DIG A LITTLE DEEPER

Review the message -

- 1. Experiencing conflict with others is inevitable, even among Christians. Jesus knew that, and we should, too.
- 2. As Christians, God calls us to handle our conflicts with one another differently. He wants us to model the humility and forgiveness Christ demonstrated through His death on the cross.
- 3. Managing our conflicts in the way God desires shows that we put His wisdom above the world's wisdom, and it points others to Christ.

Read 1 Corinthians 6:1-7, 11

- 1. Why does Paul say believers should not take their disagreements with one another to court?
- 2. Why would Paul consider a lawsuit among believers a sign of defeat?
- 3. In verse 11, Paul reminds us that as believers, we have been washed clean from our sins, set apart by God [sanctified], and made right in His presence [justified]. How should knowing this affect the way we manage conflicts with fellow believers?

Read Proverbs 19:11, Psalm 34:14, Ephesians 4:32, 1 Peter 3: 8-11

- 1. Assign or ask for volunteers to read the passages listed. Before you read the verses, consider the following questions:
- 2. What are some specific actions these verses direct us to take to manage conflicts?
- 3. What actions come more naturally to you, and which ones require more effort?
