Recognize that God's will has a <u>what</u> and a <u>when</u>

[4] And while staying with them he ordered them not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for the promise of the Father, which, he said, "you heard from me; [5] for John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now." [6] So when they had come together, they asked him, "Lord, will you at this time restore the kingdom to Israel?" [7] He said to them, "It is not for you to know times or seasons that the Father has fixed by his own authority.

(Acts 1:4-7 ESV)

Then they returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, a Sabbath day's journey away.

(Acts 1:12 ESV)

Waiting on God means we should be busy in prayer

[13] And when they had entered, they went up to the upper room, where they were staying, Peter and John and James and Andrew, Philip and Thomas, Bartholomew and Matthew, James the son of Alphaeus and Simon the Zealot and Judas the son of James. [14] All these with one accord were devoting themselves to prayer, together with the women and Mary the mother of Jesus, and his brothers.

(Acts 1:12-14 ESV)

Rejoice in hope, be patient in tribulation, be constant in prayer. (Romans 12:12 ESV)

Continue steadfastly in prayer, being watchful in it with thanksgiving. At the same time, pray also for us, that God may open to us a door for the word, to declare the mystery of Christ, on account of which I am in prison—that I may make it clear, which is how I ought to speak. (Colossians 4:2–4 ESV)

[13] And when they had entered, they went up to the upper room, where they were staying, Peter and John and James and Andrew, Philip and Thomas, Bartholomew and Matthew, James the son of Alphaeus and Simon the Zealot and Judas the son of James. We should look to God's Word to help us understand God's plan

[15] In those days Peter stood up among the brothers (the company of persons was in all about 120) and said, [16] "Brothers, the Scripture had to be **fulfilled**, which the Holy Spirit spoke beforehand by the mouth of David concerning Judas, who became a guide to those who arrested Jesus. [17] For he was numbered among us and was allotted his share in this ministry." [18] (Now this man acquired a field with the reward of his wickedness, and falling headlong he burst open in the middle and all his bowels gushed out. (Acts 1:15-20 ESV)

[19] And it became known to all the inhabitants of Jerusalem, so that the field was called in their own language Akeldama, that is, Field of Blood.) [20] "For it is written in the Book of **Psalms**, "May his camp become desolate, and let there be no one to dwell in it'; and "Let another take his office.'

(Acts 1:15-20 ESV)

- Judas' <u>betrayal</u> was predicted (Ps. 41:9)
- Judas' tragic *heritage* predicted (Ps. 69:25)
- Judas' <u>replacement</u> predicted (Ps. 109:8).

Waiting on God & discerning His will includes using common sense to narrow our options

[21] So one of the men who have accompanied us during all the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, [22] beginning from the baptism of John until the day when he was taken up from us one of these men must become with us a witness to his resurrection." [23] And they put forward two, Joseph called Barsabbas, who was also called Justus, and Matthias.

(Acts 1:21–23 ESV)


Waiting on God requires us to trust God to show us what only He can

[24] And they prayed and said, "You, Lord, who know the hearts of all, show which one of these two you have chosen [25] to take the place in this ministry and apostleship from which Judas turned aside to go to his own place." Guidance From Holy Spirit

- The Holy Spirit uses *God's Word* to provide direction to us (Jn. 14:26; 16:12-14)
- The Holy Spirit may guide us through <u>conviction of</u> <u>right & wrong</u> (Jn. 16:8)
- The Holy Spirit may guide us through our conscience (Rom. 9:1)
- The Holy Spirit may provide guidance in *corporate* worship (Acts 13:1-3)

Guidance From Holy Spirit

- The Holy Spirit may use <u>open or closed doors</u> to redirect us (Acts 16:7-8)
- The Holy Spirit may even use a <u>vision</u> to direct us (Acts 16:9-10)
- The Holy Spirit may guide us through <u>other</u>
 <u>believers</u> (Acts 15:28)
