When Jesus Opens Your Eyes - Help me to See, Lord!

UPWARDS – Growing in Our Relationship with God

1. According to the sermon, there are things that can become like “scales” over our eyes and can keep us from seeing what Jesus wants us to see (Acts 9:17-18). What do you think are some examples of such scales and which of these affect us the most?
2. Are there people or matters we need to truly see but somehow haven’t noticed, such as overlooked individuals, tasks we need to handle at home or elsewhere, or missed opportunities?
3. How does understanding the ways in which people encounter God encourage you to experience God in your daily walk, both in His power and in His truth?

INWARDS – Growing in Fellowship with One Another

4. Saul believed he was serving God, yet he was blind to the truth. In what areas of our lives might we feel spiritually “confident” but still need God’s redirection and prayer?
5. When Saul’s eyes were opened, his entire life, direction, and mission changed. In what ways are your daily purpose and your relationships with others still being reshaped by your encounter with Jesus?
6. When Saul persecuted the disciples, Jesus asked, “Why do you persecute me?” (Acts 9:4). How does this change the way you view and treat other members of the church?

OUTWARDS – Reaching Those Around Us

7. God used Ananias in Saul’s conversion (Acts 9:10-25). How does this encourage us to let God use us as His witnesses?
8. John Newton’s hymn entitled “Amazing Grace” is a testimony of “scales” falling off. How do you think this hymn relate to your personal experience, and encourage you to share your own “I was blind, but now I see” story?
9. The sermon asks whether there are people around us whom we have been overlooking. Who is one person in your daily life, whether a family member, neighbor, or coworker, for whom you can do something simple, like pray for them, call them, share with them, or simply listen?
