Scripture:

Acts 4:32-5:11

Motivation (Why You Need to Know It):

Earlier we discovered that the church was <u>aware</u> and <u>active</u> in meeting needs. Acts 2:44 (NLT) And all the believers...shared everything they had. 45 They sold their property and possessions and shared the money with those in need.

I debated concluding with this information, but I think it's important to see this up front as we talk about generosity.

How do we handle generous distribution at The Summit Church?

VALUE: Do for one what we wish we could do for all. Internally – Locally – Regional – Globally

Total Outgoing Missions Money - \$40,000 (about 13% of offerings)

On track to give away \$50,000 this year

- Total Local/Global Missions \$30,000 (support people on 3 continents)
- Food Pantry \$10,000 (serves those inside and outside our church)
 - ✓ 2,137 people assisted (657 families = 841 children, 996 adults, 300 senior adults)
 - \checkmark \$5 per person to provide groceries for 7-10 days

Information (What You Need to Know): Conclusions of the Early Church about Money and Possessions:

- Money and possessions don't belong to us Acts 4:32 (NLT) All the believers were united in heart and mind. And they felt that what they owned was not their own, so they shared everything they had.
- Money and possessions are to be used for those in need (rich and poor in church)
 Acts 4:34 (NLT) There were no needy people among them, because those who owned land or houses would sell them 35 and bring the money to the apostles to give to those in need.

When we talk about money...

- ✓ People who don't have a lot may feel guilty
- People who are comfortable may get defensive (the poor and pastors)
 1 Timothy 5:17 (NLT) Elders who do their work well should be respected and paid well, especially those who work hard at both preaching and teaching.
- People who have an abundance may get prideful

Advice about money -

✓ Take care of family

1 Timothy 5:8 (NLT) But those who won't care for their relatives, especially those in their own household, have denied the true faith. Such people are worse than unbelievers.

✓ Avoid loving it

1 Timothy 6:10 (NLT) For the love of money is the root of all kinds of evil. And some people, craving money, have wandered from the true faith and pierced themselves with many sorrows.

✓ Balance what you keep with what you give

2 Corinthians 8:13 (NLT) ... I don't mean your giving should make life easy for others and hard for yourselves. I only mean that there should be some equality.

Money and possessions of others were distributed through the church leadership Acts 4:34 (NLT) There were no needy people among them, because those who owned land or houses would sell them 35 and bring the money to the apostles to give to those in need. There is a concluding contrast about the condition of a person's heart in generosity (Barnabas vs. Ananias and Sapphira).

<mark>Barnabas</mark>

Acts 4:36 (NLT) For instance, there was Joseph, the one the apostles nicknamed Barnabas (which means "Son of Encouragement"). He was from the tribe of Levi and came from the island of Cyprus. 37 He sold a field he owned and brought the money to the apostles.

Ananias and Sapphira

Acts 5:1 (NLT) But there was a certain man named Ananias who, with his wife, Sapphira, sold some property. 2 He brought part of the money to the apostles, claiming it was the full amount. With his wife's consent, he kept the rest. 3 Then Peter said, "Ananias, why have you let Satan fill your heart? You lied to the Holy Spirit, and you kept some of the money for yourself. 4 The property was yours to sell or not sell, as you wished. And after selling it, the money was also yours to give away. How could you do a thing like this? You weren't lying to us but to God!" 5 As soon as Ananias heard these words, he fell to the floor and died. Everyone who heard about it was terrified.

I believe generosity gets lost when we ask the wrong questions.

It's not, "How much *should* I give?" Instead let's ask, "How much *can* I give?"

If nearly every penny you earn is kept for your family, you're not generous.

Application (What You Need To Do):

Here's some concluding advice about generosity...

- If you lack, receive with a commitment to give in the future
- If you are comfortable, give so it stretches you
- If you have abundance, consider how your money can outlast you
