- 4) Why is our *motivation* in following God important? If you are a follower of Jesus, are there any potential unhealthy motivations behind how you live your Christian life?
- 5) Read James 1:17 and Matthew 7:7-11. What gifts, promises, and blessings of God are you most thankful for? Hypothetically, would you love and follow God if those gifts were no longer available or present in your life?
- 6) Read Romans 1:18-25. What safeguards will you put in your life to make sure you are loving the *Giver* instead of the *gifts* He gives?
- 7) How practically will you seek to grow your love for Jesus this week? Is there any "Isaac" that has taken God's rightful place in the centre of your heart? What would it look like to lay that "Isaac" on the alter?
- 8) Have someone read/pray Ephesians 3:14-21 for your Impact Community.

A Son Sacrificed - Isaac

Mark 12:30 "You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, all your mind, and all your strength."

Question: How can you measure "love for God"?

Genesis 22:1-12

Some time later, God tested Abraham's faith. "Abraham!" God called. "Yes," he replied. "Here I am."

² "Take your son, your only son—yes, Isaac, whom you love so much—and go to the land of Moriah. Go and sacrifice him as a burnt offering on one of the mountains, which I will show you."

³ The next morning Abraham got up early. He saddled his donkey and took two of his servants with him, along with his son, Isaac. Then he chopped wood for a fire for a burnt offering and set out for the place God had told him about. ⁴ On the third day of their journey, Abraham looked up and saw the place in the distance.

⁵ "Stay here with the donkey," Abraham told the servants. "The boy and I will travel a little farther. We will worship there, and then we will come right back."

⁶ So Abraham placed the wood for the burnt offering on Isaac's shoulders, while he himself carried the fire and the knife. As the two of them walked on together,

⁷ Isaac turned to Abraham and said, "Father?"

"Yes, my son?" Abraham replied.

"We have the fire and the wood," the boy said, "but where is the sheep for the burnt offering?"

⁸ "God will provide a sheep for the burnt offering, my son," Abraham answered. And they both walked on together.

⁹ When they arrived at the place where God had told him to go, Abraham built an altar and arranged the wood on it. Then he tied his son, Isaac, and laid him on the altar on top of the wood. ¹⁰ And Abraham picked up the knife to kill his son as a sacrifice. ¹¹ At that moment the angel of the Lord called to him from heaven, "Abraham! Abraham!"

"Yes," Abraham replied. "Here I am!"

¹² "Don't lay a hand on the boy!" the angel said. "Do not hurt him in any way, for now I know that you truly fear God. You have not withheld from me even your son, your only son."

Big Idea: Loving God fully requires putting our "Isaac's on the alter."
