- 3. What does it mean to view the church as a community rather than a commodity, and how does this perspective change our expectations and engagement?
- 4. Pastor Brian said, "Show me your friends, I'll show you your future." Who are the people speaking into your life right now? How are they impacting your pursuit of Christ?
- 5. What is an "echo chamber," and how can we avoid creating one in our spiritual lives?
- 6. In what areas of your life do you need to allow God's Word to renovate your worldview rather than conforming Scripture to your preferences?
- 7. What does it look like practically to believe that God has more for you and to avoid spiritual stagnation in your walk with Jesus?
