Read Mark 9:24

In this story, a father came to Jesus begging for help for his son. He believed Jesus had the power to help. But that didn't change the fact that this father had watched his son suffer his whole life. He believed and yet he still doubted that things would actually get better for his son.

We can be like that too. We have faith but that doesn't mean we don't have questions. The man cried, "Help my unbelief" and we can too. God gave you the ability to ask questions, to seek answers, to be curious and to dig deeper.
