Psalms 102-103 – 27 July 2025 "Removed From Depression"

Introduction

- *This is 4th of 6 messages in the 4th Book of Psalms
- *Psalms the Israeli Hymnbook or Book of Praises
- *Psalms 102-103 wonderfully go together to show a marvelous 2-pronged way out of depression
- *In a 2023 Gallup poll 17.8% of American adults report depression or being treated for depression
- *29% have been diagnosed at some time in life
- *13.2% are currently taking antidepression meds
- *Many studies from the American Asso of Christian Counselors reveal those that believe in God are **more than twice as likely** to respond positively to treatment
- *No doubt God has all the answers we need to help
- *So today, let's look at both of these avenues of attack to be removed from depression

1st Way Out Of Depression: Grab On To God's Bigger Plan For Us (Psm 102)

Intro – Afflicted can be translated *down, lowly*, or even *depressed* – could be in mind, finances or health

We should be humble but there is a lowly that is depressed & fainting

What's the afflicted need? Grace (Read Prov 3:34)

Read Psm 102:1-2

- 1. Do not overlook the superlative 1st action of the distressed coming to the right place...to the Lord
- 2. Do we turn to our credit card or ingenuity in distress or to the One who's allowed the situation?

Reada Vs 3-7

- 1. He compares himself to 2 lonely birds
- 2. His health is fading b/c of his mourning, he's not eating or sleeping
- 3. It's interesting the specific distress isn't named, this makes it easy to apply to many situations

Read Vs 8-9

- 1. His enemies 'reproach'; this is to strip away
 - a. Same word is translated *winter*
- 2. He's so familiar with the elements of mourning (weeping & ashes) that it's like they're his food

Read Vs 10-11

- 1. This highlights the true source of the distress is that he believed the Lord was the cause of it
 - a. As if the Lord was a wrestler, picking him up & body slamming him down
- 2. He saw life declining to the end like a sundial

Read Vs 12

- 1. What a sharp contrast
 - a. It changes from *I*, me, my to You God
 - b. We've thought of the frailty of man, now we magnify our everlasting God
- 2. This verse is the choice in faith to turn to God

Read Vs 13-14

1. There are a few time periods in which Jerusalem sat in ruins awaiting God's restoration

- a. Whichever this refers to is unclear; it can yet apply to Israel's salvation to come
- 2. Now how does this fit w/ the Psalmist's personal complaints from the 1st half of the Psalm
 - a. To come out of his personal distress, he looks beyond himself to God's larger plan
- 3. Godly Elijah knew joy AND depression
 - a. When he was feeling alone & dying, God pointed him to the *larger mission at hand*
 - b. Read I King 19:13-16 After God told him to eat & sleep right, He put him back to work

Read Vs 15-17

- 1. God is doing a work that will be glorified in the entire world it's a BIG plan
- 2. Our prayers should go beyond ourselves to God's bigger plan

Read Vs 18-22

1. What vision the Psalmist has to see the grand plan of God coming together in the end

- 2. Grand plan isn't just to restore Israel, but to bring Messiah thru them; He'll set prisoners free
- 3. Free from what prison? The prison of death
 - a. We will have sorrow (Read) John 16:20
 - b. But as we consider death, we actually have hope (Read) I Thes 4:13-14
 - c. B/c Jesus has defeated death, we shall all gather together again

Read Vs 23-27

- 1. Mankind & creation itself have a physical time limit b/c we are afflicted w/ corruption
 - a. Lord Kelvin said, 'Universe is like a clock wound up by the Creator & left to run down'
 - b. Yet God's plan endures until completion b/c **He** will endure

Read Vs 28

- 1. And what is the completion of that plan? That all those that are His will dwell in life everlasting
 - a. And so shall we ever be with the Lord

2nd Way Out Of Depression: Meditate On All God's Benefits For Us (Psm 103)

Read Psm 103:1-2

- 1. There is that psychological term *self-talk*
 - a. If we mean 'to speak to ourselves Biblical truth & no lies', then praise God; David did
 - b. Read Psm 42:5
 - c. We're always pulled to put our eyes on our situation & forget what God can do & has done
 - d. Peter walked on water...for a short while

Read Vs 3-5

- 1. Often our eyes are on the temporary "fun" the world's having & we think of what we *don't have*
 - a. But what joy when we see what we <u>do have</u>
- 2. Crowning w/ lovingkindness is to encircle us
- 3. There may be no greater thing God can do than to bring us satisfaction (ie vs 5)
 - a. He can fulfill us, but that has an ending
 - b. He can *complete* us, but doesn't imply *good*

4. Webster's 1828 dictionary for satisfy: "To gratify wants, wishes & desires, to supply possession or enjoyment till no more is needed or even desired"

Read Vs 6-7

- 1. So vs 3-5 is benefits to the individual, vs 6-7 are benefits by the giving of His Law to society
- 2. He's provided us His guidebook for life

Read Vs 8-10

- 1. How about the benefit of His grace
 - a. Justice getting what we deserve, hell
 - b. Mercy not getting what we deserve, hell
 - c. Grace getting what we don't deserve, heaven
- 2. How is it that He can deal w/ us *not* according to our sins? B/c Jesus Christ took them away

Read Vs 11-12

- 1. Interesting that He says our sins are removed like the east is from the west
 - a. Going north you'll eventually go south
 - b. But if you go east or west, you'll always be going that direction b/c they never touch

Read Vs 13-14

- 1. As a potter to the clay, the Lord knows how to apply just the right amount of corrective force
 - a. In Matt 12:20 Jesus said Isa 42:3 was about Himself, "a bruised reed He shall not break & a smoking flax He shall not quench"
- 2. What a benefit of being born into God's family Read Vs 15-18
 - 1. The benefits of this earth so quickly fade away
 - 2. Mary the Mother of Jesus quoted this vs 17
 - a. She may have had very little benefits on earth, in fact she experienced much pain
 - b. But she's blessed to be the mother of Jesus& in that "all generations will call her blessed"
- 3. If 'You can have all this world, give me Jesus'

Read Vs 19-22

1. The Lord has the power to sustain all His benefits toward us forever

- 2. This is universal call for <u>all things</u> to bless God
 - from the very large down to the individual soul
- 3. This Psalm began w/ a look at self
 - a. But b/c it reflects on God's great benefits it scopes out <u>universally</u>
 - b. Then ends w/ reflection on self in light of it
