

CONNECT QUESTIONS

1. Thinking about this week, what is something you are thankful for or something you would like prayer for?
2. Read Exodus 4:1–17. What stands out to you about Moses' questions, fears, and God's responses? How would you describe God's tone or character in this passage?
3. In the sermon, we heard that "God meets our insecurities with His presence." When have you felt insecure or unqualified, yet sensed God still inviting you to step forward?
4. God asks Moses, "What is that in your hand?" What are some skills, experiences, or passions God has already placed in your life that He might want to use for His purposes?
5. Moses kept resisting—he questioned, made excuses, and even asked God to send someone else. Why do you think we often resist God's calling, even when we believe in Him?
6. What would it look like for you to say "yes" to God this week—even if it feels uncomfortable or uncertain? What step of faith might He be inviting you to take?
7. Close by praying for one another—especially for the courage to trust God's presence, to use what we have, and to say yes to His calling in our lives.

Exodus 4: 1-17 (NIV)

Moses answered, “What if they do not believe me or listen to me and say, ‘The Lord did not appear to you’?”

2 Then the Lord said to him, “What is that in your hand?”

"A staff," he replied.

3 The Lord said, “Throw it on the ground.”

Moses threw it on the ground and it became a snake, and he ran from it. 4 Then the Lord said to him, "Reach out your hand and take it by the tail." So Moses reached out and took hold of the snake and it turned back into a staff in his hand. 5 "This," said the Lord, "is so that they may believe that the Lord, the God of their fathers—the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob—has appeared to you."

6 Then the Lord said, “Put your hand inside your cloak.” So Moses put his hand into his cloak, and when he took it out, the skin was leprous—it had become as white as snow.

7 “Now put it back into your cloak,” he said. So Moses put his hand back into his cloak, and when he took it out, it was restored, like the rest of his flesh.

8 Then the Lord said, "If they do not believe you or pay attention to the first sign, they may believe the second. 9 But if they do not believe these two signs or listen to you, take some water from the Nile and pour it on the dry ground. The water you take from the river will become blood on the ground."

10 Moses said to the Lord, "Pardon your servant, Lord. I have never been eloquent, neither in the past nor since you have spoken to your servant. I am slow of speech and tongue." 11 The Lord said to him, "Who gave human beings their mouths? Who makes them deaf or mute? Who gives them sight or makes them blind? Is it not I, the Lord? 12 Now go; I will help you speak and will teach you what to say."

13 But Moses said, “Pardon your servant, Lord. Please send someone else.” 14 Then the Lord’s anger burned against Moses and he said, “What about your brother, Aaron the Levite? I know he can speak well. He is already on his way to meet you, and he will be glad to see you. 15 You shall speak to him and put words in his mouth; I will help both of you speak and will teach you what to do. 16 He will speak to the people for you, and it will be as if he were your mouth and as if you were God to him. 17 But take this staff in your hand so you can perform the signs with it.”
