What Are The Problems With Planning?

"If you fail to plan, you're planning to fail" (attributed to Ben Franklin)
"Be Prepared" (Boy Scout Motto)
Misplaced expectations

Two Misconceptions About Planning:

- 1) We have some degree of control (free will and all that)
- 2) We can miss God's will (Kevin DeYoung's Just Do Something: How to Make A Decision Without Dreams, Visions, Fleeces, Impressions, Open Doors, Random Bible Verses, Casting Lots, Liver Shivers, Writing In The Sky, Etc.)

Five Misconceptions About God's Will...

- 1) There is only one perfect will of God
- 2) God has hidden it like an Easter egg
- 3) It's up to us to find it and do it
- 4) We probably won't like it ("it's the last thing we'd want to do")
- 5) We can miss it, or screw it up

- 6. Discuss the process for planning that was given. Was it what you expected it to be? Why or why not?

With prayer as the foundation...

- 1) Relax
- 2) Reorient thinking (away from cultural pressures and toward relationship with God)
- 3) Orient life with Jesus at the CENTER, not first (you knew I'd say it at some point!)
- 4) Obey what is known (how can we be trusted with what's unknown if we haven't been faithful to do what is known?)
- 5) Make plans, but hold them loosely
- 7. What was missing in the above list? (everything you'd read in the books about being organized and planning well... SWOT analysis, Pro-Con List, Facebook crowdsourcing)
- 8. Discuss the statement: For God, a plan is a statement of fact, but for humans, a plan is a statement of faith. What do you think? How will that perspective help as you face hard decisions or make plans?
