Nehemiah strategically separated Israel from the nations (the unbelieving world).
1 unqualified people from leadership (13:28-29).
2 unclean practices among the people (13:30).
3 the undeserved grace that saves you (13:31).
Jesus and the apostles strategically separate the Church from the nations (the unbelieving world) and call us to:
1. Be in the world but (1 Cor. 5:10).
2. Be for the world by being (Col. 4:5–6).
3. Exclude the world to (1 John 2:15–16).

4. Love the world though \_\_\_\_\_\_ (Jn. 3:16; 15:18–19).
