Daniel 4 SA230101

"Opening Eyes through Affliction"

- 1. We all have those people we believe can never be saved.
 - I can think of one right now.
 - **But** as Jesus said, with God ALL things are possible.
- 2. And there are numerous cases throughout history where God has saved people that everyone believed to be unsavable.
 - And I believe that one of them was Nebuchadnezzar.
- 3. Some would argue that this chapter does not necessarily show he got saved.
 - But I believe the fruit shows that he was.
- 4. So how does God break and change someone?
 - There are different ways depending on what is needed for that individual, but one of the main ways is to bring in "extreme hardship."
- 5. It is often the person complaining that if there was a God of love why is this happening to them.
 - When that is the exact reason it is happening to them.

- **In other words,** it is God Himself causing the horrible things to happen in order to get their attention and break them.
- 6. Let me ask you a question.
 - **Which** is better and which is true love?
 - a. To bless someone's life in their sin and see them spend eternity in hell.
 - b. Or to allow calamity in their life in order to bring them to repentance and see them forever in heaven?
- 7. We will see in chapter four that God's love was so great for Nebuchadnezzar, He brought calamity into his life in order to bring heaven into his future.
 - **And** there may be someone in here today that is in the same position.
- v.1 1. Worldwide public testimony!
 - I sometimes have trouble with my neighbor!
 - **But** this is what happens when God does great things in our lives.
 - 2. Notice "Peace be multiplied!"
 - Not a typical characteristic of Nebuchadnezzar!
 - This is a changed man.

- **v.2** He had heard of the Lord and seen Him in Daniel, but now it's personal.
 - And until it becomes personal, we have no hope of heaven.
- v.3 1. Notice "His" kingdom is everlasting.
 - Not long before this Nebuchadnezzar felt HIS kingdom was everlasting as represented in the statue of gold.
 - 2. Yet brokenness brings humility and reality.
 - Both of which Nebuchadnezzar now had.
- **v.5** 1. If he was flourishing and at rest, why would God so radically disrupt his life?
 - **As** we noted, that is what it often takes for people like Nebuchadnezzar.
 - 2. The problem with the trouble-free life for the unbeliever is that they can be deceived into thinking this life is all that matters and judgment for sin is not in their future.
 - But troubles disrupt all of that.
- **v.13** A "watcher" We need to realize that everything we say and do is seen by the Lord.
 - **Not** only is God watching but His angels are watching and reporting as well.

- **v.18** 1. Nebuchadnezzar saw something different in Daniel as compared to his other "wise" men and that of course was the living God.
 - **And** if you know the Lord, the people around you see something different as well.
 - 2. Notice he says the others were unable to interpret the dream and that might be true.
 - But with all that had happened to Nebuchadnezzar and Babylon, this particular dream is not that hard to figure out.
 - I believe it's very possible they knew what the dream meant and simply played dumb out of fear.
 - 3. You see, the end result for Nebuchadnezzar in this dream is not good.
 - **And** they all knew his propensity for rage and destruction.
 - 4. But we are going to see that Daniel, though maybe fearful as well, will not shy away from telling the King the truth.
 - And how we need people in our life like this, and how we need to BE people like this ourselves.

- **v.19** 1. Notice the loving and caring response of Daniel toward this unsaved cruel leader.
 - It was one of compassion and broken heartedness.

2. Why?

- **Because** Daniel realized that although he was evil and cruel, hell is forever.
- And if we can spare ANYONE from going there, we should make the effort.
- 3. Which meant even though it was hard, he had to speak the truth in love.
 - **Proverbs** says that "open rebuke is better than love carefully concealed", and "the wounds of a friend are faithful".
 - Which means although hard, it is ultimately the most loving and caring thing we can do.
- 4. And notice also that even though it was hard, he didn't water it down.
 - **He** told the straightforward truth but did it in love.
- **v.25** In other words you're not the boss Nebuchadnezzar, the Lord is.
 - At this point Nebuchadnezzar thought he was running the show.
- v.26 1. Notice that God "chopped him down."

- God knows how to humble us.
- 2. There is a mental condition known today as 'Lycanthropy' where one thinks he is an animal and acts like one.
 - **This** is where we get the myths of werewolves.
- **v.27** 1. The bottom line is that Daniel is telling Nebuchadnezzar that he needs to repent.
 - **The** problem is he doesn't listen, so now the consequences come.
 - How many consequences could be avoided if we would simply repent.
 - 2. Daniel says there is hope if he repents.
 - **But** Nebuchadnezzar was too caught up in personal pride and refused to listen.
 - It is important that if we ever have to confront, we offer hope.
- v.29 1. Notice "at the end of 12 months!"
 - Look how long gave him to repent!
 - What a gracious God!
- **v.32** 1. My question is: did it take 7 years of this misery before Nebuchadnezzar would finally break...
 - **Or** was this simply the time God chose as an appropriate consequence?

- 2. If we want to live like an animal, God will let us.
 - But how many consequences will we have to face before we repent?
- **v.30** 1. Notice all the I's and My's in this verse.
 - Very clearly Nebuchadnezzar was not yet "getting it."
 - **He** was still walking around his palace thinking about how great he was.
 - 2. And as we noted in earlier studies Babylon was indeed an amazing city.
 - Babylon was an awesome place.
 - It had one of the 7 wonders of the world at this time, the "Hanging gardens of Babylon" where a mountain of trees and flowers rose some 400 ft. into the air. It was said to be visible hundreds of miles away.
- **v.34** 1. When Nebuchadnezzar was finally humble notice he looked up to the Lord.
 - And this is a true sign of humility.
 - 2. And notice of true humility.
 - **He** finally "understands" it is all about God and not about him.
 - Which then leads to praise!

- **v. 36** 1. Notice also how wonderful and gracious God is that he didn't permanently remove Nebuchadnezzar for his pride. After he repented, God actually restored him to his former position!
 - And even added honor!
 - **The** Bible says that if we humble ourselves, God will exalt us.
 - 2. Here's the point.
 - **Don't** ever think that God will never use you again just because you've blown it big time.
 - 3. God is very gracious in how He deals with us.
 - And if you have messed up, no matter how bad, if you humble yourself and ask forgiveness, God will restore you.
- **v.37** 1. He ends this proclamation by reasserting that now instead of glorifying himself, he is now glorifying the Lord.
 - **If** you have family or friends that are so prideful you don't think they can ever be reached, think again.
 - **God** IS able to humble those with the greatest of pride and gracious enough to forgive them.
 - 2. Is God showing you that you are like Nebuchadnezzar and need to humble yourself before Him?

- If so, I encourage you to respond to His Spirit.
- 3. Because as we saw today God is more than able to humble even the most prideful of people.
 - **And** it's much better to respond and humble ourselves than wait until God has to intervene.
