- 1. What was most helpful about this message? What insights did you glean? What questions did this message raise for you?
- 2. What significant experiences of waiting have you had in your life? Which ones had the biggest impact on you?
- 3. Read Luke 2:22-35. What does Luke tell us about Simeon? Why did Luke highlight these things?
- 4. What defined Simeon's life? *How* was he waiting and what was he waiting for?
- 5. Think about the things that you typically spend your time, energy and resources on. How would you answer this question: What are you waiting for?
- 6. Read Matthew 24:1-14, 30-31. What do we learn about "the end" from Jesus' words? What thoughts or feelings do you have as you read these passages?
- 7. Do your life's priorities align with what you see in the life of Simeon and Jesus words in Matthew 24? Explain how they do or do not.
- 8. How would your life be different if your priorities were aligned with Kingdom priorities?
- 9. What would it look like if, as a church, we lived lives oriented around Jesus, waiting with hope and anticipation for when he fulfills his promise to come back and set everything right?
- 10. Heading into the new year, what tangible steps will you take to live a life focused on Jesus and filled with hope?

What are you waiting for?

Luke 2:22-35 Then it was time for their purification offering, as required by the law of Moses after the birth of a child; so his parents took him to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord. ²³ The law of the Lord says, "If a woman's first child is a boy, he must be dedicated to the Lord." ²⁴ So they offered the sacrifice required in the law of the Lord—"either a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons."

- ²⁵ At that time there was a man in Jerusalem named Simeon. He was righteous and devout and was eagerly waiting for the Messiah to come and rescue Israel. The Holy Spirit was upon him ²⁶ and had revealed to him that he would not die until he had seen the Lord's Messiah. ²⁷ That day the Spirit led him to the Temple. So when Mary and Joseph came to present the baby Jesus to the Lord as the law required, ²⁸ Simeon was there. He took the child in his arms and praised God, saying,
- ²⁹ "Sovereign Lord, now let your servant die in peace, as you have promised. ³⁰ I have seen your salvation, ³¹ which you have prepared for all people. ³² He is a light to reveal God to the nations, and he is the glory of your people Israel!"
- ³³ Jesus' parents were amazed at what was being said about him. ³⁴ Then Simeon blessed them, and he said to Mary, the baby's mother, "This child is destined to cause many in Israel to fall, but he will be a joy to many others. He has been sent as a sign from God, but many will oppose him. ³⁵ As a result, the deepest thoughts of many hearts will be revealed. And a sword will pierce your very soul."

Big Idea: Only a life focused on Jesus is a life of hope and fulfillment.

* Jesus is coming to Earth, again! Matthew 24:1-14, 30-31

So what do we do to live this kind of life?

- 1) Answer the question: What am I waiting for?
- 2) Receive the gift of Immanuel: God with us.
- 3) Align your priorities.

Helpful questions to ask:

- a) "Is what I am doing right now something that I want to be found doing the moment Jesus comes back?"
- b) "Are my actions helping bring the kingdom to Earth?"
