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## **DISCUSSION GUIDE**

#### ADVENT: SCANDALOUS LOVE MATTHEW 13:53-58

- 1. How does the idea of an 'unoffensive Jesus' contrast with the biblical and historical portrayal of Jesus? What are the implications for our own faith journey?
- 2. Why do you think Jesus' and his message are so offensive to many? How should we respond to this as followers of Christ?
- 3. In what ways does Jesus challenge the dominant ideas of our culture? What about other cultures and their dominant ideas?
- 4. Has the "offensiveness" of Jesus ever led to a personal transformation in your own life or someone you know. Discuss.
- 5. How can the ordinariness of Jesus' life and background be a source of inspiration for us? Why do you think God chooses to work through the ordinary so often?
- 6. Why is the concept of grace so offensive to many, and how does it differ from the salvation concepts in other religions?
- 7. Reflect on the idea that the Gospel is only received by those who know they're "unimpressive." How does this challenge our cultural norms about power, success, and influence?
- 8. Explore the concept of being 'offended by grace' as described in the sermon. How does this challenge common perceptions about earning salvation?
- 9. What does it mean to 'believe and receive' Christ in the context of John 1:10-13? How is this different from mere intellectual assent? How should we understand the work of God as it relates to the miracle of Christian conversion?
- 10. How can we apply the lesson of Jesus' rejection in his hometown to our own experiences of acceptance or rejection in sharing our faith?

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
