- 1) Thinking about this week, how was God at work in your life? Is there some way we can pray for you?
- 2) Last week's challenge was to "move toward someone." Who were you called to move toward this week? Did you face any obstacles? What happened?
- 3) Read the passage and reflect on the sermon from Sunday. What stands out to you?
- 4) The snake's lie is designed to make us question our trust in God: "Is God really good or is He holding out on me?" When have you been tempted to doubt God's good intentions for you: to define right and wrong yourself?
- 5) How does doubting God's goodness distort the way we see ourselves and others?
- 6) Read Prov 3:5-6 below. Can you name a time that you trusted God instead of doing something you wanted to do? What has helped build your trust in God?
- 7) How have you seen trust and vulnerability strengthen your relationships with others? Have you ever seen relationships damaged by a lack of trust?
- 8) What is one aspect of God's character that you need to remember this week? (E.g. faithful, loving, strong, etc.) What can you do to remind yourself of this every day?
- 9) Close in prayer.

Genesis 3:1-7 (NIV)

¹ Now the serpent was more crafty than any of the wild animals the LORD God had made. He said to the woman, “Did God really say, ‘You must not eat from any tree in the garden’?”

² The woman said to the serpent, “We may eat fruit from the trees in the garden, ³ but God did say, ‘You must not eat fruit from the tree that is in the middle of the garden, and you must not touch it, or you will die.’”

4 “You will not certainly die,” the serpent said to the woman. ⁵ “For God knows that when you eat from it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil.”

⁶ When the woman saw that the fruit of the tree was good for food and pleasing to the eye, and also desirable for gaining wisdom, she took some and ate it.
