It is what it is?

Week of September 27

"Will I always be broke?" Many of us ask this question, and because we know ourselves all too well, resign to the mindset: "It is what it is—I have too little money, and too many bills. I buy too much on credit, because I keep pulling out that credit card. I'm stuck in this vicious cycle. I'm in a mountain of debt and I cannot see my way out. So yes, I will probably always be broke." But the truth is you and I do not have to live this way. There is a way out of the downward debt spiral. First, we must be willing to ask for help; second, to be obedient; and third, ready to shut the door on destructive behavior.

In the Old Testament, there is a widow facing a mountain of debt. In fact, this woman owes so much money that her creditor comes knocking at the door, threatening to take her two sons as slaves in order to pay off the amount. What is she to do? Her late husband had been studying in one of schools of prophets (sort of like seminary in Old Testament times), and the leader (mentor, teacher) of this group of prophets quickly comes to mind. The woman thinks, "This man knew my late husband. He knows my husband was a true servant and feared the Lord." And so, in desperation, she asks the prophet Elisha for help.

Read 2 Kings 4:1-7

This woman swallowed her pride and asked for help. The lives of her two sons were at stake! But notice, the moment she was ready to do whatever it took to be set free (and save her sons!) was the moment her miracle was set in motion.

1. What keeps you from asking for help?

Perhaps there's been a time you were in a desperate situation and you did ask for help. Did you follow through with the counsel that was given you?

Elisha was ready to help her: "What can I do to help you?" Elisha asked. "Tell me, what do you have in the house?" At first the woman replies, "Nothing at all..." but then remembers a flask of olive oil (v2). The woman may not have mentioned the flask of oil right away, perhaps because she didn't think it was worth much—at least not enough to pay her creditor and save her sons. Yet Elisha immediately sees this olive oil as a valuable commodity—a resource at her fingertips. Notice Elisha doesn't merely give her a handout, but shows her how she can partner with God in climbing out of her mountain of debt.

Notice the oil did not stop flowing until each jar was filled. If you believe it's true that the Lord knows your every need and promises to provide accordingly, what is keeping you from trusting His goodness? Shut out the lies, the unbelief, the notion that stuff will make you happy—and never be broke again. Christ will move you and me from a place of desperation to a place of inspiration, from a place of greed to a place of generosity. The wealth of this world has nothing on the rich way God wants to work *for* you and *through* you.
