

## Eph. 2:1-10, Alive in Christ

V1 **Problem**: Dead in sin. Why? Dead set rebellion against God.

V.2 Problem 2: When Adam sinned, we died spiritually. We could only gratify the flesh.

V.3 **The consequence**: our sin places us under God's wrath. If we don't understand the severity of our sin and the consequences, we'll never understand the glory of the His rescue plan.

V.4-5 **The Good News**: BUT GOD. Common theme- (Romans 5:8) **But God** being rich in mercy, but God showing his incomprehensible "love for us in that while we were yet sinners" he died for us.

V.6-7 He then seated us (present tense) in heavenly places to demonstrate his riches toward us. V8-9 How saved? Grace, by faith. Nothing we could do to earn it.

V.10 **2 big errors**: 1. We believe we must **gain enough merit** to add to the cross. **2.** is that good works have no place since we are saved by grace through faith. But good works will follow saving faith. Implications of v.10:

- 1. **Predetermined Purpose**: Adoption into God's family means that life has meaning, and God invites us into <u>his work</u>. We find meaning surrendering our plans to His.
- 2. **Divine Design**: Since we are created in advance for this, I don't determine my meaning, God does.
- 3. **Right Reason**: I engage in his plan and do... not to earn my salvation, but in light of what God has done. The primary question we should be asking is: "what is God inviting me into?"

## **Grow Group Questions**

- 1. Why must we hold firmly to the concept of God's wrath? What do we lose if we minimize or deny it?
- 2. Why is it important to affirm that salvation is not a joint effort between God and men, but that it is all of God?
- 3. How do you see a balance of God's love, holiness and justice as demonstrated through the cross? Why is it wrong to emphasize one aspect of the attributes of God over another?
- 4. Why does saving faith include the evidence of repentance and submission to Christ as Lord? Is this adding works to faith, as some contend?
