Introduction

This handout accompanies our virtual Bible Study. Use it to reflect, take notes, and apply God's Word in your daily life.

1. Defining Righteousness in a Corrupt World

Noah was called righteous (*tsaddiq*) — not perfect, but aligned with God's standard. He lived differently when the world lived corruptly.

Supporting Scriptures: Micah 6:8, Romans 12:2

Reflection Question: What does righteousness look like in your daily life? Write down one example.

2. The Responsibility of Righteousness

Righteousness is not just personal but public. God gave Noah a responsibility: build the ark. Righteousness becomes both resistance against injustice and transformation for others.

Supporting Scriptures: Proverbs 31:8-9, Matthew 5:14-16

Reflection Question: What injustice in your community breaks your heart? What's one small step you could take this week?

3. Walking with God Amidst Contemporary Challenges

Noah walked with God. Walking with God means intimacy, consistency, and obedience. It anchors us when the world is unstable.

Supporting Scriptures: Psalm 23:4, Galatians 5:25

Reflection Question: What practice helps you stay close to God? Where do you want to grow stronger?

Application Points

- Stand for truth and justice, even when unpopular (Daniel 3:16–18).
- Engage in community activism mentor, volunteer, advocate (Isaiah 1:17).
- Strengthen your daily walk with God (Colossians 2:6–7).

Reflection Question: Which one will you commit to this week?
