

"Like a drumbeat that never stops, in the pages of the Old Testament we hear the constant message that this world revolves around God, not us. They dedicated their firstborn livestock and children to God, wore portions of the Law on their heads and wrists, posted visible reminders on their doorways, said the word 'blessed' a hundred times a day, even wore distinctive hairstyles and sewed tassels on their garments. A devout Jew could barely make it through an hour, much less an entire day, without running smack into some reminder that he or she lived in God's world... The world, they believed, is God's property. And human life is 'sacred,' which simply means that it belongs to God to do with what He wills... In our secularized, industrialized environment, we can go through an entire week, not just a day, without bumping into a reminder that this is God's world."

Inconceivable: "Iotas, Dots, and Mitzvots" - Matthew 5:17-20 - June 17, 2018

Matthew 5:17-20 (ESV)

17"Do not think that I have come to abolish the Law or the Prophets; I have not come to abolish them but to fulfill them. 18For truly, I say to you, until heaven and earth pass away, not an iota, not a dot, will pass from the Law until all is accomplished. 19Therefore whoever relaxes one of the least of these commandments and teaches others to do the same will be called least in the kingdom of heaven, but whoever does them and teaches them will be called great in the kingdom of heaven. 20For I tell you, unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven.

1. What stood out to you, or caused you think differently, from this passage?

2. What is the big idea of this passage?

3. Verses 17-18 focus on Jesus's attitude toward Scripture (aka "the Law and the Prophets," or simply, "the Law," our Old Testament). What did He think about what Scripture says in reference to Himself?

4. What did Jesus mean when He said He came to fulfill Scripture? And what did He not mean? ("end" in Romans 10:4 refers to the outcome, not the cessation, of what was taught in the Law and Prophets)

5. Verse 18: What emphasis Jesus make when He spoke about iotas and dots? What about when He said, "... until heaven and earth pass away..." and "... until all is accomplished?"

6. What has been your experience with the Old Testament? What do you find difficult when reading the OT? What would be helpful to you to overcome some of those challenges?

7. What is the main point of verse 19? (It's not about least and greatest, or about doing the right external actions, it's about loving God so much we're compelled to obey; the Sermon on the Mount is not about how to get in, it's about being who we are)

8. In verse 20, how can our righteousness exceed that of the scribes and Pharisees?
