#1 Summary

In today's sermon, we explored the concept of 'Righteous Indignation' as part of our Anger Management series. The sermon emphasized that while built-up anger can be destructive, there is a form of anger that is good and necessary—anger against sin, evil, and unjust circumstances. This righteous anger is exemplified by Jesus when He drove out the money changers from the temple. The sermon called for the congregation to wake up to the injustices around them and to act as the 'fire' that God sends to fight against evil plans and persons. It concluded with a reminder that God is still in control, no matter the circumstances we face.
