WEEK TWO

DAY 1

1. Read John 14:26.
2. According to this verse, Jesus promised that the Holy Spirit would help teach us and help us understand all things relating to God and Scripture. Take a moment to begin your study time in prayer, asking that the Holy Spirit would do so.
3. Slowly read through Matthew 6:5-18. Which part sticks out the most to you? What are you challenged by? What questions do you have about these verses? Where does Matthew 6:9 say our Father is?
4. Read Psalm 11:4; Isaiah 66:1. Where, according to these verses is God's throne?
5. Scripture gives us a picture of God's throne in Daniel 7:9-10, Revelation 4:2-6 and Revelation 22:1. Describe God's throne as best you can in human terms:
6. Write out this week's memory verse on a notecard or a piece of paper and post it somewhere you will see it often (e.g bathroom mirror, car, desk, kitchen sink, etc.).

DAY 2

1. Begin your study time with prayer.
2. While it is hard to fully comprehend what heaven will be like, the Bible does give us some insight into it. Read Revelation 21 and Revelation 22:1-9. Describe some of what is written about heaven below:
3. As we walk through difficulties here on earth, it is easy to become weary and tired. Which part about heaven is most encouraging to you?
4. When you are weary and tempted to quit, bring these verses to your mind to encourage yourself that this world, as broken as it may be, is not our eternal home. One day the brokenness will be redeemed and sorrow will be no more!
5. Continue to lift up your specific prayer request to the Lord and write out this week's memory verse below:

DAY 3

1. Begin your study time with prayer.
 2. According to the following verses, who else is in heaven? See Job 1:6; Hebrews 12:2, 22-24; Revelation 1:4; Revelation 4:5-11, 5:6-14; 7:9-17.
 3. What are the angels, the elders and the saints doing in heaven? (Please note, according to Scripture the saints are any and all who have trusted in Jesus Christ as their Savior and who, by His blood, have been washed clean of sin and have been declared holy by His sacrifice. (See 1 Corinthians 1:2; Philippians 4:21, Ephesians 2:19, 4:12 & 5:3).
 4. We see those in heaven giving God reverence for who He is and what He has done. Is worship and reverence a part of your regular prayer life? Read Psalm 8 and take time to reflect on the majesty of God and to worship and praise Him for it.
 5. Continue to lift up your specific prayer request to the Lord and write out this week's memory verse below:
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DAY 4

1. Begin your study time with prayer.
2. Read 2 Chronicles 16:9; Job 28:24; Psalm 11:4; 20:6; 33:13 & 18-20; 47:8 & 103:19. What are some of the things God is doing on His throne in heaven?
3. What does Psalm 9:7 tell us God has established His throne for?
4. Revelation 20:11-15 describes what is known as the "Great White Throne Judgment" that will take place at the end of all things. According to these verses and Revelation 21:23-27 what determines whether we are cast into the lake of fire or are granted entrance into the holy city, or heaven?
5. Revelation 13:8 tells us that the book belongs to the "Lamb who has been slain" for our sins, which is Jesus Christ (John 3:16, 1 Peter 1:18-19 & 1 John 2:2). Read John 14:6, Acts 4:12 and Acts 16:29-31 and Romans 10:9. How are we saved and our names recorded in the Lamb's book of life? Have you done this?
6. Continue to lift up your specific prayer request to the Lord and write out this week's memory verse below:

DAY 5

1. Begin your study time with prayer.
2. Yesterday we studied that God's throne is one of justice and of judgment. How else does Hebrews 4:16 describe God's throne?
3. How does Hebrews 4:14-16 describe Christ and where, according to Hebrews 8:1 is He seated?
4. What, according to 1 Timothy 2:5-6 and 1 John 2:1 is Christ's role in these verses?
5. A mediator or an advocate serves to reconcile two parties to each other. Our relationship with God was broken when mankind sinned and we lost direct access to the Father as a result (Genesis 2; Isaiah 59:1-2; Romans 3:10). Through Christ's death He has reconciled us to God (Colossians 1:19-22) so we may once again have access to Him through Christ as our mediator or advocate. Take a moment to thank Jesus Christ for His work on the cross that reconciled you to God and grants you the right to come boldly before the throne of grace as His child.
6. Continue to lift up your specific prayer request to the Lord and write out this week's memory verse below:
