ICEBREAKER

DIG A LITTLE DEEPER

- 1. Review the message
 - a. Paul planted the church in Corinth after being abused by Jewish leaders in the synagogues
 - b. The culture surrounding the Corinthian church was hostile to their faith
 - c. Even though the church was a morality mess God still calls them "holy."
 - d. We manage the tension of our sin and God's love by focusing on his faithfulness.

2. Read Acts 18:1-11

- a. As you read through the account of Paul planting a church in Corinth what obstacles do you see Paul facing?
- b. Why do you think the Jews were so hostile towards Paul? Why do you imagine Titus Justus and his household were more receptive?
- c. After going through what Paul went through what type of relationship do you think Paul had with the church of Corinth when he left?

3. Read Acts 18:12-19

- a. The environment surrounding the church in Corinth was obviously very hostile towards Christians and their message. What do you think it would be like to be a Christian during that time? In what ways would you struggle to stay committed to your faith?
- 4. Read 1 Corinthians 1:1-9
 - a. How do you think Paul feels about the church in Corinth based on these verses?
 - b. Read through verses 1-9 again and note what themes you see. What is God doing?
 - c. You may not know this already but the church in Corinth was a morality mess! Why do you think Paul is able to call them "holy" and "sanctified" when there is so much going wrong in the church?
 - d. How do you reconcile in your own life God loving you despite the wrongdoings you commit?
 - e. In verse nine Paul says that God is faithful. How does God's faithfulness help us manage the tension of our sin and God still choosing to love us?
