

Helpful Hints for Writing Discussion Questions:

Biblical // Relational // Applicable

BIBILICAL

1. Specific - Ask questions that are specific and concise, not vague or rambling.

Don't Ask: Romans 8 is one of the greatest chapters in the Bible, what is he trying to say?

Ask: What is Paul's perspective of suffering in Romans chapter 8?

Ask: What role do we see the Holy Spirit playing in a believer's life in Romans chapter 8?

2. <u>Meaning</u> - Ask questions that lead people to talk about the meaning of scriptures, not just what it says.

Don't Ask: In Romans 8:18 What is not worth comparing to the future glory? Ask: What do you think the future glory will really look like in us?

3. Empathetic - Ask questions that help people enter into the real life dynamics of the story.

Ask: How would you feel if an angel told you at age 89 that you were going to have a

baby (like Sarah)?

Ask: What would be going through your mind if you had been standing next to Peter

when the wind and waves stopped at Jesus' command?

4. <u>Statement, then question</u> - It's difficult to teach people information through a question. If you want to teach people, start the question with a statement of truth, then follow-up with a question.

Example: The word for "grace" in the Greek language could also mean "abundance and

resource." In Ephesians 1:7 we are told that God has riches of "grace" that he has given to us. Do you live as though you always have enough, or never have enough?

Why?

5. <u>Observation</u> - The best way to help people learn in Bible Study is to help them observe what the scripture is saying.

Hint: Ask people to look up various scriptures that talk about the same topic or theme.

Example: Look up John 14; 1 Corinthians 1:18-31; Romans 8:5-17. Make a list of every

activity you see the Holy Spirit doing.

Hint: Ask people to make lists or to accumulate information. Then ask a question that

helps them process what they've observed through that.

Example: In Deuteronomy 6:4-9 write down all the commands God gives the children of Israel.

Then under each command, talk about how we can fulfill them today?

6. <u>Life Application</u> – Sometimes Bible Study can feel informational. An excellent way to transition is to ask questions that force you to apply what you have been learning.

Ask: How should we live differently because of what we just learned?

Ask: What do we learn about God through this scripture and how does that change the

way I relate to him?

RELATIONAL / APPLICABLE

1. Experiential - Ask questions that get people talking about their experiences.

Ask: Do you find it easier or more difficult to pray in times of crisis?

2. <u>Emotional</u> - Ask questions that get people talking about how they feel. Then, follow up with an application question.

Ask: Share about the most recent time someone encouraged you. How did that make you feel? Who are people you can be an encouragement to this week, and how?

3. <u>Daily Life</u> - Ask questions that lead people to talk about how it pertains to their daily life.

Ask: Colossians 3:2 tells us to "set our mind on things above." What does that look like when I'm at work, when I'm watching TV, when I'm mowing lawn, or cooking dinner?

4. <u>Practical</u> - Ask questions that help people start the process of applying truth to their lives.

Ask: What are two practical things you can do this week to practice gratitude?

5. <u>Connected</u> - Ask questions that help us understand ourselves and the world around us, society, our culture, our families.

Ask: Do you think our society expects men to act a certain way? In what ways do you think so?

Ask: How do we show honor in our culture? How can we show honor to our parents as they grow older?

6. Occasionally you can throw in a personal or relational question that gives people options to choose from that are not right or wrong. This type of question can be fun, or help with self disclosure.

Ask: At the end of a difficult week are you more likely to...

- Collapse on the couch and watch a movie
- Go on a date with your spouse
- Get lost in one of your hobbies
- Work even more to make sure it all gets done

CAUTION: Don't Ask...

1. <u>Embarrassing</u> - Don't ask questions that will embarrass anyone for their lack of knowledge, faith, commitment, experience, etc.

Don't ask: When was the last time you led someone to the Lord?

Ask: Why is it important to share your faith verbally with people?

2. <u>Too Personal too fast</u> - Don't ask people the deeper or more personal questions until you're sure they have had time to build trust and are willing to volunteer their experience.

Don't ask: What is something you've never shared with anyone and why?

Don't ask: What is a sin the Lord is convicting you of right now? Don't ask: Who is someone that you've never been able to forgive?

3. <u>Husband verses Wife</u> - Don't ask questions that require husbands or wives to be too vulnerable in front of each other, or in front of others.

Don't ask: Wives, in what ways do you feel misunderstood by your husbands.

4. Gender related - Don't ask gender sensitive questions in mixed company.

Don't ask: Husbands what do you wish your wife knew about your sexual desires?

Don't ask: Men, how do you cope with your sexual desires, when you don't have a legitimate

outlet?
