TWO ASPECTS OF GOD'S SOVEREIGNTY

Decree – "A decree is a decision or order made by an authority."

Providence – "God is an active participant in his world. He governs, sustains, affects, and controls."

WHAT ABOUT US?

The Israelites in Egypt
 God's providential power on behalf of his people
 (Exodus 7-12)

Daniel and Nebuchadnezzar God's sovereignty in the affairs of men, particularly politics and elections (Daniel 4-5)

Jonah
 God's sovereign rule over his creation (Jonah 1-4)

The Sparrows

God's fatherly authority and care (Matthew 10:29-30)

The Conversion of the Gentiles

God's sovereignty in our circumstances, including our salvation (Acts 13:13-52)

Paul in Athens

God's immanent sovereignty in the lives of his beloved (Acts 16:16-33)

APPLICATION Discussion Questions

1) If God is sovereign, can any situation actually be described as, "out of control"?

2) If God is sovereign, what "credit" do we get for our actions, and specifically, our accomplishments? If God is sovereign, what "credit" does he get for our problems, including our suffering? What should our response be in these various circumstances?

3) Idolatry is the opposite of surrendering to God's sovereignty. In what areas of life might we be tempted to exchange worship and service for the Creator for that of the creation?

4) There is no question that God's sovereignty is a mystery to our finite human minds. How can we trust God even when we don't understand him? (Hebrews 2:8; Romans 8:28-29; Genesis 1-3)

5) How should the reality of God's sovereignty impact our prayer lives?
