

for all who weep and mourn the absence of loved ones this holiday season, recognizing that death and loss


touch every human life.

Music - "How Deep the Father's Love for Us"

A Reading from Matthew 2 and a Lamentation for the Slaughter of the Innocents

Leader: A reading from Matthew, chapter 2:

When Herod saw that he had been tricked

by the wise men, he was infuriated, and he sent and killed

all the children in and around Bethlehem

who were two years old or under, according to the time

that he had learned from the wise men. Then was fulfilled what had been spoken

through the prophet Jeremiah: "A voice was heard in Ramah, wailing and loud lamentation."

People: It was Rachel weeping for her children,

refusing to be comforted because they were no more.

Leader: And still too many cry,

on every continent and in every nation,

who have lost loved ones too soon and unnecessarily

to violence and war, to famine and disease,

to abuse, addiction, mental illness, and suicide,

to miscarriage, still birth, and other untimely deaths.

We cry out for the innocents slaughtered

all over the world, where misguided ideology, vengeance,

and mental illness have taken so many lives.

We cry out for those lives lost, homes and businesses and whole communities devastated by natural disasters and especially the Covid-19 pandemic. Especially we cry out for the over 250,000 lives lost in the United States to the Coronavirus, and for those families who had to remain painfully separated from their loved ones in times of suffering and dying and grieving.

A voice was heard in Ramah sobbing and loudly lamenting.

People: It was Rachel weeping for her children, refusing to be comforted because they were no more.

(silence)

Leader:

A voice is heard in all places of sadness. It is the voice of God, our Mother and Father, who has seen the pain of her children and seen beyond it. It says,

"Keep your voice from weeping and keep your eyes from tears; for your grieving has been heard and your work shall be rewarded....

There is hope for your future.

I have prepared a place for your children and will keep them in perfect peace, until the old things have disappeared and there is a new heaven and a new earth."

We light this candle for all who died unnecessarily or too soon, and for all whose lives and whose holidays will never be the same because of it.

Let us pray together...

People: Gracious God, hold in your loving embrace

> those whose names are written on our hearts or on our consciences until the day when we see them again and know that our grieving is over and that all your promises are kept. Move us as Christians and as citizens

to turn our anger and lamentation

into a commitment to reduce the unnecessary loss of life, and into a commitment of resources to care

for the most vulnerable among us. Amen.

A TIME FOR HEALING AND REMEMBERING

A Reading from Romans 8

Leader: I consider that the sufferings of this present time

are not worth comparing with the glory

about to be revealed to us.

For the creation waits with eager longing

for the revealing of the children of God...

We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now; and not only the creation,

but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit,

groan inwardly while we wait for adoption,

the redemption of our bodies.

Leader: We are here to recognize our losses

and remember those we loved who have died.

When the loss is someone we have loved or been loved

by, we grieve mightily but we may also rejoice

and feel gratitude for what we had, the person we knew,

or the love we shared before the loss.

As we light a candle in remembrance, as far as is possible, let us do so with gratitude for all that was good about their time here on earth and with us.

But sometimes when a loved one dies there is also turmoil caused by the painful and broken parts of relationships that still need healing or forgiveness. Sometimes our loss is not a death of a person but the death of a trusting relationship, a covenant such as marriage, a job or some hope we had for the future, and the pain or anger overwhelms any sense of gratitude, and we can only lift up to God the jagged edges of our hearts and lives for healing.

For some of us our loss this holiday season may be a loss to our sense of health, ability, or mental well-being. Perhaps we are facing a new diagnosis, testing, chronic pain or illness, treatment, or a new limitation that may affect our ability to enjoy or experience the holidays the way we would like or the way we feel others expect us to.

And so we light this candle for all who are most in need of healing and peace.

Lighting of the Candles & Prayers

Leader:

As the music plays, we invite you to come forward to the table at the top of each aisle, take a candle from the basket, light it from the candle in the center of each table and lay it on the table in remembrance of a loved one who has died or a loss heavy on your heart or in hope of healing or a new start.

You may light the candle in silence or name the person, loss or hope aloud.

In the past we have also offered individual prayers for healing and the anointing of oil.

This year, we invite you to instead write down any specific prayer requests you might have on the card located in your pew, so that each one who needs individual prayers can know themselves seen, heard and prayed for. Leave them on your pew and they will be prayed for by the pastors here, according to your instructions.

Leader: Let us pray.

Gracious God, source of life eternal and abundant, in Jesus Christ you heal the sick and mend the broken, you forgive sinners and restore the lost to community. In Christ you revealed yourself to be

the light of the world.

As these candles bring light into this holy space, may your love shine into every dark corner of our lives and hearts.

By your Spirit, and through our prayers for one another, come upon all who are in need of healing, compassion, comfort, forgiveness and new life that they may know your healing touch, be comforted and made whole, to the glory of Jesus Christ our redeemer. Amen.

Instrumental music

Those who wish may come forward one at a time, maintaining a distance of 6 feet apart, to light a candle, either in silence or naming their loved one out loud.

Litany of Remembrance

Leader: Having lit our candles, please join me in the litany of

remembrance for loved ones lost:

In the rising of the sun and its going down,

People: We remember them.

Leader: In the blowing of the wind and in the chill of the winter,

People: We remember them.

Leader: In the opening of the buds and in the rebirth of spring,

People: We remember them.

Leader: In the blueness of the sky and in the warmth of summer,

People: We remember them.

Leader: At the rustling of the leaves and in the beauty of autumn,

People: We remember them.

Leader: At the beginning of the year and when it ends,

People: We remember them.

Leader: When we are lost and sick at heart,

People: We remember them.

Leader: When we have joys we yearn to share,

People: We remember them.

Leader: As long as we live, they too shall live,

for they have shaped who we are and

People: We remember them.

Leader: I invite you to gaze at these flames... then close your eyes.

You should still be able to see them in your mind's eye.

So it is with our loved ones.

Leader: Having remembered our loved ones,

> with gratitude in our hearts, we now light the candle of love:

for the love we have for life

and for God who is the source of life.

for the love that those we have lost had for us and the love we had and still have for them,

for the love we have for those still physically present

in our lives, for the love that has supported us in our grief,

and for the love that sustains us going forward.
