Why should we listen to God in prayer?

1. God desires for us to listen to him.

Listen, my people, and I will admonish you. Israel, if you would only listen to me! There must not be a strange god among you; you must not bow down to a foreign god. I am the LORD your God, who brought you up from the land of Egypt. Open your mouth wide, and I will fill it.

"But my people did not listen to my voice; Israel did not obey me. So I gave them over to their stubborn hearts to follow their own plans. If only my people would listen to me and Israel would follow my ways, I would quickly subdue their enemies and turn my hand against their foes."

Why should we listen to God in prayer?

- 1. God desires for us to listen to him.
- 2. Listening to God's voice is foundational to knowing him.

My sheep hear my voice, I know them, and they follow me.

John 10v27 (CSB)

How does God speak to us in prayer?

- 1. Through his Word (Scripture)
- 2. Through the Holy Spirit

All Scripture is inspired by God (God-breathed), and is profitable for teaching, for rebuking, for correcting, for training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work.

2 Timothy 3v16-17

Now we have not received the spirit of the world, but the Spirit who comes from God, so that we may understand what has been freely given to us by God.

1 Cor 2v12 (CSB)

But the Counselor, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you all things and remind you of everything I have told you.

Holy Spirit




Dangers of Holy Spirit only

- My thoughts and intuitions are as authoritative as God's written words
- ► God does my will and bends to my desires
- Feelings rule my life, opening the door to lust and self-will
- ► Confusion between your will and God's will
- Romanticism: Intuition and feeling are the measure of truth

Word Holy Spirit

Dangers of Word only

- God in a box. He can and wants to speak to us only one way
- Legalism; I might do God's will but not out of loving relationship with him
- I avoid adultery, but I miss compassion
- Little sense of being shaped by relationship with God
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Permeating my life with God's Word gives the Holy Spirit a vocabulary to make his words personal and applicable to me.

This results in an integrated life of hearing God's voice through a grounded, deep relationship.

What is our posture as we listen to God in prayer?

- 1. Listen with humility and openness
- 2. Listen with wisdom and discernment
