1. Thinking about this week, what is something you are thankful for or something you would like prayer for?
2. Read Exodus 2:1-10. What stands out to you about Moses' mother's actions in this story? Have you ever had to trust God in a situation where the outcome was uncertain?

4. The sermon said: "Our pity must become compassion." What's the difference between feeling bad for someone and taking action? Where is God calling you to move from emotion to action?
5. Reflecting on the quote: "God buries the workman and carries on His work." How does this remind us that God's plan is bigger than any one person? In what ways do you see yourself as part of God's ongoing story of redemption—even if you feel unseen?
6. Close by praying for each other.

### Exodus 2: 1-10 (NIV)

**Now a man of the tribe of Levi married a Levite woman,<sup>2</sup> and she became pregnant and gave birth to a son. When she saw that he was a fine child, she hid him for three months.<sup>3</sup> But when she could hide him no longer, she got a papyrus basket for him and coated it with tar and pitch. Then she placed the child in it and put it among the reeds along the bank of the Nile.<sup>4</sup> His sister stood at a distance to see what would happen to him.**

**<sup>5</sup> Then Pharaoh's daughter went down to the Nile to bathe, and her attendants were walking along the riverbank. She saw the basket among the reeds and sent her female slave to get it. <sup>6</sup> She opened it and saw the baby. He was crying, and she felt sorry for him. "This is one of the Hebrew babies," she said. <sup>7</sup> Then his sister asked Pharaoh's daughter, "Shall I go and get one of the Hebrew women to nurse the baby for you?"**

**<sup>8</sup> “Yes, go,” she answered. So the girl went and got the baby’s mother. <sup>9</sup> Pharaoh’s daughter said to her, “Take this baby and nurse him for me, and I will pay you.” So the woman took the baby and nursed him. <sup>10</sup> When the child grew older, she took him to Pharaoh’s daughter and he became her son. She named him Moses, saying, “I drew him out of the water.”**
