DEFEATING THE FLESH

(Acts 20:22-27) June 25, 2023

Read Acts 20:22-27 – In Paul's instructions to the Ephesian elders, he touches on his past, his present and his future. In the <u>past</u> he faithfully ministered the gospel to them. <u>Presently</u> he is driven to go to <u>Jerusalem</u> — not an easy decision. Why? Bc ²³⁾ "the HS testifies to me in every city that imprisonment and afflictions await me." That's amazing! If affliction awaits — why go? Why not stay on the gospel trail? <u>Why venture into the teeth of the storm</u>? Well, Paul tells us why. ²²⁾ "I am going to Jer, <u>constrained by the Spirit?</u>" He's driven to go <u>where the HS</u> <u>leads</u>! Jerusalem!

Hard decision. *Paul had the same battle with obedience we do*. He tells us so. **Rom 7:** ¹⁵ For I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate. . . . ¹⁹ For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I keep on doing." Sound familiar? It's the age-old struggle of every believer. So how do we win? **Gal 5:** ¹⁶ But I say, *walk by the Spirit*, and you will not gratify the desires of the flesh. ¹⁷ For the desires of the flesh are against the Spirit, and the desires of the Spirit are against the flesh, for these are opposed to each other, to keep you from doing the things you want to do." Paul had to decide like we do, every day: *Will we walk in the Spirit, or in the flesh*? The war rages all our lives. Flesh vs. Spirit. And *by our choices, we decide who wins*.

How did Paul get it right? What motivated him to walk in the Spirit? Here are 4 truths which will be of immeasurable help to us in our own walk.

V. Paul Acceded to the Spirit's Leading

²² And now, behold, I am going to Jerusalem, constrained by the Spirit, not knowing what will happen to me there, ²³ except that the Holy Spirit testifies to me in every city that imprisonment and afflictions await me." Now, why would Paul continue to Jerusalem when he is being warned everywhere he's <u>walking into a firestorm</u> — which he does. In Jer, he is falsely accused of taking a Gentile into the Jewish section of the temple and gets imprisoned 5 years. <u>He was warned</u>. When he got to Tyre, **Acts 21:4**: "And having sought out the disciples, we stayed there for 7 days. <u>And thru the spirit they were telling Paul not to go on to Jerusalem</u>." Same message in Caesarea: **Acts 21:** While we were staying for many days, a prophet named Agabus came down from Judea. ¹¹ And coming to us, he took Paul's belt and bound his own feet and hands and said, "Thus says the Holy Spirit, 'This is how the Jews at Jerusalem will bind the man who owns this belt and deliver him into the hands of the Gentiles.' " ¹² When we heard this, we and the people there urged him not to go up to Jerusalem."

So was Paul wrong to go to Jer? I think not. Why? Agabus said he would be "bound" hand and feet." Guess what? Same word $(\delta \hat{\epsilon} \omega)$ is back in 20:22 where Paul is "<u>constrained</u> by the Spirit" to go. In Acts 12:6 Peter was in jail, "<u>bound</u> with two chains." Paul feels that same <u>constraint by the Spirit</u> pulling him towards Jer. Thru prayer and study, Paul has a strong sense of the Spirit's leading him. At the same time, the Spirit is prompting these dire warnings in every city. So what gives? <u>Why this push/pull from the HS</u>?

<u>It's a test</u>! Life gets easier once we realize God builds us thru the tests of circumstances. Even Jesus went thru that often, most explicitly in the Garden of Gethsemane. Paul was no exception. The Spirit is saying, "You must go, Paul. It's not going to be easy, so prepare yourself, but here is the way I want you to go. Will you be faithful?" And Paul was.

The day after his conversion a disciple named Ananias was told: Acts 9:15-16: "Go [to Paul], for he is a chosen instrument of mine to carry my name before the Gentiles and kings and the children of Israel. ¹⁶ For *I will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name*." Persecution was Paul's constant companion. Now, more is coming. Paul was ready. *He would not allow the Spirit's warnings to overcome the Spirit's leading*.

God told Abe at age 75, "Your descendants will be like the sand of the sea." Ten years later, not one kid. So, he took matters into his own hands, had a boy by his wife's maid. Assumed he had God's promise. Fifteen years later, God renews the promise. Gen 17: ¹⁷ Then Abraham fell on his face and laughed and said to himself, "Shall a child be born to a man who is a hundred years old? Shall Sarah, who is ninety years old, bear a child?" ¹⁸ And Abraham said to God, "Oh that Ishmael might live before you!" "Lord, don't sweat it. I've got it covered. Ishmael is the perfect answer." But he wasn't. Isaac was. A year later – promise impossibly fulfilled.

But then Gen 22:1-2: After these things God <u>tested</u> Abraham and said to him, "Abraham!" And he said, "Here I am." He said, "Take your son, your only son Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah, and <u>offer him</u> there as a burnt offering on one of the mountains of which I shall tell you." "But wait, God. This is the child of promise. <u>If he's gone, the promise is gone</u>, I'm getting <u>mixed messages</u> here!" But he went, not knowing what would happen. He trusted: Heb 11:19: "He considered that God was able even to raise him from the dead." And we know how God stayed his hand at the last minute and provided a ram for sacrifice. Growing thru tested faith.

How about us? Can we trust God in the dark? I think of Losey's. At our first visit I asked, "How do you do this knowing you could be killed? What do you tell your kids?" He said, "We tell them this is the normal Xn life. This is what trusting God is all about. And if God should take us, He will take care of you." That's trusting God in the dark, when nothing's going as it should. When we follow the Spirit like that – it kills the flesh.

VI. Paul Assessed Life Correctly

You'll not defeat the flesh if you <u>only think of NOW!</u> Is it important? Sure! It deserves to be enjoyed. But is it ultimate? No. <u>BUT the flesh will insist it is.</u> Paul wouldn't go there. He followed the Spirit by correctly assessing the value of this life vs. the life to come. ²⁴ But I do not account my life of any value nor as precious to myself." Paul wanted to live. But he knew what we often forget. <u>Living</u> isn't the most important thing. <u>Obeying</u> God is.

Phil 1:21: "For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain." The flesh says, "Staying alive is everything." Paul says, "To live is great; to die is even greater; it's a gain, bc I'll be with Christ." That's a rare, but Godly perspective. It let Paul know while he might face suffering in Jerusalem, he could not face the loss of anything eternally important. He could not lose.

James Calvert, in the 1830's went to minister to the cannibals in Fiji. The ship captain tried to dissuade him. "You and your family will be killed if you go among such savages." Calvert replied, "We died <u>before we came</u>." To be dead to self and alive to Chris is to be absolutely <u>untouchable by this life</u>. Karl Marx said to be a Communist is to be "a dead man on reprieve." But he offered nothing <u>beyond</u> the grave. Better to be a dead person on reprieve to a Savior who can take you all the way eternally home!

The flesh always tells us the values of this life far outweigh those of a vague eternity. It's a lie. To defeat the flesh we must have God's perspective, like Paul or James Calvert or our Lord — one that is willing to suffer loss of face, loss of a job, loss of relationships, whatever for the greater worth of gaining Christ. "It will be worth it all / when we see Jesus. / All troubles seem so small / when we see Him. / One glimpse of his dear face, / all sorrow will erase. / So bravely run the race / till we see Christ." The more we see Him thru His Word, the more able we'll discern the lies of the flesh.

VII. Paul Attended His Mission Faithfully

He had a mission, and it wasn't *political action*, *career advancement*, *social justice*, *entertainment* or *sports*. Paul loved sports. He illustrated with boxing, running, gymnastics. But *those things would not follow him into eternity*. What would? ²⁴ But I do not account my life of any value nor as precious to myself, if only I may finish my course and the ministry that I received from the Lord Jesus, *to testify to the gospel of the grace* of God." His mission to spread the gospel. Keeping that at the top of the list in his life kept him focused on what's *most important* in life. The *flesh* will never point you there; the *Spirit* will always point you there.

We're not all pastors or missionaries. But we are all to use our gifts of faith, giving, helps, administration, counseling, music, and loving people to *produce eternal fruit*. Knowing our mission keeps us Spirit-focused, not flesh-focused. While he enjoyed sports and friendships and travel, Paul wanted most of all to "testify to the gospel of the grace of God" and "proclaim the kingdom". He knew a day of accounting was coming soon.

Knowing your mission focuses your mind. Someone once asked, "How can you tell the preacher's about to give a short sermon?" Ans: "He has his golf shoes on." Please take note – no golf shoes. Nothing wrong with golf. But to shortchange the gospel and life's mission for an extra round – that would be a problem. Life is meant to be enjoyed, Beloved. But to make sure we don't waste it on trivialities we must stay focused on our life's mission. If we do, some good, but unnecessary things will fall away, as will some things that are trivialities or even sinful. So, prioritize mission first.

VIII. Paul Aspired to a Clear Conscience

Paul says, "I'm not going to see you again. This is it. But I can say in good conscience: ²⁶ Therefore I testify to you this day that I am <u>innocent of the blood of all.</u> ²⁷⁾ for I did not shrink from declaring to you the whole counsel of God." Paul might have had Ezek 33:7-9 in mind: "So you, son of man, I have made a watchman for the house of Israel. Whenever you hear a word from my mouth, you shall give them warning from me. ⁸ If I say to the wicked, O wicked one, you shall surely die, and you do not speak to warn the wicked to turn from his way, that wicked person shall die in his iniquity, but his blood I will require at your hand. ⁹ But if you warn the wicked to turn from his way, and he does not turn from his way, that person shall die in his iniquity, but you will have delivered your soul."

Now we're not Ezekiel, and we're not Paul, but the principle holds. God was telling Ezekiel, "You're a watchman, warning of danger. If you fall asleep or otherwise fail to warn people of approaching danger, and they are killed, their blood is on your hands." Share truth with people.

Paul wanted no innocent blood on his hands. We must not either. We have a hard message. People don't want to hear it. They don't know they have **spiritual cancer**. But we must ask the

Spirit of God to show us creative and compassionate ways to help them see by His power. When we're focused on arriving before our judge <u>with a clear conscience</u>, it will keep the flesh at bay. It is the flesh, our old selfish nature, that holds us back, is it not?

A few years ago, some lifeguards had a party to celebrate no drownings that summer. A hundred lifeguards attended. But as the party was breaking up, 4 of the men, clearing the pool area, noticed a fully dressed man in the deep end. They tried to revive Jess Moody, 31, but it was too late. *He drowned surrounded by lifeguards celebrating their success*. Could that be us? So caught up in our own little group of believers that we never reach beyond them? You can be *living in the flesh right in the middle of the church*, right? But let's not. Let's find ways to reach out and to share the gospel of JC. What people do with it is up to them. Sharing it – that's up to us.

Conc – We often think of the flesh as some big sin – dissensions, envy, drunkenness, loss of temper, sexual immorality. And indeed those are listed in **Gal 5** among others. But sometimes, the most fleshly things in our lives are the <u>distractions</u>, innocent in themselves, that have taken up <u>priority residence</u> – keeping us from our God-given mission, whatever form that takes. It doesn't take much, does it, to keep us from walking in the Spirit.

God says in Jer 2:13: "For my people have committed two evils: they have forsaken me, the fountain of living waters, and hewed out cisterns for themselves, broken cisterns that can hold no water." So easy to do. *Quit God and take up trivialities*. But it all comes with an eternal price.

As the Communists began to overrun China, one missionary with CIM wrote this poem:

"Tonight Shanghai is burning / And I am dying too. / But there's no death more certain / That death inside of you. / Some men die of shrapnel / While some go down in flames. / But most men died inch by inch / While playing little games." That need not be us if we will tune ourselves to accede to the Spirit's leading, assess the value of life correctly, attend to our mission, and aspire to a clear conscience. That will keep us pointed in the right direction, allowing us to enjoy now while preparing for then. Let's pray.
