Motivation (Why They Need to Know It)

Today, I'd like to take a look at our last value, The larger we grow, the smaller we must grow.

We're basically acknowledging that meeting in a large group ONLY is not enough to form significant, lasting relationships.

What gets in the way of developing relationships?

- Not enough time (or an unwillingness to make time)
- Lack of desire (may hide behind being an introvert)
- Clashing personalities (you don't get along with people different from you)
- Getting lost in the crowd (choosing to be anonymous; not getting involved)
- Negative past experiences (the past, for you, is certain to repeat itself)
- Pride or arrogance (you see yourself as superior to others)
- Unrealistic expectations (developing relationships take time; expect overnight)

The reality is that a failure to develop relationships is a failure to understand God's plan for relationships and the necessity of putting in the work.

- God's trinitarian relationship (Let *us* make man in our image, after our likeness)
- Man's relationship with woman (But for Adam there was not found a helper fit for him)
- Family relationship (Adam knew Eve his wife, and she conceived and bore Cain)

Information (What They Need to Know)

Why should we seek out relationships in smaller environments?

Reason #1: Life seems meaningless without relationships

Ecclesiastes 4:7 (NLT) I observed yet another example of something meaningless under the sun. 8 This is the case of a man who is all alone, without a child or a brother, yet who works hard to gain as much wealth as he can. But then he asks himself, "Who am I working for? Why am I giving up so much pleasure now?" It is all so meaningless and depressing.

- Life is not meant to be enjoyed apart from relationships
- Why work if there is nothing or no one for which to work? *Togetherness in the book of Acts...*

All these with one accord were devoting themselves to prayer, **together** with the women and Mary the mother of Jesus, and his brothers. (1:14)

And all who believed were **together** and had all things in common. (2:44)

And day by day, attending the temple **together** and breaking bread in their homes, they received their food with glad and generous hearts... (2:46)

And when they had prayed, the place in which they were gathered **together** was shaken, and they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and continued to speak the word of God with boldness. (4:31)

When he realized this, he went to the house of Mary, the mother of John whose other name was Mark, where many were gathered **together** and were praying. (12:12)

Reason #2: Life's ups and downs are better with relationships

Ecclesiastes 4:9 (NLT) Two people are better off than one, for they can help each other succeed. 10 If one person falls, the other can reach out and help. But someone who falls alone is in real trouble. 11Likewise, two people lying close together can keep each other warm. But how can one be warm alone?

- They help each other succeed
- They help when one falls
- They help provide comfort (keep each other warm)

Reason #3: Without relationships we are vulnerable to attack

Ecclesiastes 4:12 (NLT) A person standing alone can be attacked and defeated, but two can stand back-to-back and conquer. Three are even better, for a triple-braided cord is not easily broken.

Application (What They Need to Do)

Our goal is to provide a variety of environments to form relationships.

What types of relational environments are available?

- **Bible Minor** relational learning environment around tables
- Food Pantry serving environment where you'll meet others
- Sunday Mornings get here a little early; stay a little later
- Sunday Volunteering serving environment working w/ people of similar gifts
- Mom's Group learning environment with support for moms
- Men's and Women's Bible Studies learning environment with support
- LIFE Groups learning environments with support and accountability
- Events Hot Summer Nights, Game Nights, Special Events, etc.

Here's the thing about these environments - we can provide the structure, but you must put in the work.

I'd like to close with practical advice.

Tips for Relationship Development...

- 1. Take initiative (don't wait for someone to reach out to you take the first step)
- 2. Show that you're friendly ("you must be what you seek")
- 3. Don't require someone to be just like you (you'll miss out)
- 4. Be a good listener and ask questions
- 5. Give it time (relationships develop over time not overnight)
