Judges 1-2 – 2 September 2021 "Breaking The Cycle Of Sin"

Introduction

*Judges covers period from Joshua's conquest of the land in 1380BC until the monarchy begins in 1050BC with the 1st king Saul

*Although the author unknown, it seems likely that it was Samuel & it was written during the time of King Saul's reign from 1050-1000BC

*God has given Israel great prosperity: cities they didn't build farms they didn't produce

*But instead of recognizing the grace of God that brought them to this place of prosperity, we'll see that the theme of the Book of Judges is that "*everyone did that which was right in their own eyes*".

*As the book opens up, it shows us the cycle of sin that Israel falls into repeatedly

*Let's look at 5 tips for "Breaking The Cycle Of Sin"

1st Tip for breaking the cycle of sin: Depend on God not man (Chap 1:1-7)

Read Chap 1:1-2

- 1. The 12 tribes are a loose confederacy
 - a. Independent yet giving aid & fellowship to each other when needed
- 2. Judah is chosen to be the military leaders
- 3. God intends to deliver the remaining Canaanite cities into Israel's hand thru Judah
 - a. But it's God they should depend on not man
 - b. God has always been the source of victory for them, not Moses or Joshua

Read Chap 1:3

- 1. Immediately Judah turns from God to rely on Simeon, the arm of flesh
 - a. They are already denying God's ability and depending on man's ability
 - b. God had just promised to deliver the land into Judah's hand, but they're doubting this

Read Chap 1:4-7

- 1. Adoni-bezek had done this to 70 others (small) kings & now he believes it's coming back on him
- 2. There were still many small strongholds of Canaanites throughout the land that needed wiped out like Bezek
- 3. Always more work to be done, but it takes a walk of faith depending on God to complete it

2nd Tip for breaking the cycle of sin: Completely obey what you know (Chap 1:8-36)

- 1. One of our greatest failings as humans is when we think that partial obedience is good enough
 - a. Partial obedience means we're choosing to allow sin.... some of the time
- It begins well w/ Judah until we get to vs 19
 Read Chap 1:8
 - Judah/Simeon conquered Jerusalem but couldn't hold it (see vs 21)

Read Chap 1:9-15

- 1. We received these accounts in Jos 15 as well
 - a. Joshua was looking for a Godly son-in-law
 - b. Othniel will become 1st Judge of Israel
- 2. So, Judah conquers Hebron and Debir

Read Chap 1:16

- 1. "City of Palm Trees" is Jericho
- 2. Kenites weren't Canaanites so they could stay

Read Chap 1:17-20

- 1. Judah/Simeon continues to conquer...just not completely...they left the valley in vs 19
- 2. "Strange, were the iron chariots too strong for Omnipotence?" (Adam Clarke)
- 3. <u>One reason we don't completely obey (as in</u> <u>verse 19) is *fear*</u>

Read Chap 1:21-26

- 1. From Judah, Benjamin, now Ephraim going north
- 2. Again, their partial obedience seen in vs 21 & 25

- 3. <u>Another reason we don't completely obey (as</u> <u>in verse 25) is *misplaced compassion*</u>
 - a. Dealing w/ sin is no time to have softness
 - b. Read Rom 6:11-12– "reckon yourself dead"

Read Chap 1:27-28

- 1. Going northward again, Manasseh didn't fully deal with the Canaanites but simply taxed them
- 2. <u>Another reason we don't completely obey (as</u> in verse 28) is that *we think we can gain from it*
 - a. Sin will always spoil you, not supply you
 - b. Read Col 2:8 "don't be spoiled…"

Read Chap 1:29-33

1. Only Issachar not mentioned, rest didn't complete their mission

Read Chap 1:34-36

- 1. Dan wouldn't deal with the Amorites
- 2. <u>Another reason we don't completely obey (as</u> in verse 35) is *we just don't want to deal w/ conflict*

3rd Tip for breaking the cycle of sin: When needed, bring true repentance (Chap 2:1-5)

Read Chap 2:1-2

- 1. The angel of the Lord is the pre-incarnate appearance of Jesus Christ
 - a. Also appeared to Joshua before Jericho
 - b. Jesus expressed His power before Joshua & now here He expresses His compassion & heart
 - i. Don't get out of balance regarding Jesus
- 2. See the heartbreak "Why have you done this?"
 - a. Paul says in Rom 2:4 that "it's the goodness of God that leads us to" change our ways.

Read Chap 2:3-5

- 1. They weep but is it the weeping to repentance or the sorrow of death (Read II Cor 7:9-10)
- 2. They sacrificed to God but did they also forsake their own ways? (Cleaving AND Leaving)
 - a. Loving your wife isn't real unless you also leave your mistress

4th Tip for breaking the cycle of sin: Teach kids to experience God for themselves (Chap 2:6-15)

Read Chap 2:6-10

- 1. There are 3 generations we're told about here
 - a. Joshua who served & did the works of God
 - b. The elders that saw the works of God
 - c. The next generation that didn't know that Lord or even of His works
- 2. Each generation has to have their own experiential walk of faith with the Lord
 - a. Each person needs to look to God in prayer
 - b. Each needs to know God thru His Word
 - c. Each needs to work out their own salvation

Read Chap 2:11-13

- 1. Baal god of weather & agriculture
- 2. Ashtaroth goddess of love & sex
- 3. idolatry is adultery

Read Chap 2:14-15

- 1. Despising goodness of God brings His anger
- 2. Spoiled = to be robbed of your blessings
- 3. Next gen needs taught all the good God has done
 - a. In creation, in redemption & in practice

5th Tip for breaking the cycle of sin: Recognize & appreciate God's grace (Chap 2:16-3:6)

Read Chap 2:16-17

- Each time God provided a judge for deliverance, it was yet another micro-chance for them to repent and turn to God
- 2. This was God's grace to throw off the oppression that they caused to come upon themselves

Read Chap 2:18-19

- 1. God isn't a magic genie to be used & abused
- 2. Forsook the Lord when the judge was dead
 - a. Good times are hardest times to live pure
- 3. Tytler Lifecycle of nations

Read Chap 2:20-23

- 1. So instead of living in prosperity, they'll live in struggle
 - a. We're so quick to blame God for the junk that's in our lives, but we're often the ones responsible for allowing it to be there
- 2. The sin that is around us CAN be used to show the Lord our love and faithfulness
 - a. When we live pure in a dirty world, it's pleasing to God

Read Chap 3:1-6

- These remaining Canaanites were a good chance to show the Lord their devotion, but they failed to do that
- 2. Just having trials in our lives is a reminder that God is giving another chance for us to overcome
- 3. Yet, Israel fully embraced living with the Canaanites and their sins

Conclusion

So Israel as a nation will fall into this cycle sin & God's deliverance, sin & God's deliverance. Do let that become your life...break the cycle.

1. Depend on God, not man

- a. Whether every leader around you is godly or heathen, we can look to God for wisdom
- 2. Completely obey what you know
 - a. Partial obedience says that you're choosing to allow sin in your life, ouch!

3. When needed, bring true repentance

a. Not just lip service, but a true move of your whole life in God's direction

4. Teach kids to experience God themselves

a. God doesn't have any grandkids, only chosen adopted sons and daughters

5. Recognize & appreciate God's grace

a. The Lord is patience, always looking to give another opportunity to come to Him
