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1. Familiarize Yourself With the Passage

- a. Read Exodus 32
- b. Read the context around the narrative
- c. Note repetition of words, content, and ideas

2. Literary Context

a. <u>Literary Context:</u> By the time we get to chapter 32, the covenant has been confirmed (Exodus 24) and the plans for the ark of the covenant, table of show bread, golden lampstand, bronze altar, court of the tabernacle, and tabernacle have been communicated and shared with the people (Exodus 25-27). In addition, the priest's garments, consecration of the priests, altar of incense and bronze basin have been shared also with the people (Exodus 28-30). In other words, everything that is needed to set up the sacrificial worship system has been relayed to the Israelites. Further, the stone tablets that witness (Exodus 31:18) the covenant agreement between Israel and God have been made as a sign that the covenant is established and the relationship is set. In other words, the sin of the golden calf happened just after the covenant was made, which shows us the inability of humans to keep a covenant with God. We not only sin grievously in our sin-nature, but we sin quickly (Isaiah 59:7). Note Exodus 32:22, "You know the people, that they are set on evil."

b. <u>Historical/Biblical Context:</u> Why did the covenant have to be renewed in Chapter 34 if it was completed in 31:18? It may be easy to conclude that Moses was just angry when he threw the tablets after the people worshipped the golden calf and the broken tablets are a sign of his heated anger (Exodus 32:19). However, the broken commandments were actually a sign that the covenant had been broken and signifies annulment of the agreement. ¹ Israel violated the terms of the covenant, resulting in a broken covenant, and now a renewal of the covenant in Chapter 34 is necessary. Thank the Lord that the covenant under Christ was completely fulfilled, and its accomplishment is not dependent upon fickle rebellious humans.

3. Questions About the Passage

a. In verses 11-14 Moses pleaded with God to spare the people of Israel. In verses 15-20, Moses almost seems to completely change his mind as it says, "Moses' anger burned hot..." (v. 19). Why does Moses' attitude change so quickly? Why did seeing the idolatry set a switch off in Moses as opposed to when God simply told him about it in the earlier verses?

- b. In what ways does Moses step into the role of mediator in this chapter?
- c. How is Aaron culpable for the sin of the golden calf? How did Aaron fail in his leadership?
- d. The making of the golden calf is an obvious violation of the second commandment. However, why is a violation of the second commandment such an offense to God (it would appear they were still attempting to worship God according to verse 5)?
- e. What qualities do you see in Moses' mediatory work in verses 30-34 and how does that point you to Christ?

4. From the Passage to Life

- a. There are a lot of references in chapter 32 about Israel's sin and their wickedness (verses 9, 21, 22, 30, 31, 34). Paul provides similar statements about our sin in Romans 3:11-18. How do you see your sin working itself out, maybe in similar ways to the Israelites?
- b. The deeper we venture into our sin, the more ugly things we see that may cause depression or other things in our lives. However, after Paul got done talking about his sin in Romans 7, what was his response in verse 25? How does going deeper into your sin help you see God's grace more clearly and powerfully?
- c. Moses' intercessory actions in verses 30-34 are a foreshadowing of Jesus' intercessory office in the New Covenant. How has Jesus been interceding on your behalf that infuses thanksgiving into your heart (answered prayer, forgiveness of certain sins, examples of compassion or mercy, etc.)?
