#### <u>US envoy says White House 'will fight'</u> <u>any Israeli West Bank annexation</u> <u>efforts | The Times of Israel</u>

US Ambassador to Israel Tom Nides warned in interviews that the White House would push back against any attempts by the expected incoming Israeli government to annex all or parts of the West Bank.

"Our position is quite clear: We do not support annexation. We will fight any attempt to do so," Nides told the Kan public broadcaster's diplomatic correspondent Gili Cohen in an interview aired Thursday, adding that "most of the Arab countries" feel the same way.

Nides's comments came after senior Likud MK Yariv Levin said following his meeting with President Isaac Herzog during party consultations on Wednesday that West Bank annexation was high on the government's agenda.

"We brought the State of Israel closer than ever before to applying sovereignty [over the West Bank]," Levin said at the President's Residence. "We were just a step away on that issue in the past, and I hope that we'll be able to continue in that direction."

Just ahead of the Abraham Accords in 2020, then-prime minister Benjamin Netanyahu announced an intention to move ahead with annexing portions of the West Bank with the support of then-president Donald Trump.

But the plan was shelved as part of the burgeoning peace deal with the United Arab Emirates, which strongly opposed any annexation efforts.

In an interview with the Ynet news site on Wednesday, Nides said that he was not worried by the prospect of annexation, and did not expect Israel to try to go through with it.

The US envoy told Kan that he intends to work closely with the expected future right-wing government.

"I want to start with a relationship with this government that is strong, that is enduring. I want to work closely with prime minister Netanyahu," said Nides. "That said, we have to stand up for the things that we believe in — that's what American values are about... There will be times that we will articulate what we believe our differences are."

Asked if he would meet with far-right Religious Zionism MK Itamar Ben Gvir, who is expected to receive a senior cabinet post, Nides said time would tell.

"I'm not going to make draconian statements that I'm not ever going to talk to anyone — it doesn't matter left or right," said Nides. "We'll see who gets to be in these positions... I want to see rhetorically what they say and how they act."

The US envoy said his job "is to keep dialogues going, conversations going, but push back on things we disagree with — and I will be pushing back aggressively on things that we disagree with."

Asked if he would invite Ben Gvir to the traditional embassy July 4 party next year, Nides laughed loudly, and said only: "There are a lot of things that could happen in the next six months."

US officials have privately expressed serious concerns over the potential future role of Ben Gvir, a firebrand MK who ran an anti-Arab campaign and has a history of inflammatory statements, as well as past convictions for incitement.

On Monday, US President Joe Biden phoned Netanyahu to congratulate him on last week's election victory.

According to a Hebrew statement from Netanyahu's office, during the eight-minute phone call with Biden, the US leader told Israel's presumed next premier that "we're brothers" and "we'll make history together."

An official familiar with the matter told The Times of Israel that the Biden administration is still waiting for the Israeli government to be formed before making any policy decisions. However, the US will likely have a hard time working with ministers such as Ben Gvir and Religious Zionism leader Bezalel Smotrich, the official said.

Pressed for his reaction on the rise of the far-right in Israel, State Department spokesman Ned Price said the US "hope[s] that all Israeli government officials will continue to share the values of an open,

democratic society including tolerance and respect for all in civil society, particularly for minority groups."

# Fewer Americans Take Their Traditional Moral Values from Biblical Principles: New Survey Says Milton Quintanilla (christianheadlines.com)

A new survey by the Cultural Research Center at Arizona Christian University found that fewer people are taking their traditional moral values from biblical principles.

<u>"The America's Values Study"</u> found that 71 percent of American adults claim to support traditional moral values today, including integrity, justice, kindness, non-discrimination, trustworthiness, free expression, property ownership, individual growth and self-control.

However, less than half of adults who hold to those values consider biblical morality a core value.

Another finding is that 42 percent of Americans say that "what you feel in your heart" is their absolute moral guide to life instead of the Bible. Among those who rely on their feelings are 53 percent of people with no religious affiliation who say that their emotions are the arbiter of right and wrong, 51 percent whose core values are happiness, comfort and equality and half of self-identified LGBTQ adults.

The subgroups who claim the Bible as their primary source of determining right and wrong were typically amongst those who are spiritually or politically conservative. Those prioritizing God's Word were SAGE Cons (66 percent of adults who are Spiritually Active, Governance Engaged Conservative Christians), adults who possess a biblical worldview (66 percent), people who attend an evangelical church (62 percent), Republican conservatives (58 percent) and theologically defined born-again Christians (54 percent).

CRC's director of research, Dr. George Barna, who authored the survey, said the findings highlight a shift in where Americans derive their source of morality.

"Three-quarters of Americans maintain that people are basically good, and less than half of all

Americans believing in God or that the Bible is God's true, relevant and reliable words to humanity," the veteran researcher explained.

"Consequently, Americans have become comfortable with the idea of being the arbiters of morality," he added. "In the same way that most Americans contend that there is no absolute moral truth, they now believe that there is no divine guidance required or even available to define right and wrong." Barna also pointed out that people nowadays are "more likely to take their moral cues from government laws and policies than from church teachings about biblical principles."

"Americans have historically said that when they elect a president, they are choosing a chief executive, not a pastor-in-chief, but that distinction appears to be passé. One could reasonably argue that the nation's ideas about right and wrong are now more likely to come from the White House and the halls of Congress, than from our houses of worship," he said. "The laws of the land are replacing the laws of God in determining good and evil in America."

The results were taken from two national surveys commissioned by <u>AmericasOne</u> and was conducted on July 22, 2022.

### Religious leaders gather in Sinai to receive "Climate Justice Ten Commandments" - Israel365 News

Religious leaders gather in Sinai to receive "Climate Justice Ten Commandments"

And *Hashem* said, "Let us make man in our image, after our likeness. They shall rule the fish of the sea, the birds of the sky, the cattle, the whole earth, and all the creeping things that creep on earth." Genesis 1:26

Some 40,000 attendees have flocked to the Sinai Desert including over 100 world leaders as well as leaders in business and other sectors. Christian, Muslim, Jewish, and other religious figures will participate in a UN conference on climate change that is taking place this week and next. In conjunction with the UN event, a group of faith leaders is taking an alternative approach, seeking a faith-based solution to the ecological crisis by promoting the "Ten Principles for Climate Justice" in a global initiative.

The multifaith initiative- led by the Interfaith Center for Sustainable Development (ICSD), The Elijah Interfaith Institute, and the Peace Department – is part of the 27th Conference of the Parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (COP27), which is taking place in the Sinai Peninsula, in Sharm El Sheikh, Egypt from November 6-18.

According to the Interfaith Center, the location of COP27 is especially meaningful because the Sinai Desert is "a place of revelation in the collective consciousness of Christianity, Judaism, Islam, and others. It is a site for turning to God and receiving God's message," as they explained in a press release.

On Sunday, the organization will hold a "Climate Repentance Ceremonies" and "put forth a prophetic interreligious call to action."

The partnering organizations initially intended to hold the Climate Repentance Ceremony and Ten Commandments events at Jebel Musa in the southern Sinai Peninsula. The area is traditionally believed to be the location of the biblical Mount Sinai, a site of great significance in the Bible and considered holy to Jews, Christians, and Muslims. Unfortunately, the Egyptian government chose not to permit the main interfaith event to be held at Jabal Musa due to security concerns so the central venue for Sunday's events was changed to London, a location that was readily accessible to faith leaders around the world and is a major media hub, as well as other locations. A small group of faith leaders will be allowed to ascend Jabal Mus and hold a repentance ceremony as originally planned.

Concurrent faith-based events will be held at Mt. Abu India, Rishikesh in the Himalayas, New York City, Ecuador, Germany, Vienna, Salt Lake City, Mount St. Francis in Indiana, and Australia, joining faith leaders from many denominations including Christianity, Islam, Judaism, and others.

The organizers have also urged houses of worship around the world to join in at the same time on Sunday with prayer and study focused on this "transformative moment to protect our environment."

Despite the change of venue, the Biblical significance and Mt. Sinai are still central themes of the event, as Rabbi Yonatan Neril, the founder and Executive Director of The Interfaith Center, explained.

"Some people believe religion is separate and distinct from ecology or care for God's creation," he said. "Were it not for the receiving of the Hebrew Bible on Mt. Sinai, Jewish tradition teaches, God would have returned the world to chaos and void. Applying the teachings of the Hebrew Bible to stewardship of God's creation is not just an idea for today, but essential for a future in which we achieve a balanced, worldwide ecosystem and thrive on a planet viable for all life."

Among climate experts and environmental activists, there are some who claim that the destructive process of climate change is irreversible, but Rabbi Neril noted that the Bible teaches otherwise.

"Many people fear that humans have irrevocably destroyed the ecology of 'Eden' on earth," Rabbi Neril explained. "But God created the world out of love for life on earth."

"We need to change the operating system that humanity generated and is degrading God's creation," he said. "We need to switch from greed, short-term thinking, and individualistic behavior to spiritual satisfaction, long-

term thinking, and altruism. And by doing that we will address the symptoms of the problem and manifest a new earth. May God help us."

Rabbi Neril sees faith and religion as playing essential roles in the solution.

"Leveraging faith communities to move the needle around climate advocacy is a deeply needed and worthwhile effort," he explained. "While the national political culture is so divided, faith is this common ground that can soften the boundaries and open hearts and minds."

Toward this end, Rabbi Neril authored the "<u>Eco Bible</u> An Ecological Commentary" which describes ecology as "achieving a more sustainable future in accordance with God's Will.

### Chappelle's SNL Monologue Elicits Backlash From Anti-Defamation League (people.com)

The comedian opened the show with a 15-minute monologue touching on Kanye West's recent antisemitic remarks

<u>Dave Chappelle</u>'s 15-minute <u>opening monologue on Saturday Night</u> <u>Live</u> this weekend is being criticized for perpetuating antisemitism, including by the national director of the Anti-Defamation League.

Jonathan Greenblatt, the head of the Jewish civil rights organization, shared his thoughts via Twitter on Sunday about the monologue, during which Chappelle spoke about <u>Kanye West</u>'s antisemitic comments.

"We shouldn't expect <u>@ DaveChappelle</u> to serve as society's moral compass, but disturbing to see <u>@ nbcsnl</u> not just normalize but popularize #antisemitism," he wrote. "Why are Jewish sensitivities denied or diminished at almost every turn? Why does our trauma trigger applause?"

Others joined in to express concern and share their analysis of Chappelle's monologue. Influencer Rabbi Josh Yuter wrote that "the key point" of the monologue was that "there are double standards regarding who can say what about whom."

Nonprofit outlet <u>The Forward</u> has since pointed out more criticism — <u>The Jerusalem Post</u> called it <u>"engaging in antisemitic tropes,"</u> while <u>Adam Feldman</u> of <u>Time Out New York</u> said the opener "probably did more to normalize anti-Semitism than anything Kanye said."

Eric Deggans, NPR TV critic, <u>said via a tweet</u> sharing his review of the show that he was "severely disappointed" with the monologue.

"What I do know, is that one of comedy's boldest and most incisive voices had a chance to lend insight to the long struggle Black America has had with antisemitism. But instead, his monologue seemed filled with justification and minimization — failing to mention, for instance,

allegations that Ye has <u>expressed admiration</u> for Nazi leader Adolf Hitler," he <u>wrote in part</u>.

Chappelle, 49, opened his routine by unfolding a paper note and declaring, "I denounce antisemitism in all its forms. And I stand with my friends in the Jewish community. And that, Kanye, is how you buy yourself some time." After that, he said he would contact West, 45, during times of controversy, though this time he opted not to. Last month, West shared in now-deleted social media posts that he wanted to go "death con 3 on JEWISH PEOPLE," before going on a string of podcast and television appearances where he continued to share antisemitic rhetoric.

In his monologue, Chappelle said that there are "two words in the English language that you should never say together in sequence: 'The' and 'Jews.'"

"I've been to Hollywood and — no one get mad at me — I'm just telling you what I saw," he said. "It's a lot of Jews. Like a lot. But that doesn't mean anything! You know what I mean? Because there are a lot of Black people in Ferguson, Missouri, it doesn't mean we run the place."

Chappelle also said that a "delusion that Jews run show business" is "not a crazy thing to think," but "it's a crazy thing to say out loud."

"It shouldn't be this scary to talk about anything," Chappelle said. "It's making my job incredibly difficult. And to be honest with you, I'm sick of talking to a crowd like this. I love you to death and I thank you for your support. And I hope they don't take anything away from me... whoever they are."

Elsewhere, the *Chappelle Show* star said that West had "broken the show business rules."

"You know, the rules of perception," he added. "If they're Black, then it's a gang. If they're Italian, it's a mob. If they're Jewish, it's a coincidence and you should never speak about it."

Chappelle was previously been criticized for his 2021 Netflix special, *The Closer*, in which he made several jokes that targeted the LGBTQ+ community, particularly transgender people. Members of the LGBTQ+ community and advocacy groups spoke out in response, as hundreds of Netflix employees walked out of work in protest following its release.

## Left-wing activists harass conservative reading Bible, steal book and rip it up, protester eats pages Fox News

The activists were protesting a speech by conservative author Matt Walsh at a Wisconsin college campus

Leftist protesters were spotted outside a speaking event by a conservative commentator surrounding and shouting down a man reading <u>Bible</u> <u>passages</u> before they snatched the Bible, ripped it up, and one protester ate the pages.

In the video posted by Young America's Foundation earlier this week, a man reading Bible passages on a loudspeaker outside a screening of conservative commentator Matt Walsh's "What is a Woman?" documentary in <a href="Madison, Wisconsin">Madison, Wisconsin</a> was accosted by screaming leftist protesters. One of the protesters can be seen banging on a can next to the Christian man's face while another blared a siren next to him.

"The leftists' attempts to silence a student reading the Bible demonstrate their utter contempt for the Judeo-Christian values upon which America was founded," Nick Baker, a spokesperson for Young America's Foundation, told Fox News Digital in a statement.

In another video posted by the Young America's Foundation, protesters tore up the Bible after taking it from the man and one protester could be seen eating the pages.

"We're seeing this sort of insane behavior on college campuses across the country, and it's time to hold these students accountable," MJ Alfonso, Program Officer for Digital Media at YAF, told Fox News Digital about the scene.

"Well, you can be on the side that eats the Bible and castrates children, or you can be on literally any side but that one," Walsh posted on Twitter along with the video. "Your choice, America."

Walsh also posted a photo of a notice posted by the <u>University of Wisconsin-Madison</u> warning students of the event and calling it "harmful towards our trans community." The protesters also reportedly vandalized multiple buildings on campus including a veteran's memorial.

Walsh's screening took place as scheduled despite protesters outside objecting to the premise of the documentary which contends that womanhood is determined by biology while poking fun at many on the left for struggling to define the word "woman."

"Despite the protests, the lines continue to grow for@MattWalshBlog's #WhatIsAWoman screening at University of Wisconsin-Madison!" YAF posted on Twitter.

YAF also <u>called on</u> the University of Wisconsin-Madison to issue an apology after a school employee was spotted tearing down flyers for the event.

"Your move @UWMadison," the local YAF chapter tweeted. "Time to act and hold people accountable!"

"UW-Madison is aware of the extensive amount of graffiti that occurred at Memorial Union and Alumni Park in the early morning hours of Oct. 24," UW-Madison Communications Spokesperson John Lucas told Fox News Digital in a statement. "The university is deeply committed to the right to free speech. However, criminal damage to the university's buildings and spaces—for any reason or purpose—is unacceptable and will not be tolerated."

Lucas added that campus police are investigating the incident and the university will "also take appropriate steps under applicable criminal statutes and campus policies to hold responsible individuals accountable."

### WHO: Tuberculosis cases rise for the first time in years | AP News

GENEVA (AP) — The number of people infected with tuberculosis, including the kind resistant to drugs, rose globally for the first time in years, according to a report Thursday by the World Health Organization.

The U.N. health agency said more than 10 million people worldwide were sickened by tuberculosis in 2021, a 4.5% rise from the year before. About 1.6 million people died, it said. WHO said about 450,000 cases involved people infected with drug-resistant TB, 3% more than in 2020.

Dr. Mel Spigelman, president of the non-profit TB Alliance, said more than a decade of progress was lost when COVID-19 emerged in 2020.

"Despite gains in areas like preventative therapy, we are still behind in just about every pledge and goal regarding TB," Spigelman said.

WHO also blamed COVID-19 for much of the rise in TB, saying the pandemic "continues to have a damaging impact on access to TB diagnosis and treatment." It said progress made before 2019 has since "slowed, stalled or reversed."

With fewer people being diagnosed with the highly infectious disease, more patients unknowingly spread tuberculosis to others in outbreaks that may not have been spotted in countries with weak health systems.

WHO reported that the number of people newly identified with TB fell from 7 million in 2019 to 5.8 million in 2020.

WHO also said COVID-19 restrictions, including lockdowns and physical distancing protocols, also hampered TB treatment services and may have prompted some people to skip going to health facilities for fear of catching coronavirus. Officials added that the downturn in the global economy was also a factor, saying that about half of all TB patients and their families face "catastrophic total costs" due to their treatment. WHO called for more countries to cover all TB diagnosis and treatment expenses.

After COVID-19, TB is the world's deadliest infectious disease. It is caused by bacteria that typically affects the lungs. The germs are mostly spread from person to person in the air, such as when an infected individual coughs or sneezes.

TB mostly affects adults, particularly those who are malnourished or have other conditions like HIV; more than 95% of cases are in developing countries.

According to the WHO report, only one in three people with drug-resistant TB are receiving treatment.

"Drug-resistant TB is curable, but alarmingly, cases are on the rise for the first time in years," said Dr. Hannah Spencer, who is with Doctors Without Borders in South Africa. "It's urgent that shorter, safer and more effective treatments are scaled up now."

Spencer called for lowering the prices of TB treatment so a complete treatment course costs no more than \$500.

WHO also said ongoing conflicts in eastern Europe, Africa and the Middle East have worsened the options for patients seeking TB diagnosis and treatment.

Ukraine had one of the world's worst TB epidemics even before Russia invaded the country in February. Health experts fear the inability of patients to get treated could fuel the rise of more drug-resistant TB across the region.

While TB patients displaced by the war can seek care in Ukraine, the country has seen a shortage of key medicines and authorities face challenges in keeping track of patients.

#### Cholera Epidemic Spreading through Syria, Lebanon, Carried by Civil War Refugees | The Jewish Press -JewishPress.com | David Israel | 6 Heshvan 5783 - October 31, 2022 | JewishPress.com

According to Syrian health authorities, as of Sunday, 46 people have died from Cholera recently, suggesting that so far 1,097 contracted the disease, and in all cases, deaths were caused by delays in receiving medical attention. But the figures are much grimmer, according to UNICEF, which reported 20,000 known Cholera cases across Syria, with several dozen recorded deaths.

The BBC reported on Sunday that Lebanon, at this point a failed state unable to provide elementary service to its citizens, is looking at a wave of chaos from Cholera, which these days is a preventable and treatable disease, but not without an operating infrastructure, medical and otherwise. Cholera is transmitted through unclean water, and in the Syrian refugee camps in Lebanon, mired in open sewer water, with broken basic sanitation systems, the spread of Cholera can be rapid. So far, hundreds of Cholera cases have been reported in Lebanon.

Israel's Health Ministry and the Ministry of Environmental Protection informed campers and hikers in the north of the country of unusual results in water sampling that had been carried out in mid-October to examine the state of pollution in the streams there: "In tests for bacteria in the samples from October 18 and 19, 2022, results were found in several streams in the north that exceed the recommendations of the Ministry of Health (400 fecal E. coli in 100 ml) and indicate the presence of water contamination."

The UK announced on Friday it would provide £2 million to UNICEF in response to the cholera outbreak in Syria, "which continues to spread across the country and risks overwhelming fragile health systems."

The British announcement said that "as the international community scales up its response to the outbreak, which has now spread to Lebanon, this funding will contribute to UNICEF's cholera response, including establishing cholera treatment centers, giving people access to cholera kits and training the public on how to prevent the spread of cholera."

UK Minister of State and the Prime Minister's Special Representative on Preventing Sexual Violence in Conflict, Lord (Tariq) Ahmad said: "We are deeply concerned by the cholera outbreak across Syria, the first in more than ten years. With humanitarian needs the highest they have ever been, there is a significant risk that malnutrition, lack of access to clean water, and chronic conditions, will see the situation deteriorate even further."

Kan 11 News on Sunday night interviewed a medical doctor named Muhammad al-Salam who works near the Turkish border in northern Syria and reported that the raging war between rival rebel forces prevents medical teams from reaching suffering patients and in some cases trying to kill the doctors.

"Last week I was in northwestern Syria, and there were exchanges of fire between factions," Dr. al-Salam told Kan 11. "I had to stay in my place for a week or 10 days, I couldn't go to Turkey because of the exchange of fire. There's an area in the city of Afrin where the river was polluted, we had to take samples and unfortunately, they came out positive, but we were delayed in getting to these cases and the disease spread further."

Dr al-Salam warned the disease could spread to Lebanon's neighbors: "The epidemic knows no borders. It already spread to Lebanon, it may move to Jordan or other countries. The assumption is that the first infected person came to Syria from Iraq."

In mid-September, the World Health Organization reported several Cholera cases that resulted from people who drank polluted water from the Euphrates River that flows through Syria and Iraq to join the Tigris and empties into the Persian Gulf.

Jews to join forces with Muslims, Christians, Hindus and Buddhists; citing security concerns, Egypt refuses to let event be held at site believed by many to be biblical Mount Sinai

Religious leaders call to stop using fossil fuels at at the UN COP27 climate conference in Sharm el-Sheikh, Egypt, November 9, 2022. Jews, Muslims, Christians, Hindus and Buddhists from Israel, Egypt, the US, India, Spain and the UK plan to gather Sunday around the world to call on global leaders to act for "climate repentance" and to implement ten climate principles.

The events — planned to take place in Jerusalem, London, the Egyptian resort of Sharm el-Sheikh and other locations — are timed to coincide with the United Nations COP27 climate conference currently being held in Egypt, which ends on November 18.

London's event will be held at the foot of Parliament Hill.

Among the faith leaders expected to participate are Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew of Constantinople (Istanbul), Swami Chidanand Saraswati from India, Imam Faisal Abdul Rauf from the US, and Rabbi Jonathan Wittenberg from London.

Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew, who is also known as the Green Patriarch due to his dedication to environmental issues, released a statement ahead of the event decrying the "abuse of nature and the exploitation of its resources" as a "sin against God the Creator and the gift of creation."

The events are being organized by Rabbi Yonatan Neril's Interfaith Center for Sustainable Development, the Elijah Interfaith Institute and the Adam Teva V'Din environmental advocacy organization — all Israel-based organizations.

The original plan was to hold a large event on Jabal Musa, believed by many to be the biblical Mount Sinai where Moses received the Ten Commandments.

But the Egyptian government refused to allow it, citing security reasons.

The "Ten Principles for Climate Repentance" cited by the organizers are:

- 1. We are stewards of this world
- 2. Creation manifests divinity
- 3. Everything in life is interconnected
- 4. Do no harm
- 5. Look after tomorrow
- 6. Rise above ego for our world
- 7. Change our inner climate
- 8. Repent and return
- 9. Every action matters
- 10. Use mind, open heart
