Suffering Part 3: The Best Love • Job 38-42

INTRODUCTION ● Heb 12:5-11 → Job 38 // The Story So Far

- 1. In our story so far, Job, a wealthy & influential man of the ancient ME, experienced a catastrophic reversal of fortune.
 - a. In a matter of hours his entire fortune is wiped out.
 - b. Then his adult children were killed when the house where they were gathered collapsed.
 - c. Finally, his health went as some illness saw him covered in painful sores.
- 2. This calamity was the result of a debate between God & Satan, given in chs 1&2.
 - a. After God called Job a faithful servant, Satan accused him of having a merely mercenary faith.
 - b. That Job only honored God because it *paid* to // Indeed! God *had to* pay people to serve Him.
 - c. To prove it, Satan said if God removed Job's protection & allowed him to have at Job, his devotion would dissolve & he'd defiantly curse God.
 - d. But God *knew* the quality of Job's faith, so He accepted the challenge.
 - e. & the devil went to work reducing Job to a heap of misery,
 - f. Clothed in rags, sitting on the ground in ashes, covered in angry sores.
- 3. While we know the cause of Job's suffering, *he* had no clue.
- 4. Ch2 closes with 3 of his friends arriving to console him.
 - a. When they first laid eyes on him, they couldn't believe it *was* him.
 - b. So they tore *their* robes, put dirt on *their* heads, & just sat with him in silence for a week.
 - c. What do you say in the face of such abject misery?
- 5. When that week ended, Job began a lament he was ever born to see such trouble.
- 6. That provoked a response from his friends.
 - a. They each took a turn trying to help Job *out* of his misery. The *way* out seemed obvious.
 - b. Their theology said God blesses obedience & punishes sin.
 - 1) Job was healthy & wealthy *before* because he obeyed God.
 - 2) But obviously, he must have done something really bad to see it all taken away.
 - 3) Their remedy was, "Fess-up! Ask God to forgive, & He'll restore your good fortune."
- 7. BUT: Job had nothing to confess. He was innocent.
 - a. When he said as much, it only angered his friends, prompting ever stronger condemnation.
 - b. Which moved Job to an even stronger defense of himself.
- 8. The center chs of the book show Job's *growing frustration* in <u>2 directions</u>.
 - a. One toward the wrong advice of his friends.
 - b. The other toward God's silence.
 - 1) Job *knew* his suffering was NOT punishment for sin, but there was a reason for it, a *good* reason.
 - 2) *How* the calamity came meant its origin was obviously spiritual.
 - 3) It could not have happened without God's involvement somehow.
 - 4) But Job was absolutely convinced God is good & just.
 - 5) His distress came from Heaven's silence.
 - 6) He pleaded with God for a reason, but no answer came.
- 9. Job's defense of his innocence gets dangerously close to an attitude of self-righteousness.
- 10. & what starts as a *request* God explain his suffering *sours* into a *demand* God show-up & answer for Himself.
 - a. Job goes right up to the edge of questioning God's justice.
 - b. It all comes to a halt when God DOES show up.

- c. But the answer He gave Job wasn't what he expected.
- Job 38 // ¹ Then the LORD answered Job out of the whirlwind, & said:
- ² "Who *is* this who darkens counsel by words without knowledge?
- ³ Now prepare yourself like a man; I will question you, & you shall answer Me.
- ⁴ "Where were you when I laid the foundations of the earth? Tell *Me*, if you have understanding.
- ⁵ Who determined its measurements? Surely you know! Or who stretched the line upon it?
- ⁶ To what were its foundations fastened? Or who laid its cornerstone,
- ⁷ When the morning stars sang together, & all the sons of God shouted for joy?
- 1. This is just 6 of 55 questions God posed Job.
- 2. Each of them reminded him of God's surpassing greatness.
- 3. Imagine Albert Einstein walking into a class of 3rd graders, giving them a pop-quiz.
 - a. "Boys & girls," he says, "Clear your desk of all but a sheet of paper & pencil.
 - b. "Now: Describe the Theories of General & Special Relativity. You have 20 minutes. Go."
- 4. That's somewhat of what happened here.
 - a. God says, "Job, you demand I explain what's happened to you. You require a reason from Me."
 - b. "First, Pop-quiz. Explain Creation. How'd I do it? How big is the universe?"
 - c. "How does it all work, Job?"
 - d. 3rd graders would have a better chance of explaining Relativity than Job could answer God.
- 5. As each of those 55 questions came at Job, here's what happened ...
 - a. During the back & forth between Job & his friends, Job got bigger while God got smaller.
 - b. His pain shifted his focus & attention to himself.
 - c. & as his demand for answers became more strident, God seemed to shrink.
 - d. Then, when God appeared & spoke, things began to move back to their proper perspective.
 - e. Job's view of himself became more realistic in the face of God's revelation.
 - f. God, Who IS great, became great again to an ever-shrinking Job.
- 6. Look at v1 of ch 40.

¹ Moreover the LORD answered Job, & said: ² "Shall the one who contends with the Almighty correct *Him*? He who rebukes God, let him answer it."

- a. After all those questions utterly beyond Job's capacity to answer, God says ightarrow
- b. "What do you have to say for yourself now?"
- c. "In light of Who I am & who you are, still think I owe you an explanation?"

³ Then Job answered the LORD & said: ⁴ "Behold, I am vile; What shall I answer You? I lay my hand over my mouth. ⁵ Once I have spoken, but I will not answer; Yes, twice, but I will proceed no further."

- 1. Job's response is a *resigned* compliance; a *reluctant* surrender.
 - a. God still hasn't given him what he wants >> A *reason* for what he's suffered.
 - b. Our translation misses the *pout* in Job's reply.
- 2. God doesn't want our *reluctance*. He wants our *repentance*, & Job's not there yet.
- 3. So God asks another 20 questions.
 - a. Earlier, Job had suggested God could do a better job of running things.
 - b. So God asks him if he has any idea how to take care of 2 massive creatures >>
 - 1) Behemoth & Leviathan.
 - 2) Ancient names for what animals we're unsure of today.

4. But by the time God finished quizzing Job, he's moved from reluctance to repentance.

Job 42 // ¹ Then Job answered the LORD & said: ² "I know that You can do everything, & that no purpose *of Yours* can be withheld from You. ³ *You asked,* 'Who *is* this who hides counsel without knowledge?' Therefore I have uttered what I did not understand, things too wonderful for me, which I did not know. ⁴ Listen, please, & let me speak; *You said,* 'I will question you, & you shall answer Me.'

5. Then, here's the pay-off; our key for understanding the ultimate lesson of the Book of Job >>

⁵ "I have <u>heard</u> of You by the hearing of the ear, <u>but now my eye sees You</u>. ⁶ Therefore I abhor *myself,* & <u>repent</u> in dust & ashes."

- 1. What those who suffer *need*, isn't an explanation. What they need is a fresh look at God.
- 2. We think we need an answer. In truth what we need >> Is Him.

Discipline

- 1. Wednesday night we took a brief look at the causes of suffering & put them in 4 board categories.
- 2. One of those was *Discipline*, what the writer of Hebrews speaks of in the passage we began with today.
- 3. Every parent knows children need correction.
 - a. Some correction doesn't *take* unless the child's *attention* is attached to it.
 - b. That's what discipline aims to do; it *causes us to connect choices to consequences*.
- 4. Parent's discipline because they *love* their child & want her/him to grow up healthy & successful.
 - a. Mom & Dad know if a <u>child keeps</u> making *poor* choices, they become an <u>adult</u> who makes them.
 - b. Discipline steers us away from those things that lead to harm.
- 5. Our Heavenly Father disciplines us into godliness, because that's how life best works.
- 6. But there are *2 kinds* of discipline.
 - a. One is *corrective*. It aims to nip our tendency to sin in the bud.
 - b. The other form of discipline *enhances* us by *adding* something positive; a fruit of the Spirit.
- 7. Peter speaks of this in 1 Pet 1.

⁶ In this you greatly rejoice, though now for a little while, if need be, you have been grieved by various trials, ⁷ that the genuineness of your faith, *being* much more precious than gold that perishes, though it is tested by fire, may be found to praise, honor, & glory at the revelation of Jesus Christ, ...

8. In his 2nd letter, Peter says ...

^{1:5} Give all diligence to add to your faith virtue, to virtue knowledge, ⁶ to knowledge self-control, to self-control perseverance, to perseverance godliness, ⁷ to godliness brotherly kindness, & to brotherly kindness love. ⁸ For if these things are yours & abound, *you* will be neither barren nor unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. ⁹ For he who lacks these things is shortsighted, even to blindness, & has forgotten that he was cleansed from his old sins.

- 1. Being spiritually short-sighted isn't a sin, but it isn't optimal.
 - a. As Peter says, the danger of *staying* short-sighted is the ease of falling back into sin.
 - b. So, we ought to press forward in Christ, wanting to grow, yearning to go deeper with God.
- 2. But the spiritual maturity Peter charts here can't be attained without a challenge, without testing.
 - a. *Faith* isn't genuine trust in God till there's some *risk* involved.
 - b. Virtue is moral courage, which means facing fear.
 - c. The knowledge Peter speaks of isn't book smarts. It's experience.

- 1) Is God good? <u>Correct theology</u> says He is.
- But God doesn't want our knowledge of Him limited to what we read in a book & see in a YouTube video.
- 3) He wants us to *experience* His goodness.

4) & nothing reveals that more than when He Himself steps into our lives.

Psa 34:8 // Oh, <u>taste & see</u> that the LORD *is* good; Blessed *is* the man *who* trusts in Him!

3. This is the place Job came to when he says – [42:5]

"I have heard of You by the hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees You.

- a. Job was taught correct theology & it kept him from cursing God when pain *came*.
- b. But when pain stayed-lingered, he began to wonder if God knew what He was doing.
- c. Then, when God showed up, Job realized THAT was enough. *God* was enough.
- d. Just having God & knowing God had him was all that mattered.
- 4. Job knew God was good, but not HOW good.
- 5. All those questions God asked him moved him to realize <u>the vast scope of His goodness</u>.

Perfected Love

- 1. Back at the beginning, Satan accused Job of having a merely mercenary faith in God.
 - a. That he only honored God because it paid to.
 - b. God knew better and so allowed Satan to have at Job to prove him wrong.
- 2. The real lesson of the book of Job is that God used what Satan meant as Job's demise to take Job even deeper into his relationship with God.
- 3. It was thru Job's suffering he learned something about himself. It was this ...
 - a. While his devotion to God wasn't *only* mercenary, it was partly so.
 - b. There *was* a measure of selfishness to his faith. Loving God *did* pay.
 - c. That lingering bit of self-interest is what grew in the middle chs of the book to bring Job right up to the edge of calling God unjust.
- 4. But here at the end, when he finally sees how great God is, all that disappears.
- 5. An illustration:
 - a. When a couple fall in love, *what* they love is what the other person *does* for them.
 - b. The feelings they create, the joy they bring.
 - c. There's an attraction that promises pleasure for the body & soul.
 - d. They marry, and settle into the challenge of merging their lives.
 - e. Two people have to learn to set aside self in deference to the other.
 - f. In fact, that process manifests how very selfish each of them are.
 - g. To the degree they die to self is the measure to which their new life-together is blessed.
 - h. So that over time, their love moves from what the other person does for them to the person him/herself.
- 6. When we first come to faith, we love God for what He's done; saving us from sin and eternal death.
 - a. Then we love Him for the way He changes us over time into the image of Christ.
 - b. All that's fine and good but it's not the fullness of the love we're destined for.
 - c. God wants us to love Him for Who and what He IS, not just what He does –
 - d. Because! God loves us for who and what we are, not what we can do for Him.
 - e. Let that sink in. → God loves you, not what you can do for Him, but simply because it's YOU!
- 7. As God's eternal companion, it's only right we love Him as He loves us.

The Burglary

1. We take a short detour now. & I begin with a question:

Are you thankful for CCO? >> Keep that in mind as I tell you a story.

- 2. One day in '78, I came home from work to discover the front door of the apartment where I lived alone, ajar.
- 3. Someone had broken into & stolen just about everything of value to me.
- 4. Standing in the doorway, looking at the ruin that was my living room, a voice spoke, as clear as could be.
 - a. It's one of only a few times in my life that I can say I heard God speak. I heard it here, not here.
 - b. It said, "Go."
- 5. I knew what that meant because my boss had asked me to transfer from OC to the Bay area.
 - a. But, Lynn & I had just decided to start dating.
 - b. We realized there was something special about our relationship & were both excited about what the future might hold.
 - c. So I was in a quandary. Do I take the promotion & move North, or stay & pursue this gorgeous & fascinating woman?
- 6. The drive home from work that day was spent asking God what to do.
- 7. Standing in the doorway, I had my answer.
 - a. Moving would be a whole lot easier since so much of my stuff was now gone.
 - b. So I called Lynn to ask her out, so I could tell her the news.
- 8. We decided that we wouldn't let the distance stop the relationship.
- 9. We dated long-distance via the phone. Which was great because we got to know each other really well.
- 10. I eventually asked her to marry me & after the wedding she joined my up North.
- 11. We got involved in a small church that was really into home groups.
- 12. I began teaching one, & right when the church was moving us into more leadership, I got transferred to Oxnard.
- 13. Lynn & I started a home bible study that grew into this, & here we are just shy of 40 yrs later.
- 14. So, I ask again: Are you thankful for CCO? >> **Then** <u>I'm</u> **thankful for that burglary**.
- 15. Because without it, we'd not be here today. & whole lot of lives would be very different, not for the good.

The Best Love

- 1. As Job stood before God here at the end, he said, "Now I see."
- 2. *What* he saw was a good God.
- 3. & I'm convinced that revelation altered his perception of all that happened to him.
- 4. Because now, he didn't just love God for what God did. He loved God for Himself.
- 5. And that love filled Job with a peace & joy nothing could touch.
- 6. God is worthy of our love, not just for what He does, but for Who he is.
- 7. It's that love alone our soul and spirit long for.
- 8. If it can only be forged in the furnace of suffering, bring it on.
