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#### 1. Familiarize Yourself With the Passage and the Gospels

a. Read John, 1 John, 2 John, 3 John, and Revelation

## Introduction to the Passage (Feel free to use this as a reference guide as you discuss the passage)

<u>Historical/Literary Context</u>: The Gospel of John, 1 John, 2 John, 3 John, and Revelation, whom we attribute its content and authorship to the Apostle John, wrote about 20 percent of the New Testament. Of the twelve disciples, this is by far the most. The early church fathers from A.D. 100 to about A.D. 600 gave the Gospel of John the symbol of the eagle because it appears that John wanted to take his readers to the spiritual heights of heaven helping them understand Jesus, not from just a physical human perspective, but from the spiritual perspective of heaven.

John's gospel does not include the transfiguration where Jesus revealed his divine glory, but it would appear that John's goal in his writing's was to show us more fully what Jesus revealed in the transfiguration. The Gospel of John opens up prior to creation, with the eternal relationship of the Father and the Son (John 1:1-3). John takes us into the spiritual dimension focusing on how the spiritual dimension invades the earthly realm whether it is through the person of Jesus in his gospel or end times events in Revelation.

In the three letters (1, 2, and 3 John) John emphasizes practical avenues of the spirit-filled life through realities of fellowship, love, and truth. More than anything else, John, through his pastoral heart, wanted the believers to experience true, genuine Christian fellowship (1 John 1:3). He writes the entire letter of 1 John to explain what that looks like.

### 3. Questions About the Passage

- a. How do you understand the word "believe" as used throughout John's writings. What does he mean by believe? (John 3:16)
- b. How does one have fellowship according to John in the book of 1 John? Does John challenge your current understanding of fellowship? (John 3:16)
- c. What is love according to the Apostle John and how does it fit with other biblical passages of love? (1 Corinthians 13)

### 4. From the Passage to Life

- a. John said, if you love the world, you do not have the love of the Father (1 John 2:15). What aspects of the world do you struggle loving? How is the Lord helping you to love the world less?
- b. What is challenging in your own life about John's understanding of love? How is John convicting you?
- c. How do you respond to evil in the world, knowing that God is still on the throne ruling the universe? What is comforting and transforming about this truth in our day?
