not obeyed the voice of the Lord our God by walking in his laws, which he set before us by his servants the prophets. 11 All Israel has transgressed your law and turned aside, refusing to obey your voice. And the curse and oath that are written in the Law of Moses the servant of God have been poured out upon us, because we have sinned against him. 12 He has confirmed his words, which he spoke against us and against our rulers who ruled us, by bringing upon us a great calamity. For under the whole heaven there has not been done anything like what has been done against Jerusalem. 13 As it is written in the Law of Moses, all this calamity has come upon us; yet we have not entreated the favor of the Lord our God, turning from our iniquities and gaining insight by your truth. 14 Therefore the Lord has kept ready the calamity and has brought it upon us, for the Lord our God is righteous in all the works that he has done, and we have not obeyed his voice. 15 And now, O Lord our God, who brought your people out of the land of Egypt with a mighty hand, and have made a name for yourself, as at this day, we have sinned, we have done wickedly.

16 "O Lord, according to all your righteous acts, let your anger and your wrath turn away from your city Jerusalem, your holy hill, because for our sins, and for the iniquities of our fathers, Jerusalem and your people have become a byword among all who are around us. 17 Now therefore, O our God, listen to the prayer of your servant and to his pleas for mercy, and for your own sake, O Lord, make your face to shine upon your sanctuary, which is desolate. 18 O my God, incline your ear and hear. Open your eyes and see our desolations, and the city that is called by your name. For we do not present our pleas before you because of our righteousness, but because of your great mercy. 19 O Lord, hear; O Lord, forgive. O Lord, pay attention and act. Delay not, for your own sake, O my God, because your city and your people are called by your name."

Week Eight **THE GOD OF ISRAEL** *One Plan or Two?*

This makes Israel a type or a shadow of things to be revealed later in the church. If Israel serves as a type, ultimately reflecting what Christ will do for His church, how will that shape our view of prophecy concerning Israel?

4. Now, if that is the case with Israel and the church, this opens up the possibility of understanding God's promise of land to Israel as a type and shadow that is ultimately fulfilled in Jesus Christ also. When it is insisted that the promise of land to Israel is literal, this will force us

into a box as to how we interpret the rest of the prophecies and promises about land. The question becomes, "Which interpretation is most consistent with what Jesus and the Apostles taught?"

Exodus 16:15

¹⁵ When the people of Israel saw it, they said to one another, "What is it?" For they did not know what it was. And Moses said to them, "It is the bread that the Lord has given you to eat.

his uncircumcision be regarded as circumcision? **27** Then he who is physically uncircumcised but keeps the law will condemn you who have the written code and circumcision but break the law. **28** For no one is a Jew who is merely one outwardly, nor is circumcision outward and physical. **29** But a Jew is one inwardly, and circumcision is a matter of the heart, by the Spirit, not by the letter. His praise is not from man but from God.

15 by abolishing the law of commandments expressed in ordinances, that he might create in himself one new man in place of the two, so making peace, 16 and might reconcile us both to God in one body through the cross, thereby killing the hostility. 17 And he came and preached peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near. 18 For through him we both have access in one Spirit to the Father.

This isn't about the church replacing Israel. It's about a New Covenant replacing an Old Covenant. In the New Covenant, Jews who believe in Jesus and Gentiles who believe in Jesus become one entity — the church. The church is now the true Israel, so every promise given to Israel is now given to the church.

What Happens During the Second Coming?

This will help us interpret other end times verses (such as Revelation chapters 19 & 20) that are more difficult to understand.

Revelation 20:11-15

11 Then I saw a great white throne and him who was seated on it. From his presence earth and sky fled away, and no place was found for them. 12 And I saw the dead, great and small, standing before the throne, and books were opened. Then another book was opened, which is the book of life. And the dead were judged by what was written in the books, according to what they had done. 13 And the sea gave up the dead who were in it, Death and Hades gave up the dead who were in them, and they were judged, each one of them, according to what they had done. 14 Then Death and Hades were thrown into the lake of fire. This is the second death, the lake of fire. 15 And if anyone's name was not found written in the book of life, he was thrown into the lake of fire.

John 12:48

48 The one who rejects me and does not receive my words has a judge; the word that I have spoken will judge him on the last day.

8. According to the above verse, when does the judgment take place?

Revelation 6:15-17

15 Then the kings of the earth and the great ones and the generals and the rich and the powerful, and everyone, slave and free, hid themselves in the caves and among the rocks of the mountains, 16 calling to the mountains and rocks, "Fall on us and hide us from the face of him who is seated on the throne, and from the wrath of the Lamb, 17 for the great day of their wrath has come, and who can stand?"

9. According to the verses above, who is hiding and when does this take place?

2 Peter 3:10-15

10 But the day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then the heavens will pass away with a roar, and the heavenly bodies will be burned up and dissolved, and the earth and the works that are done on it will be exposed.

11 Since all these things are thus to be dissolved, what sort of people ought you to be in lives of holiness and godliness, 12 waiting for and hastening the coming of the day of God, because of which the heavens will be set on fire and dissolved, and the heavenly bodies will melt as they burn! 13 But according to his promise we are waiting for new heavens and a new earth in which righteousness dwells.

14 Therefore, beloved, since you are waiting for these, be diligent to be found by him without spot or blemish, and at peace. 15 And count the patience of our Lord as salvation, just as our beloved brother Paul also wrote to you according to the wisdom given him,

Romans 8:19-21

19 For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the sons of God. 20 For the creation was subjected to futility, not willingly, but because of him who subjected it, in hope 21 that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to corruption and obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God.

11. According to the verses in Romans above, when will the earth be restored?

2 Thessalonians 2:1-8

Now concerning the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ and our being gathered together to him, we ask you, brothers, **2** not to be quickly shaken in mind or alarmed, either by a spirit or a spoken word, or a letter seeming to be from us, to the effect that the day of the Lord has come. **3** Let no one deceive you in any way. For that day will not come, unless the rebellion comes first, and the man of lawlessness is revealed, the son of destruction, **4** who opposes and exalts himself against every so-called god or object of worship, so that he takes his seat in the temple of God, proclaiming himself to be God. **5** Do you not remember that when I was still with you I told you these things? **6** And you know what is restraining him now so that he may be revealed in his time. **7** For the mystery of lawlessness is already at work. Only he who now restrains it will do so until he is out of the way. **8** And then the lawless one will be revealed, whom the Lord Jesus will kill with the breath of his mouth and bring to nothing by the appearance of his coming.

12. In the context of the above verses, focus on verse 8. When will this "lawless one" be destroyed? And what does that say about the Second Coming of Jesus?

13. According to the verse below, when will the judgment take place?

Matthew 16:27

27 For the Son of Man is going to come with his angels in the glory of his Father, and then he will repay each person according to what he has done.

14. According to the verse below, list the order of events?

1 Corinthians 15:22-24

22 For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive. **23** But each in his own order: Christ the firstfruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ. **24** Then comes the end, when he delivers the kingdom to God the Father after destroying every rule and every authority and power.

15. What does Paul mean by "firstfruits"?

2 Corinthians 5:15 and 17 says Christ "died and rose again . . . so that if any are in Christ, they are a new creation, the old things have passed away; behold, new things have come." Revelation 1:5 refers to Christ as "the firstborn from the dead," and then Revelation 3:14 defines "firstborn" as "the beginning of the [new] creation of God." Likewise, Colossians 1:18 says that Christ is "the firstborn from the dead" and "the beginning," so that "he himself might come to have first place in everything." In Galatians 6:14-15 Paul says that his identification with Christ's death means that he is a "new creation."⁵
