Food for Thought for the Week of Easter

This week's message invited us to reflect on how we respond to Jesus, and what the resurrection really means for us. Take a moment to sit with each of these prompts in prayer and reflection.

Four Responses Jesus drew out very different responses from people in the days before and after the resurrection. We still see those same responses today.

- Which of the four responses to Jesus (serve me, reshape Him, holiday guest, or all in) most reflects where your heart has been recently?
- Have you ever expected Jesus to act in a certain way and been disappointed or confused when He didn't?

What the Resurrection Means The resurrection isn't just a belief, it's a reversal of death and the foundation of our faith.

- What's one part of your life that feels like it needs resurrection right now?
- How would your outlook change this week if you lived as if Jesus is truly alive and ruling?

The Evidence and the Invitation We were reminded that the resurrection is not blind faith, it's grounded in history, prophecy, and eyewitnesses. But more than that, it's an invitation.

- What's holding you back from going all in?
- Who in your life needs to hear that the resurrection isn't just good news, it's true news?

The Choice at Easter

What Will You Do with a Risen King? (Answer Key)

1. The Four Responses to Jesus

- 1. What can Jesus do for me? (Mark 11:1–11, 15:6–15)
 - o Faith built on **convenience** crumbles when life gets hard
- 2. I know better than God (Mark 11:27-12:12)
 - A god made in your <u>image</u> can't save you
- 3. That was a nice message, see you next year
 - Holiday faith won't carry you through everyday life
- 4. **Jesus, I'm all in** (Luke 24:50-53)
 - o Resurrection leads to transformation

2. What the Resurrection Is / Isn't

It's NOT:

- Just "life after death"
- Revivification like Lazarus
- Reincarnation or **purgatory**

It IS:

- 1. A **renewal** of the physical body (2 Cor. 5:8)
- 2. Life after a period of being dead
- 3. A complete reversal of death

3. Five Reasons to Trust the Resurrection

- 1. It was **Predicted** and then **Recorded** (ls. 53:8-12, 1 Cor. 15)
- 2. Jesus really **died** (Jn. 19:34-35)
- 3. The tomb was **empty** (Is 53:9, Mt. 27:57-60)
- 4. He was **seen** by many (1 Cor. 15:6, Lk. 24:36-43)
- 5. Lives were changed (Js. 1:1, Jude 1, Acts 2; 9)

4. Five Things the Resurrection Accomplishes

- 1. **We Are <u>Forgiven</u>** The resurrection is the <u>proof</u> that the cross worked (*Is. 53:5, Jn 19:30*)
- 2. We Are Sanctified Resurrection power is at work in us now (Rom. 6:4)
- 3. We Are Justified God's justice has been satisfied (Rom. 4:25)
- 4. We Have Hope We know this world is not the end (1 Pet. 1:3)
- 5. We Have <u>Purpose</u> Our labor in the Lord is not <u>meaningless</u> (1 Cor. 15:58)
