## Don't Forget About: The Pharisee and the Tax Collector



"He also told this parable to some who trusted in themselves that they were righteous, and treated others with contempt: 10'Two men went up into the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. 11The Pharisee, standing by himself, prayed thus: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other men, extortioners, unjust, adulterers,

or even like this tax collector. <sup>12</sup>I fast twice a week; I give tithes of all that I get.' <sup>13</sup>But the tax collector, standing far off, would not even lift up his eyes to heaven, but beat his breast, saying, 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner!' <sup>14</sup>I tell you, this man went down to his house justified, rather than the other. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the one who humbles himself will be exalted." – Luke 18:9-14 ESV

#### From Outside the Church

- Humans tend toward us vs. them: Exclusivity
  - Once I'm in, I need to keep the riffraff out
  - 'Riffraff' = anyone too different from me
- Risk is setting a higher bar for salvation than even Jesus did!
  - How do the Gospels portray the Jewish public?
  - What the Pharisees did
  - What Jesus did

#### Who is the Patron Saint of Anti-Seeker Believers?

- "No one greater born of a woman," said Jesus about him
  - He saw the dove descend; he heard the voice of God, but
  - He ended up confused by Jesus' opposite approach!
    - See Luke 7:18-23
- What things characterized John the Baptist's ministry?

#### Jesus' Approach to the Undercommitted

 Who were "sinners" in Jesus day versus "pagans" in our day But Jesus...

- Came from a backwater place
- Didn't recruit Special Ops guys
- Was accessible to individual people, no app'ts
- Healed without regard to past or future life
- Left His message behind in Koine Greek
- Caused the curtain of the temple to tear!

**Bottom line: Offended the Elitists**

#### Jesus' Attitude vs. Our Attitude...

- He clearly didn't litmus test them or write them off
- He did not appear overly concerned about their lack of commitment
- Motivated by abundant compassion
  - Mark 6:34



How far apart are we from the Pharisees?

#### Is it Possible to Set Too Low of a Bar?

What if we go too far the other direction – overly seeker centric?

"9. ...that if you confess with your mouth Jesus as Lord, and believe in your heart that God raised Him from the dead, you will be saved."

"11.... I wrote to you not to associate with any so-called brother if he is an immoral person, or covetous, or an idolater, or a reviler, or a drunkard, or a swindler—not even to eat with such a one."

"The Lord is not slow about His promise, as some count slowness, but is patient toward you, not wishing for any to perish but for all to come to repentance." – 2 Peter 3:7-9

#### Sic et Non from the EFCA

 How do we do a better job of engaging the increasingly diverse religious opinions we are hearing today? By teaching our minds and our lips to say "yes and no." "Yes" to what is good and right. "No" to what is bad and wrong.

Sic, yes This means, first of all, that in our approach to contemporary claims we need to learn to say "yes." We need to avoid an attitude of hyper-criticism, which assumes that if any idea is new it must be false. Although we have the inspired, inerrant, and authoritative Scriptures, no church body or theological tradition has all the truth.

Non, no Just as clearly as we must affirm the truths others hold, we must also reject their errors. Too many of us are extremely naive in our acceptance of the truth claims of others. Too often we allow ourselves to be misled by others' false notions because we are convinced that their motives are pure, unaware of the damaging (and damning!) spiritual effects of every false doctrine or teaching.
